TORNADO SWEEPS OVER TRAVIS COUNTY

STUDENT COURT AT S. M. U. TURNS THUMBS DOWN

Recommend Expulsion of 15 "Wilderness" Revelers and It Will Be Done.

DALLAS, April 25.—At least 15 students of Southern Methodist University who figured in the famous "wilderness" bacchanal at Savage lake which provoked federal investigation will be expelled during the next 48 hours, it was learned today by the United Press. The names of 15 under graduates found guilty by the students' court of drinking and dancing with women of the street have been forwarded to the faculty with recommendation that they be dropped from the school.

The students slated for expulsion also included the editors of the "Dinky," campus scandal sheet, now being investigated by the federal grand jury. Authorities of the Methodist university expect to dismiss without further inquiry those declared guilty by the students' court. In addition, the university is prepared to punish others who placed "Dinky" cards in the sheet. At the office of President C. C. Seelman, it was stated that action would be taken no later than Monday, perhaps today or tomorrow.

The federal grand jury heard additional testimony today as students said to have figured in the "Dinky" and in the frenzied lake revel were summoned before it.

Alleged Bootlegger Charged With Sale Of Booze To Boys

DALLAS, April 25.—Federal prosecutors investigating the famous "wilderness" dance at Savage lake today arrested A. M. McFadden, alleged bootlegger, on charges of supplying liquor to students at S. M. U. He was arrested on information furnished by a student who attended the lake party. The student was arrested and released on \$10 bond after telling authorities he bought his liquor for the party.

Warrant was issued also for the arrest of a second alleged bootlegger, federal officers said, also accused of furnishing liquor to the students for the drunken revel at Savage lake.

MAYFIELD-PEDDY CASE MAY BE CALLED FOR HEARING MAY FIFTH

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Senator Spencer of Missouri, chairman of the committee hearing the Mayfield-Peddy contest, announced today he had called a meeting of the committee for Monday, April 28, to discuss preliminary measures with view to starting regular hearings in the case on May 5.

Reports that the committee would sidestep the Ku Klux Klan issue in the case and concentrate on its legal phases were denied today by Luther Nickels, counsel for Peddy, who said the committee would go thoroughly into the Klan angle.

AUTOISTS COMPLAIN OF AUTOMATIC TRAFFIC SIGNALS

DALLAS, April 25.—Thirty additional automatic traffic signals will be added soon to the downtown street corners in Dallas.

The added units are expected to almost double in volume the downtown traffic flow, as 65 instead of 30 electric bells will sound off simultaneously, automatically guiding both motorists and pedestrians.

Critics of the unique safety system, which city officials declare has proven 100 per cent efficient, protest that the signals tend to slow up traffic.

Under the system green and red lights flash alternately on intersecting streets from 7 a. m. until midnight indicating when the traffic shall move, and in what direction. During the switch from green to red and vice versa, loud electric bells warn the pedestrians and motorists to stop.

Thousands of seconds are wasted daily when traffic is kept at a standstill, it is argued.

"Safety first—speed next," ruled the city fathers.

Telephone Exchange At Colorado Burned Down Early Today

SWEETWATER, April 25.—Colorado, 30 miles west of here, was cut off from telephone communication today as the result of a fire, which destroyed the telephone exchange building. The damage totalled \$40,000.

The fire occurred during a severe electrical storm which drenched Texas from Texaco to Temple and west as far as El Paso.

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., April 25.—Isaac Wolfgang, sentenced to be hanged today for slaying a policeman who sought to arrest him after the theft of two bottles of milk, was granted a reprieve by the state supreme court.

'BOSS' OF TAMMANY HALL DIES

Death of Charles T. Murphy, Democratic Political Dictator in New York City, May Have Important Bearing on Nominations at National Democratic Convention Next June.

NEW YORK, April 25.—Charles T. Murphy, "boss" of Tammany hall, died at 9:20 o'clock this morning at his home, 305 East 17th street, Manhattan. Coming as it does only two months before the national democratic convention, the passing of the famous politician is expected to have an important effect upon the choice of the democratic nominees next June.

