ANSWER TO ANOTHER CONCERNED TAXPAYER I received the following letter October 31, 1980:

James Miears: Why are Federal Housing Authority irregularities ignored and never mentioned until someone brings the matter to the attention of the taxpayers? How many more irregularities have gone on in the past, and how many more irregularities are still going

This kind of inefficiency is payed for by every taxpayer. The burden is hard to bear, especially to us Senior Citizens living on fixed incomes.

I personally would like to thank the concerned taxpayers who wrote the letter you published in the Gorman Progress, October 30th issue. I also would like to thank you for making known the Housing Authority's regulations. Could you go a step further and publish the name and mailing address of your immediate supervisor? As a taxpayer who pays your salary and every other taxpayer in Gorman concerned with irregularities in the housing project; We have a right to know. If you feel we have a right to know, we will be looking forward to the next issue of the Gorman Progress for the above information.

Another Concerned

First let me get on item clear - both letters I have received mentioned, "Concerned Taxpayers", well don't be concerned about anyone's taxes being used on the Federal Housing Project, because your taxes or no one else's taxes go to pay for or pay the upkeep of these units. The money that was used to build all the units was a loan from the Federal Government, and not a gift or grant. The people who live in the units will pay the loan off, and pay for the upkeep of the units.

As for the "irregularities ignored", I am not aware of any irregularities being ignored, if you will be specific, I will answer in detail. At least once each year a management Review is conducted by the Housing Management Officer from the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Dallas and such a review was conducted last July 14 -16, 1980. The findings of this review are a matter of record, and nothing in this report indicate a situation that cannot or has not been corrected. You must understand that anytime one administration takes over from another it takes some time to get acquainted with the way the Government wants every detail carried out.

Pat and Johnny Ingram as Executive Secretary and Maintenance Man, are doing a good job with what records they have to work with, and will continue to improve as they become more familiar with H.U.D. requirements. The Government requires that a large amount of records be kept on each unit, and on all aspects of the entire Housing Authority operation. Therefore the local Housing Authority must keep an auditor on retainer at all times to help with reports etc. The Authority has a complete audit each year by H.U.D. auditors, and if there is a problem locally they will have it corrected within 30 days.

As for your statement: 'As a taxpayer who pays your "salary" etc ... I am not going to dignify that by a long explanation except to say: To this day I have been. paid exactly nothing, but I have been out a lot of time, and effort tending to a thankless job that seems to get me more pain than pleasure. I do not draw a salary or does any board member draw a salary. The satisfaction we get from knowing that people of this area will have at least 66 places to live, is enough pay





The nights continue to get cooler and we know a killing frost can't be too far away. Eastland County peanut growers are leaving the peanuts in the ground hoping they will mature a crop before that first frost. Some growers have reported that their peanuts are maturing better than expected while others have said maturity is coming slowly due to the cooler soil temperatures. Of course, some of the earlier peanuts have been harvested. Yields seem to vary from

Pecans are hulling and falling now. Some of the early varieties are hulling on schedule. Because of the short crop of pecans the squirrels and birds are out getting their share. Growers are having to battle the wildlife for the few pacans that were produced this year.

Based on the current conditions, Texas pecan growers are expected to harvest 25 million pounds of pecans in 1980. That sounds like a lot, but is is 73 percent below last years crop. A little more than one half of that total will be natives and almost one half will be improved or paperpecans.

The large pecan crop last year and the drought conditions this year have contributed to the light pecan crop.

The United States pecan crop is expected to be seven percent less than last years. Whilemost states are expect ing a smaller crop this year, Georgia and Alabama are expecting much laregercrops

last year. Frost will be hitting the county before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses

forages. Although many plants con tain the toxic material that causes poisoning those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazed after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hyof these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed acces to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three of four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

To be safe allow plant materials affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week ormore of good sunlight. Call a vetinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has

FARMERS HOME

ADMINISTRATION ADDED \$837 MILLION TO TEXAS'S RURAL FINANCIAL RESOURCES

Temple, Texas received \$837 million during fiscal year 1980 in loans and grants by the U. S. Department of Agriculture Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) supporting farms, home improvement and community development in rural areas, FmHA State Director, W. H. Pieratt, reports.

The agency's farm loan services, which supplement private ciredit available in rural areas, added \$524 million to Texas's resources for operation of farms during a year of emergency and commercial credit shortage for many farmers.

FmHA home loan programs accounted for \$134 million to build or improve 3.847 homes in town and countryside areas.

Loans and supplementary grants to improve rural community water, sewer, health, fire protection and other public facilities totaled 78 million for 164 projects throughout the state.






