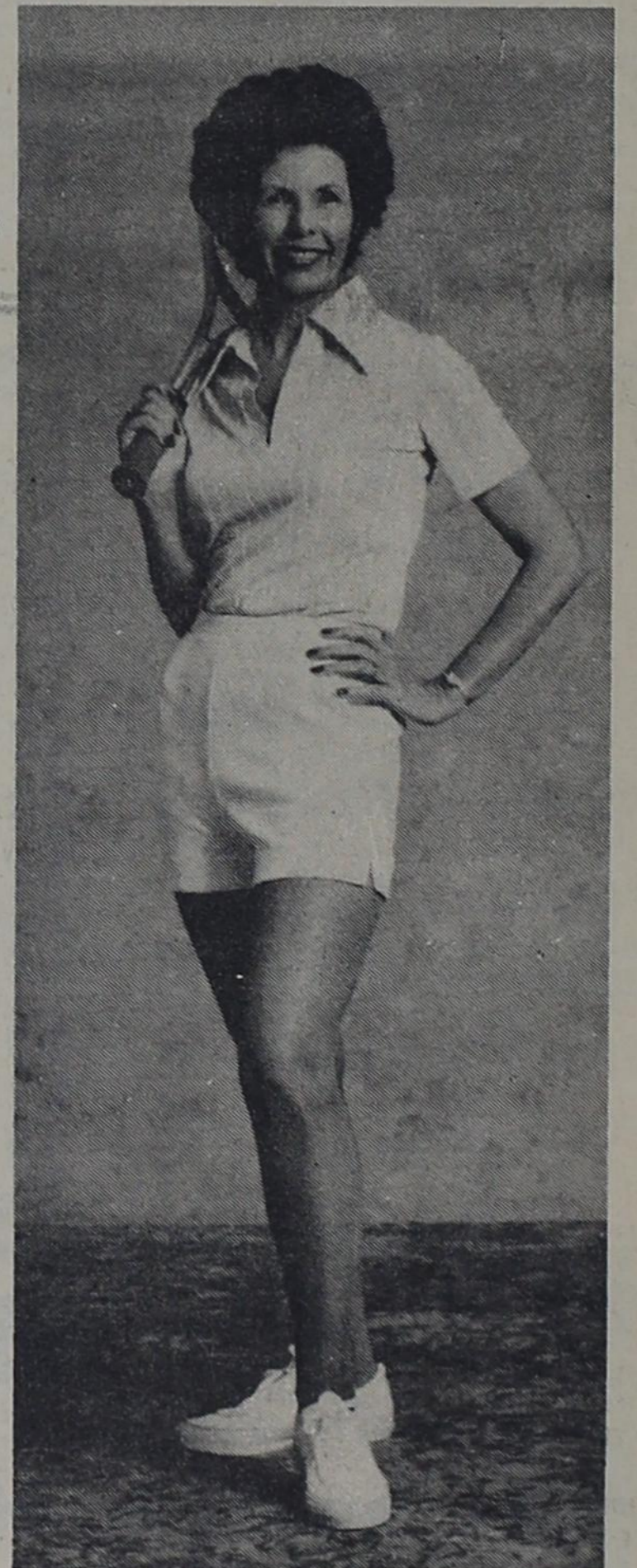

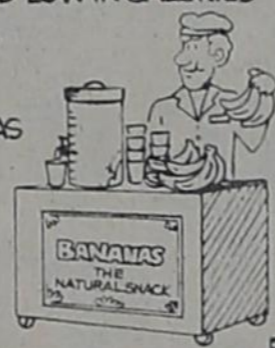

CHICKEN IN ALMOND SAUCE

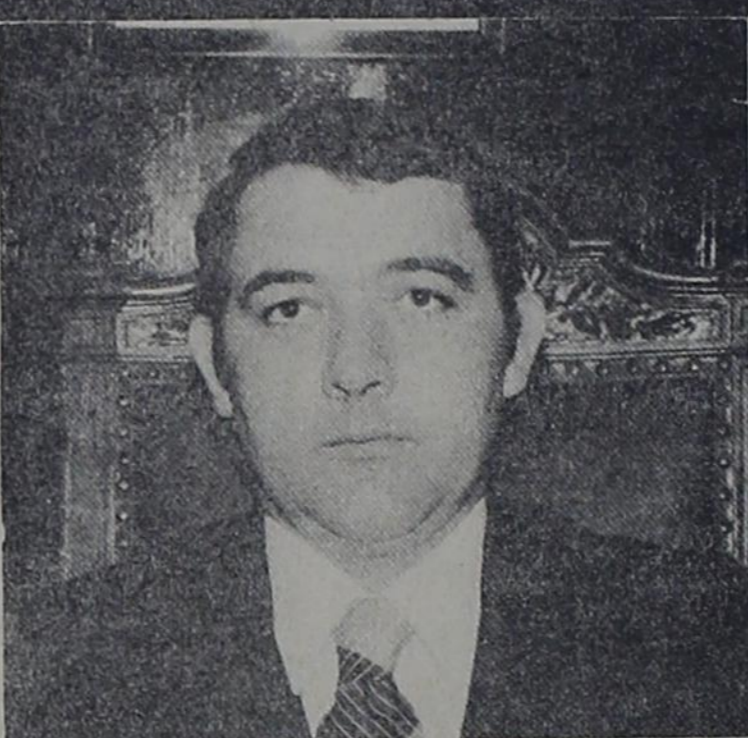
1 chicken, cut into serving pieces (about 3-1/2 pounds)
1/4 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup whole blanched almonds
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1-1/2 cups chicken broth
1/4 cup Bacardi light rum (80 proof)
4 whole cloves
2-inch piece of cinnamon stick

1 cup green pepper, cut in strips
1 cup pineapple chunks
1 egg yolk
1/2 cup heavy cream
Parslied rice
Dust chicken with flour combined with paprika and salt. Set aside.

In skillet, brown almonds in butter; remove and set aside. Add chicken to skillet and brown. Add chicken -broth, rum, cloves and cinnamon. Cover and simmer 25 minutes or until chicken is tender. Add green pepper, pineapple and reserved almonds. Blend egg yolk and cream. Gradually blend 1/2 cup sauce into egg mixture. Return to sauce and cook, stirring, until thickened and smooth; do not boil. Serve over rice. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