Acute indigestion was the cause of death. With the "wizard of Tammany Hall" dead the

dramatic career of one of the nation's most widely known politicians ended. Murphy leaped from the obscurity of a driver of a horse drawn street car to a position where the flick of his finger either made or broke political aspirants in New York City, and New York state, and the widespread influence of the dominating machine he built carried its influence into the democratic national machine. Murphy was born in New York City in 1858.

Love Challenges Neff To Debate On Instructing Texans

DALLAS, April 25.—Thomas B. Love, democratic national committee man from Texas, today wired Governor Pat M. Neff a challenge to meet him in debate in Dallas next Monday night on the democratic political situation in Texas. The wire read:

"I have an engagement to speak at the city hall in Dallas on the night of April 28, on the proposition that the democracy of Texas should instruct its delegates to the national convention and instruct them for William C. McAdoo for the nomination for the presidency.

"While I shall adhere to the record, I shall say some things which, I believe, in fairness you should be given an opportunity to immediately explain. Therefore I will be very willing to divide time with you and offer you the opening and closing of the discussion, if you desire, provided I can be advised today of your acceptance."

A reply from Governor Neff had not been received by Mr. Love up to 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Rain In Eastland County Halts Work In the Oil Fields

Oil field operations were halted today in all parts of Eastland county as the result of the heavy rains last night and this morning.

The rain which fell in torrents at times this morning put the dirt roads to oil leases around Ranger and Eastland in an almost impassable condition and will delay drilling operations for several days because of the difficulty in getting supplies to the lease in some instances.

The skies gave small promise early this afternoon of clearing away.

JURY AND MAHER GET THANKS FOR DONATIONS TO FAR-AWAY ALASKA

Gratefulness for donations for little orphan children of St. Mary's mission in far-away Alaska by two Ranger men is expressed in a letter received today by Arthur C. Jury from Arthur Stecker, who was a guest of the Ghoslon hotel recently.

The donations were made by Edw. R. Maher and Mr. Jury to carry on the work started by Father Ruppert, who was frozen to death carrying presents to Alaska orphans last Christmas. In his letter of acknowledgment, Stecker said:

"I again thank you and Mr. Maher for your generous gift and I sincerely hope that in return the future will have much that is good in store for both of you and your families."

Father Ruppert was frozen to death on his return trip to Nome from the orphans home after he had traveled 70 miles with a dog-team, his sled laden with simple gifts and fruit. He had fallen exhausted and when rescuers found his body, the leader of the dog-team stood over his body in a protective position.

HEN ADOPTS FIVE KITTENS DESERTED BY MOTHER CAT

FORT WORTH, April 25.—Five small kittens were adopted by a tender-hearted hen in North Fort Worth when their mother deserted them.

The scrawny little felines exchanged amorous purrs for solicitous clucks as they toddled about the barnyard with the patronizing chicken, and at nights sleeping together in the hay loft.

Auto Bandits In Illinois Get Away With \$65,000 Roll

GRANITE CITY, Ill., April 25.—Bandits in two autos today held up the messenger of the Granite City National bank and escaped with \$63,000 payroll for the Granite City Rolling mills.

The holdup occurred as the messenger was crossing the street from the postoffice to the bank. President Godd and Cashier Frazier witnessed the robbery from a side door of the bank and fired on the robbers, wounding one of them. The bandit fell from the touring car, but the auto stopped and the wounded man was helped in and the car drove away.

American Legion Posts Meeting In Eastland Tonight

More than 190 legionnaires are expected to attend the meeting tonight at the American Legion Athletic club in Eastland when eight American Legion posts, composing the Oil Belt council, meet here. The posts that are members of the Oil Belt council are: Cleve, Eastland, Ranger, German, Dresden, Straw, Breckenridge and J. Hany.

The Duna-Danels post of Eastland will provide the dinner for the occasion this evening and the Desdemona post will furnish the entertainment. Elaborate plans have been made for the affair, according to local members of the legion.

FIVE THOUSAND BASS ADDED TO COLONY NOW GROWING IN OLDEN LAKE

Five thousand bass from the government fish hatchery at San Marcos, Texas, were placed in the Oil Belt Power company's lake, south of Olden, a few days ago. This is the second or third time that large numbers of game fish have been placed in this lake and there should be plenty of good fishing there within the next two or three years. At the present fishing for bass is prohibited there.

