

## CHANGE OF VENUE DENIED ROAD COMPANY ENFORCEMENT PLANS MAY CHANGE

### WOULD DIVORCE CUSTOM BUREAU FROM PRO. FORCE

**Senators Smoot and Representative Green Given Bill Recommended By Coolidge.**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—A drastic reorganization of the treasury department that would divorce prohibition and custom administration and place them in separate bureaus within the department was proposed to congress today by secretary of the Treasury Mellon.

The changes were embodied in a bill transmitted by Secretary Mellon to Senator Smoot of Utah, Republican and Representative W. R. Green of Iowa, also Republican, for introduction in their respective houses. The bill was introduced in the senate by Smoot at once. The measure has the approval of President Coolidge and Budget Director Lord.

The prohibition proposal culminates a long period of administrative re-organization, which has been going on under Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews during the past year. The divorcement of the prohibition enforcement from the internal revenue bureau, where the dries have felt it was in unsympathetic hands, finally completes the coordination of prohibition, custom and coast guards which Andrews has been gradually affecting.

Andrews in the capacity of assistant secretary of the treasury will be the direct head of all three services.

### FARM COURSE IS PLANNED FOR RANGER

Hundreds of Eastland county people are expected to attend the farmer's short course to be held in Ranger at the high school auditorium, in the very near future.

Through the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce, Eastland county farmers are to have the privilege of a farmers' short course that is being put on in various parts of the state by the International Harvester company.

This will be a two days' course and will cover the subjects of live stock, poultry, farm management, home economics, health and education. Lectures will be illustrated by motion pictures. It is probably that there will be three daily meetings, during which time some splendid speakers will make addresses, and there will be music furnished by the High school band and glee club of Ranger, at intervals.

**College Graduates.**

Each speaker out of the state will be a college and university graduate, and can speak on the different subjects they will handle from years of experience in actual farming, home demonstration and in their present capacities.

The subjects to be discussed will be chosen so as to apply to Eastland county condition as much as possible. Themes of soil conservation, the value of stock on the farms, the importance of poultry raising, boys' and girls' club work and co-operation in community affairs, will be some of the messages the speakers will bring to their hearers.

Poultry raising which already has a strong foothold in Eastland county will be given a boost. The diseases of fruit and shade trees will be gone into, in fact every problem that confronts the farmers of Eastland county will be taken up, discussed and helpful advice given. This will be the first short course held in Eastland county and it's by far the biggest thing that has been brought here in many years. It deserves the greatest enthusiasm and boosting.

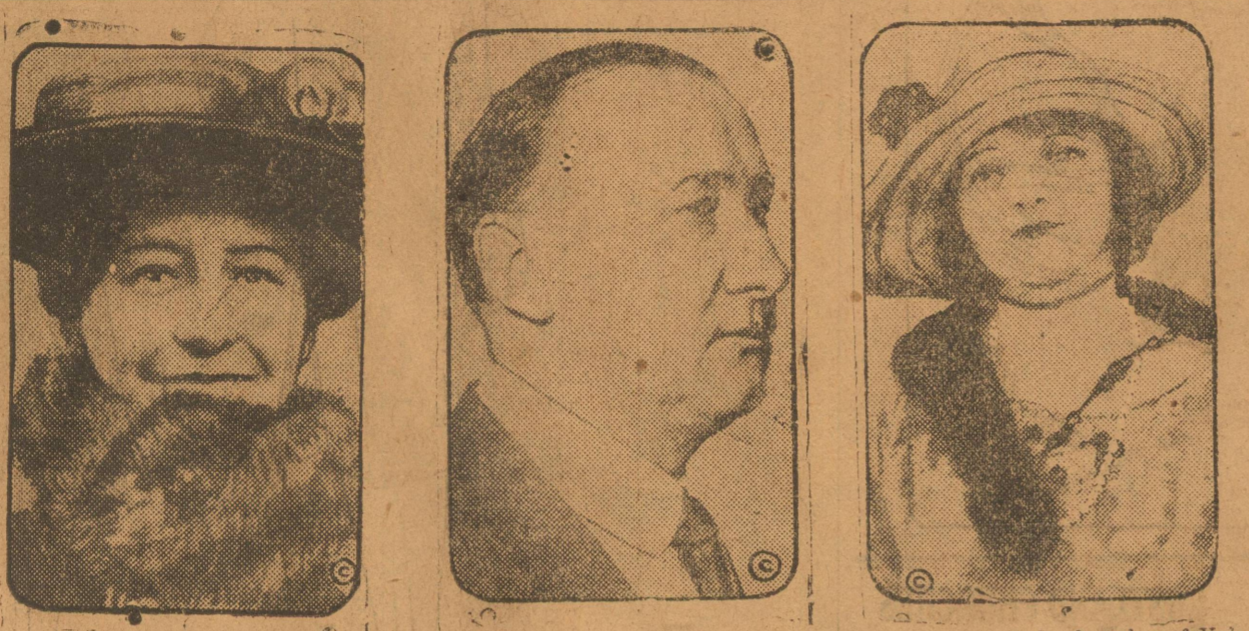
In Snyder when the course was held there, approximately 7,000 persons were in attendance. Reports from there state, it was unlike any previous experience and that the crowds increased daily.

### RISING STAR GETS HUMBLE GAS FACTORY

RISING STAR, Feb. 6.—The announcement, recently made, that the Humble Oil & Refining Company would establish offices in Rising Star, build a gasoline plant near the city and drill a number of wells in this section, caused increased activities in all branches of the oil industry here.

Land has been purchased by the Humble from Ed Kilgore for a site for their proposed gasoline plant, which, it is stated, will be a large one and modern in every respect. The company has also taken a number of leases in this section.

