ATTEND THE MASS MEETING

(An Editorial)

A mass meeting will be held at the Ranger high school auditorium Monday night that will be of very great importance to every citizen of Ranger. Matters that will be discussed at the meeting concern the welfare of the city schools—and through the schools concern the welfare of the people of this city.

We might as well be perfectly plain about the matter and say that the public schools of this city are facing a scrious problem—a problem, the solution of which concerns all of us.

Unless the people of Ranger get together and do something the splendid schools that have been maintained here in years past and which have built up such a splendid reputation for Ranger as a school town are going to suffer seriously next year. The fact of the matter is this-Ranger will not have enough money to maintain a nine months school next year. That is the money will not be available under the present valuation of city property.

We are reliably informed that it costs about \$72,000 annually to maintain a nine months school in Ranger and it is estimated that the school fund will be short approximately \$20,000 to \$25,000 next year unless property valuations for school purposes are raised.

That would cut about three months off the nine months term. Can Ranger afford to be satisfied with a six months school term? Not if we know Ranger people.

As we understand it the tax rate cannot be raised. It is lagally fixed at \$1.00. The only thing to be done is to raise the property valuations to a point that will yield the required money to maintain the schools as they should be maintained.

Of course the school board can arbitrarily raise the property valuations. The board can say that your property is valued at so much for school purposes, but it does not want to do that. The board wants you to attend the mass meeting Monday night and join in a community discussion of this matter.

No doubt there are some who will be greatly disappointed to know of this financial condition of the city schools. There will be some too, who will doubtless raise the cry that too maney are not paying their taxes. There will be this cry and that cry by some who have not informed themselves.

Come to the mass meeting and here are just a few of the things you will no doubt find to be true:

The amount of delinquent city school taxes that are collectable will amount to less than enough to maintain the schools for a two weeks pe-

Some of the big corporations have been advised of the condition and have already voluntarily raised their rendition beyond the point expected of them.

Come to the mass meeting. You will be apprised of the real condition of the school finances. the meeting is not called for the pur

pose of taking up a collection. The schools are in fairly good condition now but the board wants you to help solve the problem that is coming

You will not be asked for one penny at the mass meeting.



Each day there is handled on the average 150 cars of incoming freight and over 300 loaded cars of outgoing freight. These would make one train nearly four miles long every day in the year and to handle this immense traffic 12 miles of standard gauge track have been built within the works.

A large force of traffic experts are kept busy the year around to guard against any delay either in incoming or outgoing freight, which would make a chart down on a scale for weighing and then planed in racks in the steel-yard where at times from 8 to 10 million pounds of steel are stored. It is necessary to carry large supplies of all these material; to insure continuous production and also to take advantage of seasonal prices.

To provide space for unloading to the steel and other things, huge unloading docks have been built at each building. 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

RANGER-EASTLAND-BRECKENRIDGE

Rivalry Between Britain and U.S. In Iron Region

By LEON L. KAY,

United Press Staff Correspondent. RIO DE JANEIRO.—British and American interests are rivals for the potentially important iron exploration in Brazil, according to reports in reliable local commercial circles. The reports are based on the signing of contracts between the state of Minas Geraes and two private companies, each of which would envisage monthly smelting of 15,000 tons of Brazilian iron ore.

In July, 1927, the first contract was signed with the Companhia Sid-erurgica de Minas Geraes and stipuerurgica de Minas Geraes and stipulated that 500 tons of ore must be mined daily and blast furnaces constructed to handle this amount of ore. Now, another company, the Itabura Iron Ore company, incorporated in England some years ago, has obtained a similar concession. This second company had previously acquired some of the iron deposits involved. But these holdings have never volved. But these holdings have never been worked for some reason or other, probably owing to lack of capi-tal to build the necessary railway to connect them with the sea.

connect them with the sea.

The iron deposits are in the state of Minas Geraes, on the Doce river, about half way between Victoria on the coast and Bella Horizonte, the state capital. They have long been known. At the present time a narrow gauge line runs some distance inland from the port of Victoria. This railway would be an important factor in the development of the deposits and the struggle for their control. The British capital involved in one of the contracts is said in some one of the contracts is said in some quarters to be the same that controls

The iron ores are mostly hematite and magnetite, running from 50 to 60 per cent of metallic iron. Nearby are manganese deposits, useful for

are manganese deposits, useful for the manfacture of alloys.

While at the present time it is difficult to identify the two companies, local report has it that at least one of them involves the same Canadian and British capital already engaged on a large scale in Brazilian enterprises. On the other hand, the promoter of the other company is said to have important United States connections.

What the significance of the maneuvers is cannot be estimated at the present time, but the reliable business opinion here is that the signing of two similar contracts is a move to force rival organizations to compromise by means of some sort of a working agreement.

Europe Watches Non-War Tilt Of France and U.S.

MASON (Written for the United Press) NEW YORK.—Efforts of the French government to reach an all inclusive arbitration agreement with the United States are being watched by the other trans-Atlantic nations with the closest interest. Should France succeed in ne gotiating a treaty with the United States pledging each nation never under any circumstances to make war against each other, French diplomacy would have won a success of the utmost importance, as long as France's potential enemies were restrained from making a similar agreement with America, themselves.

This is the prime difficulty, however, in the French scheme. As long as France were to have an exclusive pleadge of America's friendship or at least neutrality, in a new war, there

least neutrality, in a new war, there would be little difference between such an arbitration commitment and a direct alliance between the two nations. America would be France's friend, forever, and any other nation would hesitate to attack France knowing that the United States could never be involved against the French people.

But, an unlimited arbitration treaty with France could scarcely remain isolated for long. This factor in the situation has not been adequately considered by the French diplomats. Should France persuade the United Lates to agree to peace in perpetuity. Great Britain, Germany, Italy and other countries would request a similar favor. Once the proffered French treaty were accepted at Washington, it would be impossible for Uncle Sam to turn his back on the other offers. The almost certain outcome, therefore, of an agreement.

Nicaraguan Bombs. Each Nicaraguan bomb consists of cylinder of iron containing three a cylinder of from containing three sticks of dynamite, a spring and a metal ball. The force of striking an object causes the ball to rebound from the spring against the dynamite. Then the dynamite explodes.

On each trip into the air the Nicarauguan fliers carry their revolvers and on occasion they take along a "five-gallon bomb." In it are combined materials for a combined gas, fire and bombing attack.

They follow elemental principles in making the larger bomb. First the "regulation" small bomb is prepared and attached to the can. Inside are deposited a bottle filled with sulphuracid, a handful of black powder and some gasoline-soaked waste.
With these large tins of death in

their laps, the fliers take off and sail tered wreckage.