QUAIL AND PHEASANT PROPAGATION IN TEXAS GIVEN ENCOURAGEMENT

AUSTIN, April 25.—Wild quail and pheasants will be greatly increased in Texas by next hunting season, under the restricting plan now being carried out by the state game department and ranchmen cooperating with the department.

Game now being brought in is being placed in posted sections of the state, the growing flocks gradually scattering over a greater territory later.

Approximately 500 quail have been liberated on St. Joe's island, five miles off mainland at Rockport, by Dr. Frank Kent of San Antonio, who is opening under a state game permit. Dr. Kent has leased the 50,000-acre island to be used as a propagating field, the young to be trapped and distributed over the mainland.

The department has purchased several thousand quail in Mexico and will be liberated on large Texas ranches, it was announced.

During the spring and summer, 15,000 pheasants will be imported and released as the nucleus for stocking the state.

TWO BALLOONS MAY BE NEAR GREAT LAKES

Honeywell and Von Orman Believed Already Beyond Best Previous American Record.

SAN ANTONIO, April 25.—The balloon "Detroit," piloted by Herbert Von Thaden, was forced out of the national elimination race at 4 o'clock Friday morning, landing five miles southeast of Dubuque, Iowa, according to a telegram received here from Von Thaden. The balloon was aloft 34 hours and 10 minutes and covered about 1100 miles.

The Kansas City, piloted by Capt. H. E. Honeywell, and the Goodyear III, piloted by Ward T. Von Orman, had not been heard from late this morning. They are believed to have drifted northeast of the great lake region, and to be already beyond the 1,172.9 mile mark, which is the present American record.

Balloons Remaining In Air Likely To Be In Storm Grip

CHICAGO, April 25.—The balloons that left San Antonio Wednesday in an endurance contest are probably caught in a storm that is sweeping the middle west if they are still in the air, the weather bureau here said today. A storm of considerable intensity is sweeping in a general northerly direction from Iowa and its shifting winds may drive the balloons eastward if caught in the center, or blow them into the northwest, if they are on the outer edge, the bureau stated.

ARMY BALLOON COMES DOWN IN IOWA NEAR MINNESOTA

AKRON, Ohio, April 25.—Major Norman W. Peck, piloting army balloon No. 1, landed at St. Ansgar, near Mason City, Iowa, and the Minnesota state line, at 2 o'clock this morning, according to a message received by his wife, who is here. By scaling the map, it is shown that Major Peck traveled about 975 miles, the longest distance reached by any of the balloons that has yet landed.

ONE BALLOON SAILS ON PASSING WEBSTER CITY

WEBSTER CITY, Iowa, April 25.—One of the balloons in the national elimination contest passed over here about midnight, going in a northeasterly direction. The big bag was drifting at a height of about 1,000 feet, and although it carried no light, it was easily seen in the bright moonlight.

BALLOONS HAVE ROUGH GOING BEYOND KANSAS CITY

KANSAS CITY, April 25.—Rough going was experienced during the night by the four balloons remaining in the national elimination contest which started Wednesday afternoon from San Antonio, Texas. The huge bags which floated over Kansas City and vicinity at dusk last night were being driven northeast by good breezes. They encountered stormy weather as they proceeded towards the Great Lakes. The skies were overcast, with occasional showers and electrical disturbances and the wind was shifting.

It was figured out that the balloons would all be over the Great Lakes region this morning if they remained aloft during the night.

ALEX IN OKLAHOMA IS FLOODED BY DOWNPOUR

CHICKASHA, Okla., April 25.—The town of Alex, 15 miles southeast of here, is under water due to a heavy rain last night, estimated at from five to six inches. The water stands from one to four feet deep and has flooded practically every business house in town.

Rock Island trains were detouring here today as the result of 40 feet of track being washed away by torrential rains south of Duncan.

RISING STAR PIONEER DIES

RISING STAR, April 25.—J. H. "Dad" Carter, 75, died here Wednesday from the effects of Bright's disease. He had been a citizen of Eastland county 30 years, having moved here from Haskell, Texas, in 1894. He is survived by his widow and four sons, as follows: Al and Jess of Rising Star; Elmo of Tennessee and W. B. of Fort Worth.

