

Unless there is a change in the highway commission law, Moody appointees will have charge of highway matters at least until 1931. Chairman R. S. Sterling's term does not expire until 1932.

W. R. Ely's term is the first to expire though Ely was the last member of the present highway commissions appointed by Governor Moody. Judge Ely is serving out the term of former commissioner Joe Burket! which expires in 1929. When Burkett resigned he was succeeded by Scott Woodward and Ely succeeded Woodward. If Moody becomes governor again and reappoints Ely, he would have a term running until large employees insured under the Workmen' compensation act. Three employees are necessary for such insurance. A man with a business having three or more employees is not much interested in the state position. A change in the insurance law by the 40th legislature will give Moody appointees control of the insurance only until Feb. 10, 1929. 

Poor Communication Facilities
To Outside World Hampers Geneva Efforts.

By HENRY WOOD, United Press Correspondent. GENEVA.—The League of Nations' one and only weapon, that of publicity, is being dulled and weaken-ed by the lack of adequate means of communication between Geneva and the rest of the world.

This is the formal complaint that has been filed with the league itself, first by the international press conference convoked last August by the league, and secondly by the Interna-tional Association of League of Nations' Journalists. The situation has become so se-

rious that during the December session of the league council, several of the leading members in the intersts of their own countries or their own particular part of the world, insisted also, along with the journalists, on an immediate improvement of telegraph and wireless facilities, especially between Geneva and Lon-

At the time the league was first founded, it was fondly expected that t would some day have at its disposal an international army, an interna-tional marine, and a financial and economic blockade with which to enforce its decisions and maintain

Eight years of experience have emonstrated, however, that all the ague can count upon in the way of weapons, is the moral force of public opinion. The majority of leaguers now remain convinced that in great majority of cases this will be all that will ever be necessary.

Unfortunately, the means of wielding this great force are being steadily cut down by the failure of the

various European governments to grant Geneva communications with the rest of the world that will permit quick, world-wide distribution all league, decisions, news and ac-

The meetings of the league asmbly and council have now becom without question the greatest political events in the world. Every September assembly attracts to Geneva not ess than 300 newspaper correspandents representing all of the greatest news agencies and newspapers of the world, while every meeting of the council brings together an average

of 200 journalists.

As the situation now stands it often takes much longer to get the news from Geneva to London than it does from London to South America or the Far East. It not infrequently happens that the Geneva-London transmission is from three to five times longer than the transmission from London to Tokio, Pekin, Bucnos Aires, Canada and the United States the last session of the

During the last session of the council, Mr. Dandurand on behalf of anada, Mr. Urrutiu on behalf of C , Mr. Villegas for Chile, Mr. for Japan, and Mrs. Tcheng oh, for China, all entered vigorous protests that their countries placed on a basis of equality with the rest of the world in receiving quick and full reports of all league activi-

As a result of the combined protests that were thus made assurances have already been given by several leading European administrations of leading European administrations of quick improvement. The Marconi company has announced that it will install at once a high-powered station at Geneva capable of working under all weather conditions; the French telegraph administration has ordered an investigation into delays between Geneva and London via Paris and Sir Austen Chamberlain has assured the league that the British minister of posts and telegraphs will also take up the problem at once in conjunction with the league's transit organization.