Two new locations have recently been made by the Humble Company offsetting the Stover well South of Rising Star, one is on the J. C. Kilgore tract and the other on the Tom Hodnett place. Drilling is to be started on these as soon as possible.

Meredith, Thomas & Reynolds of Fort Worth has announced a location for a deep test on the Dr. G. T. Patterson tract 2 1/2 miles southwest of Rising Star and some four miles nearer town than the Stover well.

The Roberts Oil Company is drilling on their well recently sudded in on the Ed Smith farm one mile southeast of the Stover.

The Kilgore well, drilled by Pete Hoffman, was shot last Friday and the hole is standing 700 feet in oil, it is stated.

Anderson & Shultz No. 1 Frank Dunn is drilling at around 1,000 feet.

The Carl Barnes post of the American Legion topped the world's record today when it bid in the special Texas, Stone Mountain Memorial Coin, No. 159, at \$263.00. This is the highest price paid by any city in the United States today.

He told the United Press representative that he and his wife are going to Paris and are planning to stay there indefinitely.

The fact that the couple are going to join their daughter in Paris was considered by many to be proof that they have become reconciled after their year of feud, during which the Stillman divorce action was tried, and the paternity of baby Guy Stillman denied. The baby played a big part in the trial of the case and caused a general furore over the country.

AUSTIN, Feb. 6.—No announcement has yet come from Governor Ferguson as to what business is to be considered by the State Text Book Commission, which has been called to meet in Austin next Tuesday.

The commission is expected to consider the contract awarded to the American Book company last October. The contract has not received recognition from State Superintendent of Public Instruction S. M. N. Marrs.

### 3 NEGROES CONFESS TO DALLAS DEED

DALLAS, Feb. 6.—Three negroes confessed today they were in the automobile from which was fired the shot that killed Motor Patrolman C. Marshall Isbell, according to the police.

The shot was fired, their confession stated, by a fourth negro, who has not been apprehended. The negroes said, they were returning from a "Choo" beer party and that when the officers approached them the fourth member of the bunch rose up and fired without issuing a warning.

Isbell was fatally shot last Thursday night when he attempted to halt a large touring car which was suspected of carrying thugs that had been committing robberies in the small towns near Dallas.

Within the past week four towns have been visited and looted by a gang of bandits that are supposed to be operating out of Dallas.

Since the confession of the trio, the police believe that it will be but a few days before they will have the fourth negro under arrest.

### POLICE FACE MYSTERY OF TWO BODIES

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Feb. 6.—Another mystery of the Wild Shore country around Eagle Park, a resort near here, confounded the police today. The bodies of Homer Honecett, constable of Edwardsville and John Blake of the same town were found on top of the other in a hastily dug grave near the resort. The find was made late yesterday afternoon.

It is the current opinion here that these last victims were killed by "hoodlums" who were seeking revenge for the activity displayed by the constable in running down violators of the prohibition law.

DALLAS, Feb. 6.—A telegram urging delay in the selection of a new president of the College of Industrial Arts was sent to Governor Marim A. Ferguson, ex-officio member of the board, by the Dallas club women today.

A successor to Dr. Lindsey Blayney is to be named Feb. 10 at the next session of the Board of Regents at Fort Worth.

### Movie Star Killed; Two Others Hurt In Auto Accident

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 6.—Mrs. H. Prevost, mother of Marie Prevost, motion picture star was killed and Al Christie, comedy producer and Vera Steadman, actress were seriously injured in an auto accident, 23 miles East of Lordsburg, N. M., according to advices received here today.

### RANGERS TAKE PART IN HUNT FOR YEGG BAND

**Bullet Ridden Auto and Acetylene Gas Tanks Indentified By The Sheriff of Johnson County.**

DALLAS, Feb. 6.—Ranger Captain Tom Hickman and Sergeant Stewart Stanley were here today conferring with the Dallas officers and the sheriff of Johnson county in connection with their investigation of the Venus double bank robbery Thursday.

An acetylene gas tank cap was found in an abandoned bullet-riddled motor car Friday in the Trinity river bottoms. The car and cap were identified by the sheriff of Johnson county as those used in burning holes in the outer vault of the Venus bank.

The bandits had left the caps of the tanks behind them. A gang of six bandits is believed to be methodically working in North Texas, looting about one village a week. Four North Texas towns have been ransacked and robbed recently.

### JURY AWARDS \$15,000 IN MELOY SUIT

J. P. Meloy of Eastland was given a judgment for \$15,000 against C. J. Rhodes, also of Eastland, for the alienation of the affections of Mrs. J. P. Meloy, by a jury in Judge Elzo Been's court Saturday afternoon. The case was submitted on special issues and every question was answered by the jury in favor of the plaintiff. Meloy asked for \$100,000.

### PRESIDENT GIVES FRIED NAVY MEDAL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—President Coolidge today awarded the much prized navy cross to Lieutenant George Fried of the naval reserves commanding officer of the steamer President Roosevelt for courageous seamanship upon the high seas in his rescue of the crew on the British steamer, Antione.

### REVENUE FUND IN TREASURY IS \$300,000

AUSTIN, Feb. 6.—The general revenue fund of the state treasury at the close of business February 5 had a balance of approximately \$300,000 in the treasury, it was announced today by Treasurer W. G. Hatcher.

The treasury, however, is still owing the reserve depository banks in Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth approximately a million dollars for warrants they are carrying for him to keep the state off a deficiency, he said.

### Need Federal Aid In Building Roads Says Congressman

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Scrapping the federal aid policy for road building, as proposed by critics of government co-operation on highway construction, would be nothing short of a national disaster, Senator Simon D. Fess, Ohio, republican, declared today.