Storm Warnings Are Hoisted All Along Texas Gulf Coast

HOUSTON, April 25.—Storm warnings were ordered hoisted along the Texas gulf coast, according to word reaching here from New Orleans today.

The disturbance is passing over the lower Rio Grande the warning said, and is moving northeast. South and southeast squalls will come tonight or Saturday.

PRISON BARS FAIL TO HOLD 'SLIPPERY DELL'

Fourteen "Bad" Men Break From Jail at Denver, Notorious Highwayman Leading.

DENVER, Colo., April 25.—Fourteen prisoners in the county jail here held up their guards and escaped during the night in a heavy snow storm. Guns had been smuggled into the prison for use of the prisoners in holding up the guards.

Leading the escape was "Slippery Dell" Hanlon, elusive St. Paul bandit, and his two companions, Herman E. Herbert and Thomas Edwards, all convicted last week of highway robbery and sentenced to the penitentiary for from 10 years to life imprisonment. Only one of those who gained freedom was a minor offender, the others being charged with highway robbery, burglary and criminal assault. One of those who escaped returned voluntarily, but the others were still at large this morning.

A report was received this morning from a point in the eastern part of Colorado that an automobile containing four men, one of them Hanlon, had been pursued and fired on by a sheriff's posse, but made a getaway.

Frank Conlon, recently arrested in Omaha as a member of a large interstate burglary ring, was among those who broke out of jail. It is believed the get-away had long been planned by Hanlon, who got the name "Slippery" because of the difficulty in capturing and holding him. During his trial he appeared unconcerned and smiled when a penitentiary sentence was imposed on him.

Deposed Officers Willing To Let the Records Determine

Joe Calder, former deputy sheriff of Eastland county, today ridiculed the statement emanating from courthouse circles at Eastland that his discharge from the sheriff's department could be based on "general inefficiency."

"Let those who say it is true, look at my record in the justice of peace court here," Calder told a reporter. "I have gone over the records and here is how I stand," he said, producing a record of the number of arrests he and John Anderson, also deposed as deputy sheriff, had made since they were given commissions by Sheriff Barton.

According to the figures on the paper, Calder had made 42 arrests between Nov. 10 and last Tuesday, when his commission was taken away from him. Anderson's figures showed, had made 29 between January, 1923 and April 22, 1924, although the latter has served as deputy only on and off during that time.

Calder said he had received word in advance that he was to be deposed, but was not officially aware of it until Tuesday. He blamed the loss of his commission on the arrest of a man from Staff in the city of Ranger a short time ago on a misdemeanor charge.

GIRLS BLAME BARBER FOR BEING INTOXICATED

DALLAS, April 25.—Two girls detained on charges of being intoxicated charged the barber who bobbed their hair drugged them with a strange powder which he placed on their hair. They denied they had been drinking.

UNDERWOOD TO MAKE TOUR OF LEADING TEXAS CITIES

DALLAS, April 25.—Oscar Underwood, democratic candidate for president, will make a tour of leading Texas cities next week, according to Major Oliver Newman, his assistant campaign manager. Newman, who is here arranging Underwood's schedule, said that it was his opinion McAdoo's connection with the Do-heny interests and tax cases makes him unavailable, and was confident Underwood would capture at least a share of Texas delegates.

DEATH ATTENDS SWIRLING FORCE OF THE WINDS

Boy Killed, Two Others Probably Dying and Others Injured When Houses Destroyed.

AUSTIN, April 25.—The 5-year-old son of John Henkle was instantly killed and Henkle himself and his young daughter probably fatally injured, and a dozen negro farm hands also injured in a cyclone which swept the southeastern part of Travis county early today.

Several farm houses in the little settlements of Colton and Carl, 12 miles southeast of Austin, were demolished and a number of barns and a large quantity of fencing wrecked in the territory between the two settlements.

The Henkle family lived at Colton. Their house was blown completely away. Henkle's youngest boy was killed instantly and a little daughter is reported dying from injuries. Henkle suffered a broken back and probably was fatally hurt. The other members of the family escaped.

