Canada Has Unique Map On Exhibit In STRIKE IN ARGENTINE Display At London

Canada's contribution to the British Empire exposition is a very com-plete and most informative map of the dominion. It tells all about the natural resources and physical fea-tures of the country in a way no map has ever told it before

It was prepared at Ottawa by the Canadian department of the interior Canadian department of the interior in co-operation with the Canadian Pacific railway. The map is 10 feet high and 28 feet long, and is illuminated by more than 1,100 electric lamps. It is made of steel and was shipped to England in eight sections. The actual map is painted on the steel in permanent colors, with all steel in permanent colors, with all the rivers, lakes, cities, transporta-

tion lines, boundaries and territories marked in the customary way. The unique feature is that every spot where a certain natural product is found or an industry is in existence, it is illuminated with electric lights of distinctve colors.

For instance, a small white electric light indicates the presence of water power; green light indicates pulp wood—purple, cooper—brown, tim-ber and so on. Larger lamps indicate the cities, and each railway system is shown by means of a series of perforations in different colors. The lighting system is quite intri-

cate, each natural resource of industry unit being operated separately, so that if a visitor wishes to see where copper is to be found in Canada, the official in charge of the map simply presses the button and immediately every place where copper has been found is illuminated. During this process all the other lights are extinguished.
At one side of the map is an illu-

minated index on which is given the key color of each industry and re-source, while at the oposite side an indicator gives the statistics for the specified products. This man drew such crowds around



SIMPLIFICATION OF SPARK PLUCS URGED

That the present wide diversity in size and dimensions of automobile spark plugs is the cause of much waste in production and distribution of these commodities has been brought out by several spark plug manufacturers, who have suggested the desirabality of reduced variety of the division of simplified practice of the department of commerce.

The consensus of opinion shown by their letters is that the present variety could be appreciably reduced with resulting benefit to the spark plug manufacturer, the car builder, the accessory and supply dealer, and also to the car owner. Plugs, though now made in many different designs, are furnishing in four principal diameters, no one of which is interchangeable with another. In addition to this diversity, each diameter is made in a number of different "hex." The majority of those replying to the inquiry favor reduction, not only in these features, but also in the diameters. Some go so far as to recommend spark plugs be simplified to one size thread, one ize of threaded shank, one length of plug body, and one size of hexagon. It is claimed this can be done without destroying the individuality of

the different makes of spark plugs. Several of the manufacturers say one such plug could be adopted by all engineers. Adoption of the S. A. E. standard 7-8-inch spark plug, with its 18 threads per inch (U. S. fine thread series), is recommended in only three lengths, known as "regular," "medium extension," and "full extension," to serve all motor


