FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION FRENCH IS WROUGHT UP OVER PLANS MADE BY NEW CORPORATION

Deserted

Preliminary Inquiry Already Begun by The Chief Of Examiners

WASHINGTON, March 6.—The federal trade commission tonight added a big merger to its growing list of mergers for investigation as having possible monopolistic features. The \$240,000,000 consolidation of the Associated Oil company and the Tidewater Oil company interests, stirred the commission up and a pre-

liminary inquiry was started by Chief Examiner M. F. Hudson.
Hudson will ask officials of both companies for details of the reported transaction leading up to the merged.

If the answer indicate that the Clayton act is being violated so far as restriction of competition goes, the

legal department will act.

"We will confine our investigations to the features of the merger that may show a monopoly to exist that restricts competition," Hudson

"The financial dealings and methods of exchanging securities or of-fering them for sale does not come under the jurisdiction of the com-mission," he said.

WANTS DIVORCE ALIMONY SOUGHT