Several negroes at Carl were injured. The storm originated a short distance from that place, moving in a northeasterly direction from Colton. Eight negro farm hands in Colton and vicinity were injured, some seriously.

Austin felt the effect of the tornado here for several hours. More than two inches of rain fell in less than an hour, washing out roads and streets, damaging fruit trees and beating down young gardens. It was accompanied by whirlwinds.

Senate Begins Work Of Whittling Away Tax Reduction Bill

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The senate today began to whittle away on the tax bill, lopping off some of the principal items, recommended by Secretary of Treasury Mellon. The treasury department's recommendations were ignored when an amendment revising the bill so that capital losses might be deducted from tax returns was adopted.

The senate also set a 12 1/2 per cent tax on gains from transfer of stock dividends in liquidation of corporations, by adopting the senate committee amendment without objection.

Income and surtax schedule was passed over for the time being and will be brought out after the rest of the bill has been completed. Irrigation companies and co-operative telephone companies would be exempt from corporation taxes in adopting the committee's amendment.

The new corporation tax of 14 per cent on all corporations was passed over. The committee's recommendation for a 12 1/2 per cent tax on all domestic and foreign life insurance companies operating in the United States was adopted.

FRENCHMAN FLIES FROM PARIS TO BUCHAREST IN FIRST OF SEVERAL HOPS

PARIS, April 25.—Lieut. Pelletier D'Orsy, who flew a French military airplane from Villa Coublay here at dawn Thursday, successfully completed a non-stop flight to Bucharest, it was officially admitted today. The flight is the first leg of a series of 1,740-mile jumps destined to take the airplane to Japan in a world record time to demonstrate France's superiority of the air.

ATWOOD FOUND GUILTY

The jury in the Harry Atwood case brought in a verdict of guilty today. Atwood, who was charged with possessing whisky, was tried in the Ninety-first district court, commencing all day Wednesday and a portion of Thursday. The case was given to the jury about 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon. He was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

FRENCH CONSULT MORGAN ABOUT LOAN TO GERMANY

PARIS, April 25.—J. P. Morgan, the American banker, will be consulted this afternoon with reference to a loan to Germany, as recommended in the Daves' report. Morgan is due this afternoon from Venice, where his yacht is at anchor after a cruise in the Mediterranean.

The conference with the French officials will be private and unofficial, but the proposed loan will be the subject discussed and it will be squarely up to the New York banker.

LOWER RENTS ON THE WAY.
A nation-wide survey indicates a time not far ahead when present building activity will overtake housing deficits left by the war, with an inevitable drop from peak rentals and a decrease of inflated property values as a result. This is the sum of testimony found in reports from 46 American cities selected from all over the United States.

A survey, conducted by the Christian Science Monitor, shows that agents and speculators are holding premises vacant rather than accept the inevitable decline. Quarterly building totals recently prepared, in a national survey, show an increase of building in New York state and northern New Jersey of 77 per cent over last year; southeastern states, 12 per cent increase; New England, 10 per cent increase; central west, 2 per cent decrease; Pittsburg district, 16 per cent decrease; middle Atlantic states, 13 per cent decrease; northwest, 30 per cent decrease.

Rents have fallen recently in 10 cities, have increased in three, and are stable, but at high levels throughout the industrial east. In the south, more than anywhere else, building seems to have overtaken the shortage. Outside of New York, in 36 eastern states, representing seven-eighths of the country's total construction, recent business surveys show a slight decrease in building over the high mark of last year, indicating that the balancing point between supply and demand is being neared. In nearly all cities real estate men are looking ahead to the time when the "to let" sign will again be hung out.

NEW REPUBLIC OF GREECE
The Greek national plebiscite proceeded generally according to anticipations, and there is little reason to doubt that the final figures will show two to one majority in favor of a republic. The new government is attempting to set an example of toleration and good will, and wishes that brotherly sentiments should supersede all others. In response the opposition is using moderate language and wishes that the republic may peacefully achieve its mission, against which it promises to raise no obstacles.

The republic will elect a president very soon. The choice will rest between Theodore Zaimis and Admiral Condouriotis. Both are most admirable statesmen who enjoy universal respect but it is probable that Mr. Zaimis, thanks to his superior experiences and consistent absence from party politics, will be offered the office.