"Such a move would destroy the principle underlying the building of a highway system on a plane sufficiently broad to meet not only transportation needs, but also to assure the social and economic cohesion of the country," Fess declared.

Fess said that the government is not spending too much money for highways and that instead the country interstate roads are lagging behind the gigantic requirements of highway transportation.

### Beauty Parlor To Pay \$750 Damages For Burning Curl

SHREVEPORT, Feb. 6.—A beauty parlor today was ordered by the court to pay Mrs. Marion H. Tierney \$750 damages for a lock of hair claimed to have been burned from her head during the process of making a permanent wave.

Mrs. Tierney sued the beauty parlor operator for \$2,000 damages.

### TWO PRODUCERS BIG FEATURE IN THE PAST WEEK

The increase of 25 cents a barrel in the price of crude oil during the past week was easily the outstanding development of recent weeks in the petroleum industry. Besides adding \$65,000 a month to the revenue of the landowners and well owners in Eastland county, the advance has stimulated activities.

Two producers, with no dry holes, were brought in during the week in Eastland county.

Low Teatsworth of Eastland, and associates completed the No. 8 Scott, in the Olden district midway between Eastland and Ranger, for 160 barrels at 1,510 feet. This well ranks among the best in the history of the shallow pool.

The Hooch Producing & Development Company's No. 1 Kimbro was the other completion in the county. It is making 5,000,000 feet of gas at 3,180 feet.

Coleman Wildcat

The sensation of the week of the North Central Texas field was contributed by the bringing in of a rank wildcat in Coleman county—the No. 1 Dibrel of H. G. Gwinapp, which is making 100 barrels at 1,885 feet. Coleman is swarming with oil men and all the other "camp followers" of an oil boom. Hotels are crowded and at meal hours, it is necessary to stand until a seat is vacated in the cafes.

### GAS OPERATOR BADLY BURNED NEAR EASTLAND

L. B. Cooper, operator for the Consolidated Gasoline Company, was painfully burned about the hands and face when he attempted to extinguish a fire that broke out in an auxiliary room at the company's plant, about one mile from Eastland, last night between 7:30 and 8 o'clock. Cooper was brought to the Eastland sanitarium for treatment but was moved to his home early in the evening. His burns are not considered serious.

The Eastland fire department was soon at the scene with the chemical engine, but had to make a second run with the pumper before the flames were extinguished.

Fire is thought to have originated from defective wiring and the damage to the plant is estimated at about \$2,500 to \$3,000.

The burned man was on duty when the fire broke out, and did all he could to keep the flames from spreading.

### JURY RENDERS VERDICT IN A FEW MINUTES

**Seven Hours Is Consumed In Hearing Arguments; Juror Is Struck Down By Motorcycle.**

AUSTIN, Feb. 6.—Within 30 minutes after it retired, the jury in the Hoffman Construction company's case returned a verdict in favor of the state, which means that Attorney General Dan Moody's suit against the company will be tried in Travis county on its merits. The Hoffman company on a plea of privilege sought to have the case moved to Eastland county.

It is a victory for Attorney General Dan Moody who alleged in his petition that the contract awarded the Hoffman Construction company was a fraudulent transaction. The defendants will appeal the case to the Third Court of Civil Appeals at Austin.

Under the charge of the court, the jury was to answer the question, if the facts and evidence showed probable fraud on the part of the Hoffman Construction company in securing the contract from the State Highway Commission?

**Court Room Packed**

The Hoffman Construction company contended that it had the right of trial in the county of its domicile, Eastland county. It denied the allegations made in the Attorney General's petition that the award of the contract was a fraudulent transaction. Fraud was the only issue in the trial and the burden of proof was on the state. Seven hours were consumed in presenting the arguments to the jury. The court room was packed to capacity all day.

During the ten minutes recess taken at 4 o'clock this afternoon, an accident happened to O. J. Clements of Austin, a member of the jury. This temporarily halted the argument, and for a time it appeared as if adjournment would have to be taken until Monday.

**Juror Struck Down**

Clements with four other jurors had left the court house and started across the street to a coffee shop, when Clements was struck down to the pavement by a motorcycle. He was unconscious when picked up and was rushed to an emergency hospital. He soon recovered consciousness. An examination revealed that he was only stunned. He returned to the court room and arguments were resumed.

"The return of these indictments is a dark page in the history of Travis county, it is nothing less than a tragedy," John B. McRae declared in his argument. "Hoffman" is guilty of no wrong, McRae continued. The instruments were prepared by the State Highway department and Hoffman signed them as being correct as any other road contractor would have done.

**Politics Alleged**

The assertion that the State had inserted politics into the trial of the plea of privilege hearing of the Hoffman Construction company by mentioning the name of former Governor James E. Ferguson in the testimony of W. T. Montgomery, a San Antonio road contractor was made by Attorney Earl Connor in the first remark he made in the opening argument for the defense this morning. Montgomery had testified that in a conversation with F. V. Lanham, at the time Lanham was chief of the State Highway commission, Lanham told him that Jim Ferguson was responsible for the letting of the contract to the American Road company, and that he, Lanham, had nothing to do with making the award.

Connor told the jury that this testimony was irrelevant and should not have been permitted to go into the records. He maintained that the defendant in this case had the right to a fair and impartial trial. The case was given to the jury late in the afternoon.

### "Jimmie" O'Brien Is Laid to Rest As He Would Desire

EL PASO, Feb. 6.—They buried "Jimmie" O'Brien today, the way he would have liked, not that it was the costliest coffin that ever entered St. Patrick's cathedral, or that thousands stood by the bier, or that a cortege of automobiles three miles long followed him on his last ride, but because friends in tears trickled down the cheeks of friends as they paid him a last homage. Big strong men, who had known Jimmie O'Brien were not ashamed of the tears that coursed down the wrinkles of their faces.

