A number of meetings of Eastland county farmers for the purpose of pooling orders for carload shipments of fertilizer to be purchased for use in the county, are to be held within the next few days, according to County Agent J. C. Patterson. Possibly the first three of these meetings will be held at Eastland, Cisco and Ranger. Dates have not been set for either of them.

Acid phesphete.

Acid phosphate and nitrate of soda is to be purchased. In making up these pools for shipments, the purchasers pay a small deposit and pay the balance when the fertilizer is received. Shipments are made in carload lots and the purchasers re-

carload lots and the nurchasers receive their amounts from the car, which cuts down the price.

For many years Eastland county farmers have been big users of commercial fertilizers and each year the amount used has been increased over the previous year. With few exceptions the users of fertilizers in the county have been well pleased with the results obtained.

Bob Hice farmer living just south

Bob Hice, farmer, living just south of Ranger, has been experimenting with commercial fertilizers and has had very gratifying results, according to County Agent Patterson.

Mr. Hice last year fertilized 19 acres out of a tract of 20 acres, which he planted to peanuts. On the 19 acres on which acid phosphate and nitrate of soda mixture was used.

mitrate of soda mixture was used. Mr. Hice secured an average of 40 bushels of peanuts per acre. On one acre, in the middle of the 20-acre tract, no fertilizer was used and the yield from this acre, was 24 bushels. yield from this acre was 24 bushels, slightly more than half as much as the other land produced. An acre of land on which fertilizer had been used the previous year, produced 52 bushels of pennits.

Mr. Hice applied 100 pounds of nacid phosphate and 50 pounds of nitrate of soda per acre at a cost of \$2.55 per acre. Increase in production on the land where the fertilizer was used brought a net profit of \$13