THERE'S NO GLORY IN WAR.
Dr. David Starr Jordan, president of Stanford university, takes a decided stand against the militarists who would instruct the students of the nation in the art of war. Dr. Jordan asserts that "public opinion must become as high and as fine as is most private opinion as to the necessity for perpetual peace. In the schools of today, is the hope of the future."

Education is the only certain way out of the present dilemma. The present generation controls the immediate future, but little children control the long future. Both must be educated, and the best line of education for peace is in the study of history. War should be taught as it is and not glorified.

TEXAS INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET WILL BE THE LARGEST EVER HELD IN U. S., IN NUMBER OF SCHOOLS REPRESENTED

AUSTIN, April 25.—Preparations are being rapidly completed at the University of Texas for holding the fourteenth annual state meet of the University Interscholastic league, which is scheduled to begin next Thursday at 2 p. m., when the tennis tournament begins.

The representative character of this meet is emphasized in a statement by Roy Bedichek, head of the league, in which he points out that full delegations from El Paso, Texas, Brownsville and Dalhart are entered, thus including the four tips of the state. In point of the number of schools, number of events listed and the area represented, this is the largest meet of its kind ever held in the United States, according to his statement.

Special Fare Rate
All Texas lines have granted one

and one-half fare rate to this meet on the identification certificate plan. Certificates are being mailed from the league office to all qualified delegates.

The Panhandle delegation will come on a special train, arriving in Austin Thursday morning. The train will be in charge of the district directors of districts Nos. 1, 2 and 3. D. A. Shirley, Canyon; Supt. M. M. Dupree, Lubbock and Supt. R. D. Green, Abilene.

Fifteen hundred dollars worth of cups and medals will be awarded to the winning contestants, in the various events of this meet.

A suspension of classes of the university is ordered for that day to allow the faculty members to serve as judges and officials in the meet. More than 300 judges are required in the first preliminaries in debate and declamation on Friday morning

Methodist General Conference Has Big Problems To Solve

By United Press.
CHICAGO, April 24.—The general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, which will be held in May at Springfield, Mass., is expected to draw 850 delegates from all parts of the United States and 44 foreign nations and territories. The conference will legislate for 4,774,500 members of the church in the world. Half of the delegates are ministers and half laymen.

One subject for discussion at the forthcoming conference will be the union of the Methodist Episcopal Church South. If the plan is accepted by the conference the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, which normally meets

in 1925, will probably be called in special session to consider the plan. Acceptance by that body will make the plan effective. Large sections of the membership of each of the two churches are in favor of unification.

Another question to be reviewed by the conference is the status of the Episcopacy. The entire system of Episcopal supervision will be considered.

The entire organization is to be considered. Several plans have been discussed and a commission appointed to study the question. The general conference will decide whether the present 10 highly specialized boards will be combined into a single general board with many departments or left as they are.

The transmission line is 76 miles long, from Readsboro, Vt., to Millbury, Mass. The total cost of dam, power house and transmission line will be about \$10,000,000.