### Herbert the Giant Killer



**PREPARE YOURSELF WEST TEXAS.**

West Texas must be prepared to take care of the vast army of home seekers that are to come to this section within the next year or two. She must be ready to receive the newcomers that are to develop this section agriculturally and industrially. The hidden resources that are worth billions and will add billions to the wealth of this great commonwealth are in the soil and beneath the surface. Eastland and surrounding counties are in the region that will be favored by the new citizen when he makes his visit here.

Preparation means ample housing facilities, good schools and good churches with paved roads radiating to all communities from the leading centers. Good schools, churches and houses are necessary. Good schools are essential. If possible a high school should be established in every rural district. There should be more consolidations to make a high school possible, and every city and town should have established a junior college. Let it be remembered that good schools and churches lead civilization, and good roads are builders of good schools. The rural schools of West Texas counties should have as high standard as any in any of the cities of Texas.

The first question asked by a prospective settler, "What are your school facilities?" Your answer should be, "The best in the world." Money invested in good schools and churches bring dividends in high class citizenship. Where education rules supreme, the gunman, the bad man, the brothel and cabaret are negligible quantities. Ignorance is the father of lawlessness, bigotry and intolerance. The future of democracy depends upon the education of the masses.

The curriculum of the schools should be broad and cover a wide range of subjects. The schools should be run along non-sectarian lines. The schools should train the minds and the churches the spiritual side of the youth. Both are necessary for good citizenship.

Vocational education should play an important part in the preparations that are to be made to receive the army of men, women and children who are coming to this section. Vocational education includes agriculture. Every rural school in Texas, and especially West Texas, should equip itself to come within the scope of the Smith-Lever act that gives aid to schools that feature agricultural training in its curriculum. More producers are needed. The population of the world is growing, while the acreage of land remains unchanged. Educated farmers and professional and business men will solve the problems of irrigation and drainage and make it possible that the unproductive areas will blossom as a rose and produce feed and clothing for all mankind.

The future of the republic depends upon the development of its youth. The schools and churches are the powers to be used in the work of development. They must be supported and encouraged.

The teachers and preachers are human and should be so regarded. They must be upheld. Too often is the future of a child ruined because of the stand taken by the parent against the teacher and preacher. There is much to be written on this line. More will be said at a later day.

While book learning goes a long way, the world now is beginning to recognize the value of the old Greek saying, "A sound mind in a sound body," and athletics should be encouraged, but not to the detriment of books.

Before West Texas can attain its real stride, she must have better schools, more schools, better churches, more churches and better trained teachers and preachers.

With good schools in every district, good churches over the country, good farmhouses and barns, the house of West Texas will be in order for the army of workers that will come here to make their home.

### Delaware Follows Kentucky's Lead In Protecting Black

An analysis of the brick shale found here has been made by the Bureau of Mines and practical tests have been made. The result of these tests show that the shale will produce a beautiful and durable building brick.

Ranger has two principal factors that enter into the establishment of a brick plant, one is a large deposit of brick shale, and cheap fuel.

Ranger is ideal in regards to shipping facilities and many sites for a plant are available along the lines of the different railroads in the city. Now is an ideal time for the securing of such a factory for Ranger is like an open gate way to West Texas, which today is the fastest growing section of country in the United States. These new cities that are springing up out where the West begins, are not building frame buildings but they are building good substantial brick buildings and somebody is selling them the brick that go into the making. It just as well be Ranger who does the selling.

There are not many plants near here. Competition would not enter in to any great extent, the merit of the product, the freight rate and the ultimate cost of the product are the controlling factors.

This project to secure a brick plant for the purpose of manufacturing building brick in Ranger is no new thing. It has been gone into thoroughly, step by step and it looks like the time is ripe for the cinching of this factory.

**Japan Welcomes Representation Of Soviet Russia**

TOKYO.—Unusual official courtesies have been shown to Jacob D. Yanson, the first commercial attaché of the soviet embassy, here. He was met by high officials at Shimonoseki and given a private car to travel to Tokio, something more than was accorded the recently arrived American ambassador.

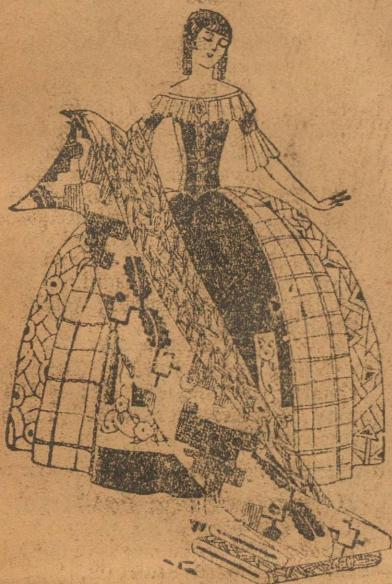

Miss Everson's brother began work on a new idea, interested mining men in it and now it is expected to revolutionize mining not only in this country but all over the world.

