TORNADO INJURES MANY IN TENNESSEE TOWN

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 25 .-Attempts were made today to establish radio communications with Holmes creek district of De Kalb county where four children were reported killed and more than a score injured by a tornado late yesterday. The wire communication with the stricken area from here was cut off. Telephone lines were down and roads were blocked by fallen trees, according to word brought here by bus drivers late last night.

Reports from Alexandria, De Kalb county, the only point possible to reach by wire early today reported the death of four children.

A schoolhouse at Liberty, a small country station, was badly damaged and the principal of the school was seriously injured but no deaths occurred, the Alexandria reports said. BY DEFENSE AFTER STATE RESTS

Marshall Ratliff, the alleged Santa Claus of the Cisco bandit gang who robbed the First National bank of Cisco on Friday, Dec. 23, and who has been on trial before Judge George L. Davenport of the Ninety-first district court on a charge of robbery with firearms in connection with the holdup since Monday, Jan. 16, will perhaps know his fate within the next few hours. The state is asking for the death sentence.

Both the state and defense rested in the case this morning at 10:30 o'clock, the defense without putting on a witness, and Judge Davenport began work immediately thereafter on his charge to be submitted to the jury. This was expected to be ready by 2 o'clock. Following the reading of the charge to the 12 men who are to pass on the case, attorneys will begin their arguments to the jury. These are expectede to require some seven or eight hours.

When court adjourned late Tuesday evening District Attorney J. Frank Sparks, announced that the state would rest soon after opening of court Wednesday morning. This morning they put on three witnesses and then rested.