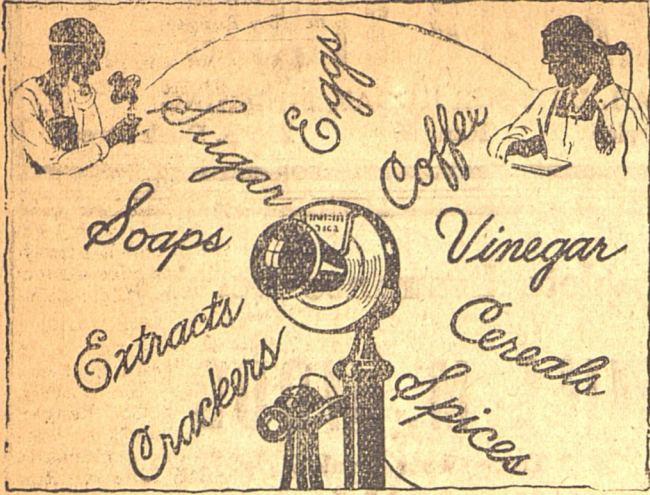

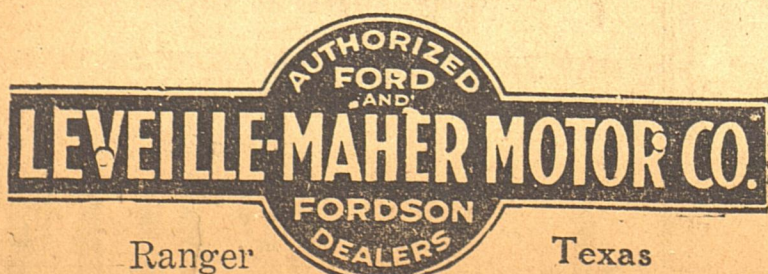

U. S. CRUDE OIL OUTPUT DECLINES

Daily average gross crude oil production in the United States decreased 21,000 barrels for the week ended April 19, over the week of April 12, it is shown in the summary of the American Petroleum Institute, issued in New York Thursday. The daily average production for the week is given at 1,932,350 barrels. California production was given as 645,900 barrels, a decrease of 14,200 barrels over the institute figures for the week before. Production east of the Rockies was estimated at 1,187,050 barrels, a decrease of 6,800. The institute differs with practically every newspaper and trade journal estimate in assigning Oklahoma and Wyoming-Montana decreases, though all showing reports which are really based on the week of April 19 show decreases for the country as a whole.