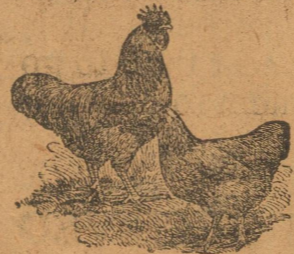
**Cuba Will Soon Have a Modern Telegraph System**

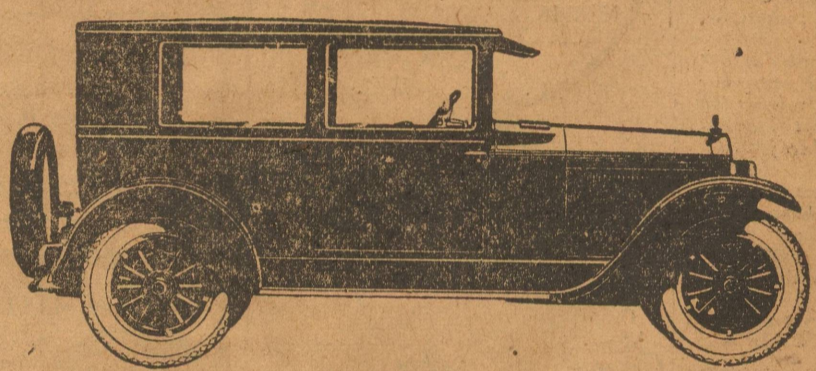

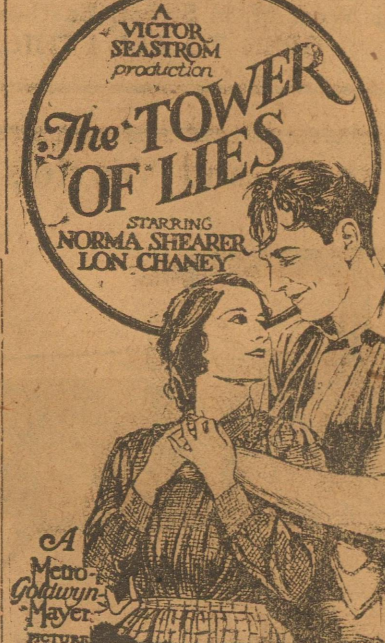

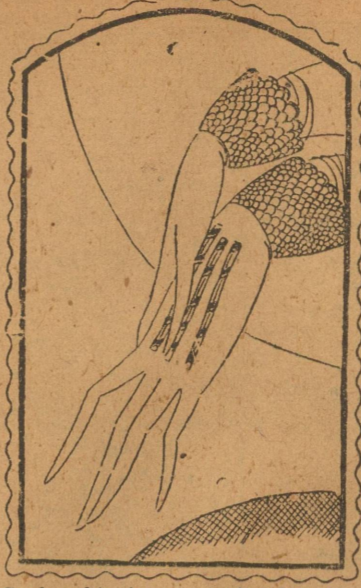
**Buy Structure.**

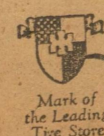

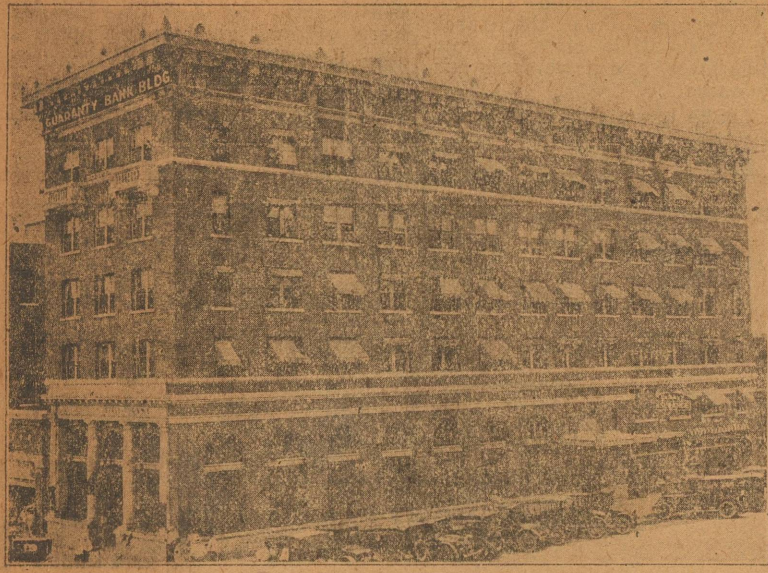

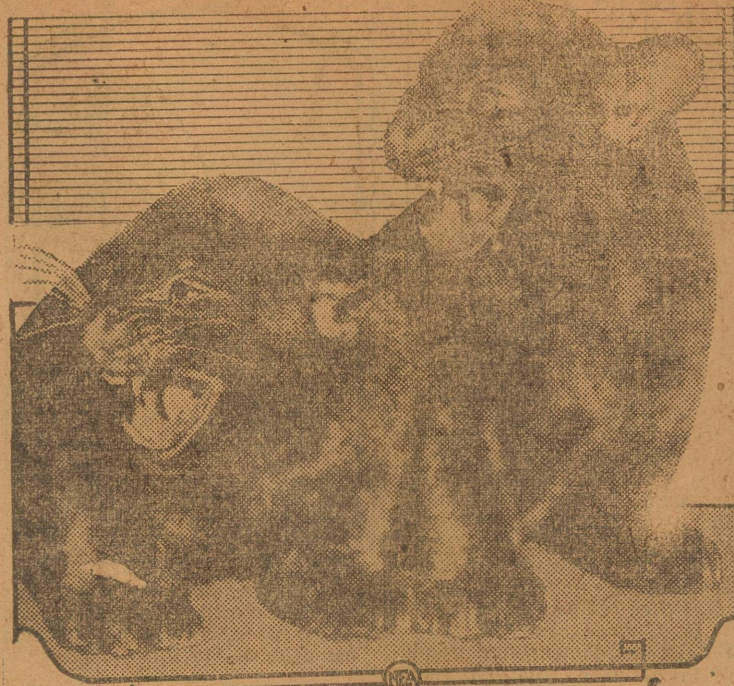

**Dudley Hatchery Is Keeping Busy**

Two incubators are busy all the time at the Dudley Bros. hatchery, at 105 South Austin street, Ranger. Dan Dudley, one of the Dudley "boys," who is in charge of the plant both night and day, says life is one round of putting on setting eggs and taking off baby chicks. These two incubators have an egg capacity of 15,000 eggs and 5,000 baby chicks are taken of every week, and twice a week, on Monday and Thursday, 5,000 eggs are set.