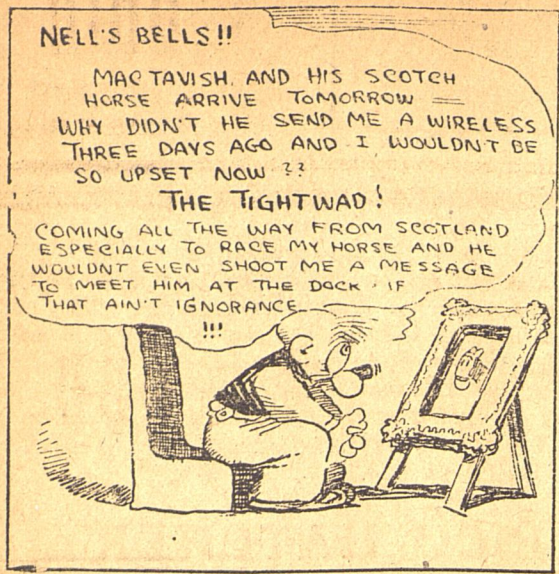

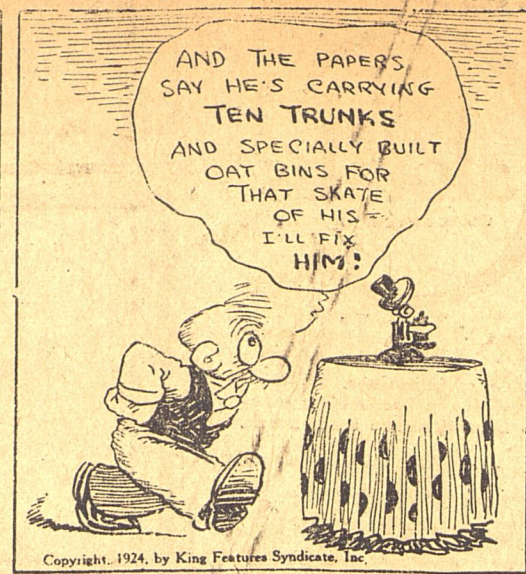

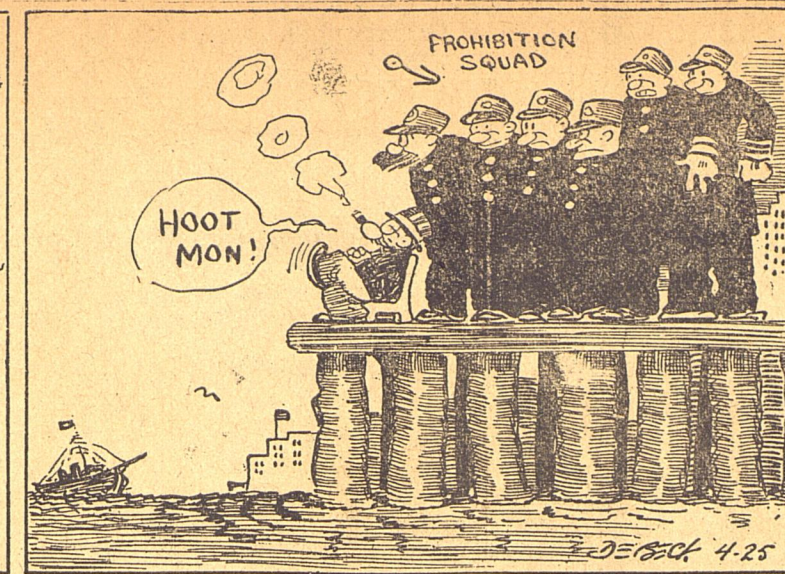

Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

Nature has provided that the development of the young animal, or the young human, shall be by physical exercise. With children, as with all young animals, this exercise is best and most naturally secured through the influence of play.

It is interesting to note that some of the most profound of our philosophers, as Prof. Max Muller, have shown that many of the games indulged in by children are well-nigh universal, and have their origin in remote antiquity.

It is not at all improbable that the child of the cave-man, a half a million years ago, played "tag," "ring around rosie," "leap frog and blind man's bluff." The same is true of his modern descendants in India, in Alaska, in New York City, or in any hamlet in the country.

It is interesting to note that "tag," and various games which involve wrestling and mimic combat are a part of the natural education of young animals, as well as of young humans.

"Old-fashioned," homey "romps" are excellent exercise for children and parents. Games of "bear," "pussy wants a corner," "hide and seek," etc., are both play and exercise, and are valuable for all ages, if grown-ups can lose their "dignity" sufficiently to take part in them.

"For-out-of-door exercise there should be, if possible, a sand pile for the younger children. Swings are also good for exercise, and can be put in the outside doorway, or in the porch, if necessary. A few ticks, or boxes, spoons and wheels, or a cart, wheelbarrow wagon, a kiddie car, velocipede, roller skates, ice skates, sleds—any of these will give the children of various ages the right kind of play exercise.

For a child will derive a vast amount of amusement and healthy exercise, too, from a bow and arrow, a wooden gun, or a hammer and saw. Marbles and tops get a child out of doors, and are valuable toys.

It can readily be seen that these exercises are of a wholesome, developing character, calculated not only to ensure bodily perfection, so far as muscular development is concerned, but to cultivate the admirable traits of quickness, dexterity and courage.

LONGHORNS WIN RELAY RACE BY EXCELLENT TEAM WORK

AUSTIN, April 24.—Mistaking of Captain Richard McNatt of the Longhorns, who was badly crippled, for Jim Reese, the sensational runner, by the other teams entered in the Kansas medley relay race at Lawrence enabled the University of Texas to win first place and lower the world's record, in the opinion of Coach Clyde Littlefield.

There were 11 teams entered in the medley race at Kansas, including Northwestern university, Grinnell college, University of Iowa, University of Kansas, Creighton university, Kansas State, Iowa State, Drake university, University of Nebraska and Oklahoma A. & M.

Coach Littlefield tells the following account of the race:

"George Ritchie ran the first distance for the Longhorns. Before the game he was extremely nervous and during the race twice broke his stride. Despite his nervous condition, he ran the race in good time but there were several men ahead of him.

"On the takeoff Kenneth Hackler gained about 10 yards on his opponents. He ran the race in good time, too, but at the last of his lap somebody darted ahead of him.

"Again we gained on the takeoff, Captain McNatt being all set. Here was where we won the meet for the other teams thought McNatt was Jim Reese. The result was they let McNatt set the pace, though he was severely crippled on account of his ankle. They continued to let him set the pace for the first two laps and then in the third passed ahead of him. Had he not been permitted to set the pace, we would have lost out.

"Jim Reese started the last race far behind. There were about six men ahead of him. Reese let the other boys set the pace for the first two laps. In the third lap he ran at top speed, easily passing all opponents, and finishing fully 50 yards ahead of his nearest competitor."