Dudley Bros. hatchery is three years old. Beverly S. Dudley, an attorney and his brother, Dan, are the owners of the hatchery, as well as the Oak Ridge Poultry farm, out on the Strawn highway.

The Dudley Bros. plant runs the first six months of the year. About two-thirds of its capacity is used by farmers and others who bring their eggs to the hatchery, and the other one-third of it is used by the owners themselves for the hatching of their fine chickens.

They find a ready market for their baby chicks and for their eggs. A record kept since they went into the business shows that about 80 per cent of the day-old chicks taken from the hatchery live.

Four hundred and eighty baby chicks, all white leghorns and as much alike as two peas, were sporting themselves in and around the "fin hen," as the big brooder is dubbed, when a reporter dropped in at the hatchery Friday.

Early this week they will take off a large batch of barred rocks and Rhode Island reds, which eggs are from their poultry farm.

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 6. — A special short course on diseases affecting farm produce during shipment will be held at the A. and M. College of Texas on March 1, 2, and 3, when Dr. J. J. Taubenhaus, pathologist of the Texas experiment station and other specialists of the college will deliver instructions on identifying and controlling diseases and on proper handling of produce for and during shipment. This course is given in co-operation with the principal transportation companies who will send those among their employes who are in immediate charge of the handling of fruits and vegetables, grains, hays, and so forth, in order that they may be able to recognize conditions in produce offered for shipment that might lead to losses and can therefore advise as to shipment. Farmers and shippers will also attend this course in order that they may learn how to identify at least the more common diseases and learn their influence over the carrying quality of their shipment.

A committee of the southwestern claim conference was in consultation with Doctor Taubenhaus this week and plans were made to extend invitations to all the railroads and to producers and shippers generally to attend this short course. The hotel facilities on the campus and in Bryan will be ample, it is thought, to care for all who attend and no charge will be made for the lectures. This will be the third of these courses held here, the first having been held three years ago during the farmers' short course in July and they intend to promote the intelligent handling of farm products for shipment to avoid losses caused by diseases and improper handling.

### EXCAVATIONS DISCLOSE ANCIENT SOLAR CULT

BENGASI, Feb. 6.—The existence of a solar cult at Leptis Magna is indicated by the latest excavations. Sculpture and statuary have recently been brought to light, among which are some mutilated heads, difficult to identify. They belong apparently to an Asiatic-Hellenic type, and are such as to suggest the existence of a small temple of the sun at Leptis Magna such as are known to have existed at Heliopolis and Rhodes.

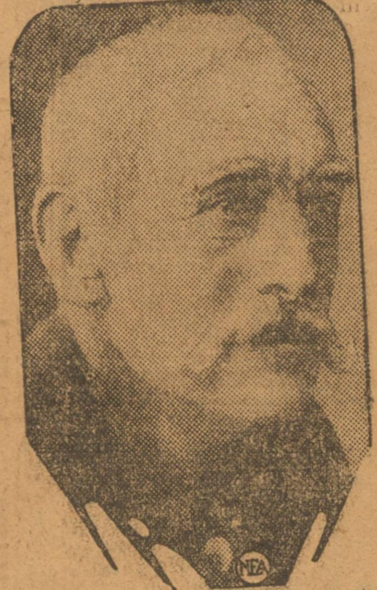

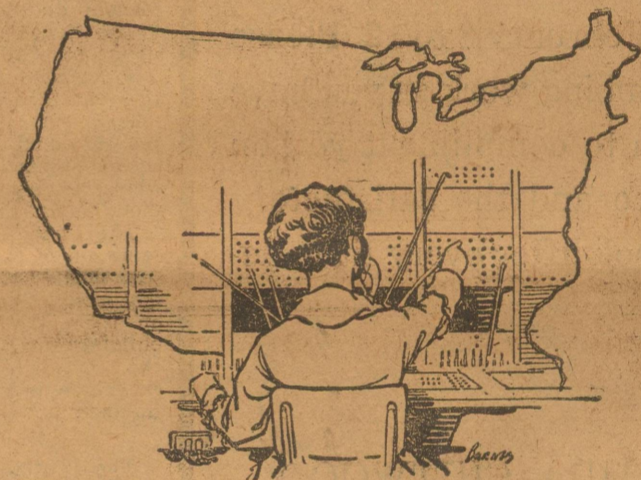

# PEACE MOVE CONGRESS TO HIT ON SNAG

### Various States and Nationalities to Come Into Conflict.

By HENRY WOOD  
(United Press Staff Correspondent)  
GENEVA, Feb. 7.—With the meeting here on February 15th of the League of Nations' newly created Disarmament Commission for the preparation of a general international disarmament conference not less than six to eight different groups of states will come into open conflict as to what should be done and how to do it.

While every nation in the world is, theoretically at least, in favor of disarmament, the League's five year study of the problem has developed that hardly any two agree either on

the method, the extent or the scope. This is one of the leading reasons why Leaguers remain convinced that disarmament will never come about as the result of any general agreement on the subject but merely as logical result when security has been established to such an extent that the nations no longer feel the need of armaments.

### Clash Expected

In any event at the meeting of the League's disarmament commission of February 15, the principal groups and schools of disarmament that will clash with each other are as follows:

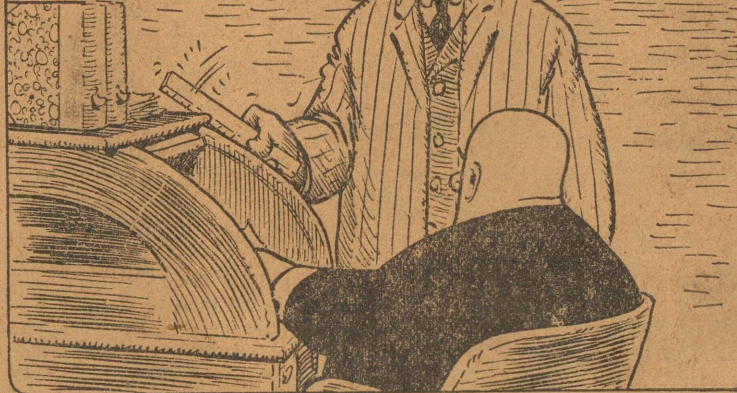
The Scandinavian group which demands complete disarmament for reasons of their own. As several of the Scandinavian states are already disarmed or are preparing to disarm they oppose any plan of disarmament based on mutual assistance.

The ex-"enemy" group, consisting of Germany, Austria, Hungary and Bulgaria, having been disarmed under the peace treaties insist that the states who disarmed them come across with their part of the disarmament.

The French group consisting of France and the various European states with which she has military alliances including Belgium, Poland,

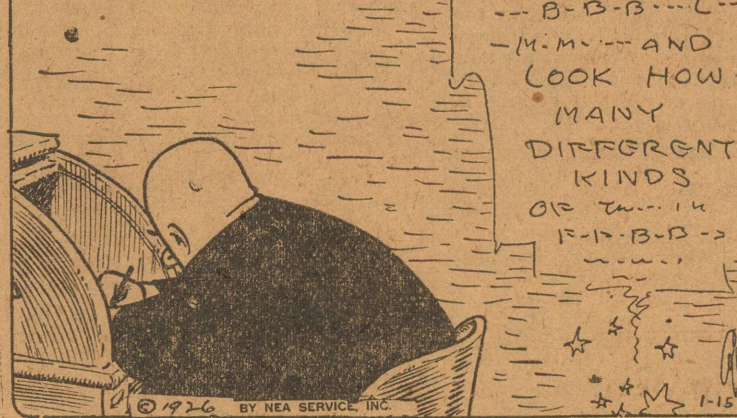

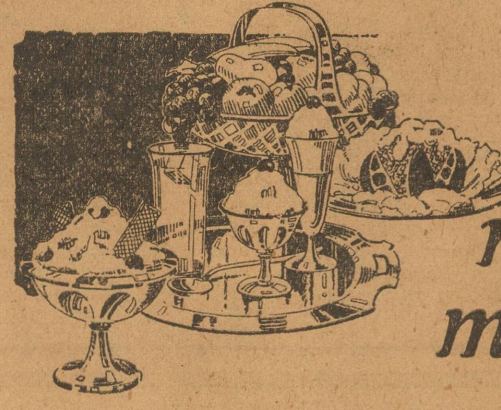

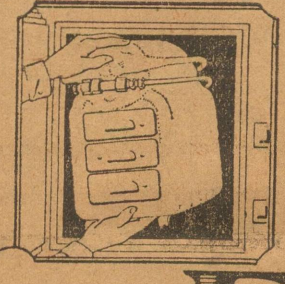

Czecho-Slovakia, and possibly Roumania and Yugo-Slavia want disarmament based upon the perfecting of a mutual assistance armaments system that will render certain the security and defense of every nation that gives up a portion of her armaments.

### Anglo Saxon Group

The Anglo-Saxon group which wants to confine disarmaments merely to limiting military, naval and aerial units along about the same lines as the Washington conference and who insist that the moral obligation existing under the covenant for mutual assistance is sufficient without detailed obligations.

The South Americans, who while strong for disarmament, insist that as in many cases their military and naval organizations which they have at the present time are not adequate for national defense they cannot accept limitations that would curtail what development is necessary for their needs.

The new maritime nations that came out of the war, which possessing sea, ports but no navies, yet insist that restrictions must not be placed on them that would prevent their building up a marine adequate for their national defense. These nations include Yugo-Slavia, Poland and Roumania.

### English Nations

The United States group—provided there is anyone to side with the United States and make a group—which wants the question of land and naval armaments treated at separate conferences. The United States may possibly have the support of England on this point, but France, Italy and Japan have already announced that they cannot consider separating the

### Ex-Congressman Now Stock Room Head in Prison

ATLANTA, Feb. 6.—Once a powerful political leader in his home state, John W. Langley, former congressman of Kentucky, today is just one of 3,000 inmates of Atlanta federal penitentiary, serving time for transgression of the nation's laws.

On his arrival here to start a two-year term for violation of the prohibition law, Langley appeared broken in health and discouraged over his long futile fight to evade sentence. He was sent to the prison hospital for two weeks for observation and then appointed foreman of the prison stockroom.

Langley is making a model prisoner, according to Warden John W. Snook, and if he maintains his perfect record he will be eligible for parole in seven months.

As foreman of the stock room, Langley succeeds Howard Montgomery, former head of the Community Finance Corporation of New York, who has been made editor of "Good Words," the penitentiary's monthly magazine. Montgomery was convicted of fraud and embezzlement.

The former editor of "Good Words" was Warren T. McCray, once governor of Indiana, whose health has broken down recently and who now is undergoing special treatment in the prison hospital for high blood pressure. It is reported that McCray will be granted a pardon before the end of his term, which was for ten years, of which he has served two.

# Rum Running Greatly Exaggerated Declares Chief English Dry Leader

LONDON, Feb. 6.—"How much liquor is America consuming?" This question put to George B. Wilson, secretary of the United Kingdom Alliance, Britain's largest "dry" organization brought forth a bitter attack today on the statistics of U. S. liquor consumption published in America by William H. Stayton, national vice president of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment.

Stayton, according to Wilson's information had put the 1924 drink figure at 260,965,272 100 per cent proof gallons of spirits made up as follows:

1. Stolen from industrial alcohol allotments 12,000,000 gallons.
2. Output of illicit distillers 173,965,272 gallons.
3. Smuggled, 75,000,000 gallons.

"Examination of these figures," said Wilson in an exclusive interview with the United Press, "shows that Stayton has made his figures up out of a tissue of misrepresented facts. He purports to base his figures on statistics of the internal revenue reports of the U. S. treasury. But referring to the first item we find that the government estimate of thefts from industrial alcohol allotments is not 12,000,000 gallons as

Stayton gives it, but 6,600,000. Stayton doubled the government's figure without a word of explanation.

"During the fiscal year 1924 the U. S. spirits of varying strength. This figure Stayton arbitrarily places as representing one week's product of illicit distilleries, though he might have placed it at one month's or one day's production so far as any just basis for calculation is concerned. He then multiplied this figure by 52 to arrive at a year's illicit production giving 86,982,636 gallons. Then still without a word of explanation he multiplies this figure by two again to arrive at his figure of 173,965,272 gallons.

"He puts the amount of smuggled liquor at 75,000,000 gallons. But where would most of this come from if not from English and Scotch stillers? Yet the world exports of liquor from British distilleries in 1924 was only 3,469,682 gallons, so that if we should admit that the whole of British liquor exports found their way to the United States which we don't Stayton's estimate would still be more than 70,000,000 gallons too high.

"As to beer he is silent, yet in the year ending June 30, 1917 America drank 1,882,770,000 gallons of American beer. Its consumption now we understand is practically negligible, so that if the present consumption of hard liquor was up to its prohibition quantity—which we are certain it isn't—prohibition could clearly be claimed to be succeeding.

"Stayton's figures I have no hesitation in saying are inaccurate and clearly compiled with a view to misleading the American public as to the success of the prohibition movement."

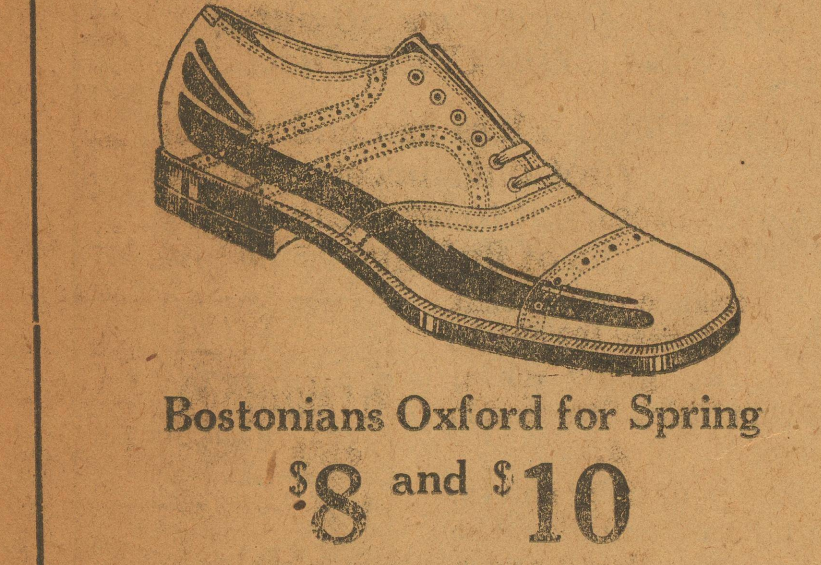

## Deadly Carbon Monoxide Has From Motor Colores, Odorless, Tasteless

CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—"Your nose knows," is an apt phrase but in every day life, especially where life and health are concerned, it's not always safe to take the words seriously.

Your nose knows many times but do not depend upon your nose to tell you when your garage is being filled with deadly carbon monoxide gas. You can not smell this gas; your nose does not know.

This deadly gas is manufactured while you are warming up the motor on a cold winter morning before starting out for the day, or while you are lying under the car, doing an odd repair job while the motor is running. It is also being manufactured by gasoline motors so frequently used on the farms. The gas is one of the products of combustion and the poorer the motor is running, the greater will be the supply of carbon monoxide being produced.

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless and tasteless gas. Therein lies its danger. This poisonous gas may be coming from the exhaust of your motor in great quantities and you will not know it. It permeates all parts of a closed room to the same extent, if given sufficient time.

The poison action of carbon monoxide is directly due to changes in the blood which reduce its oxygen carrying capacity. At the identical time you are being poisoned with this gas from your motor, the lung action increases, automatically, and without your knowledge, you breathe in more of the contaminated air in an effort to get more oxygen. The increase speeds up the rate of saturation of the blood by the gas. This in turn intensifies the damage of the oxygen shortage. You breathe still more rapidly, until the blood that it can not contain or give the necessary oxygen to sustain life. Just how much the victim of this poisoning suffers before death is not known.

To revive an unconscious person who is the victim of carbon monoxide take him into the open air and apply artificial respiration. Do not leave the patient just because he has begun to breathe. He is apt to stop breathing and need artificial respiration manipulations. If the physician is able to administer oxygen, that will help. Probably the most efficient mixture in treating those affected is a 5 per cent carbon dioxide and oxygen mixture. Recently Professor Henderson of Yale University and his co-worker, Dr. Haggard, proved its efficiency. The carbon dioxide added to air, inhaled, stimulates the breathing.

The best treatment in the world against carbon monoxide poisoning is to prevent it. So do not run your motor in a closed garage.
