UNIVERSITY EX-STUDENTS DIRECTORY IS PUBLISHED

AUSTIN.—Following a period of two years spent in its preparation, the new ex-student directory of the University of Texas has come from the university press. Of the 2500 copies printed, over 1200 have been mailed out to those who subscribed for it. The book lists over 3500 names and is cross indexed, giving the names of ex-students and the year of graduation since the beginning of the university. Compilation of the book involved an enormous cost, it is stated, and even though all the copies are sold, the expense will be about \$5,000 more than the money derived from their sale. It is expected that this will be offset when the next directory is printed, since all the information will be preserved, and the cost, time, and work necessary will be considerably reduced.

LOYD GEORGE CRITICIZES COAL STRIKE SETTLEMENT.

LONDON, August 1.—The Baldwin government's provisional settlement of the coal strike through a subsidy to the mines was attacked today by Lloyd George in a speech in which he characterized the step as one of the most serious ever taken by the government in an industrial crisis. Lloyd George said that a re-organization of the coal business must come. Subsidies, he felt, established a dangerous precedent, but tax payers could not meet added taxes forever.

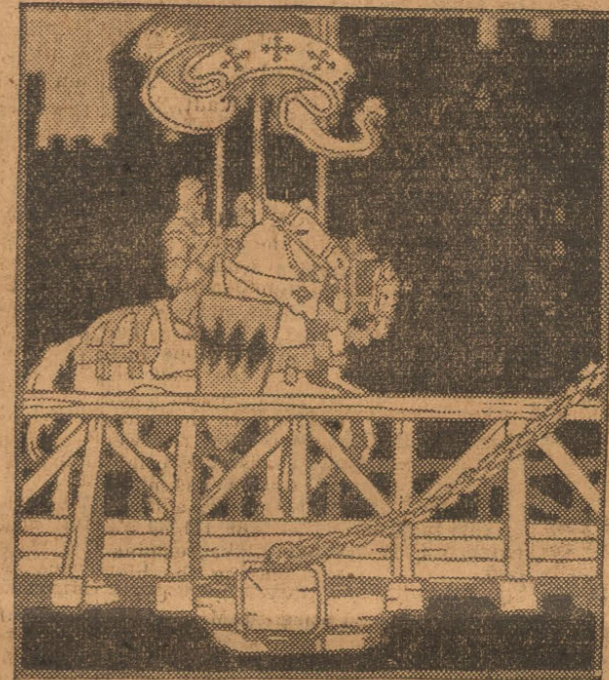
TEAPOT DOME CASE NOW GOES TO HIGHER COURT

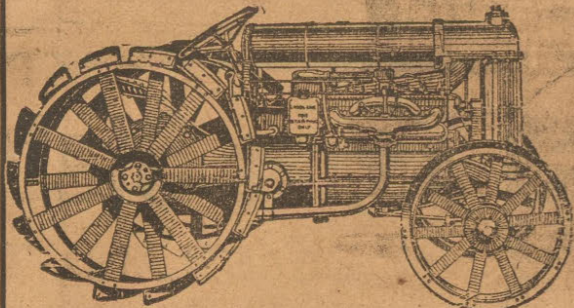

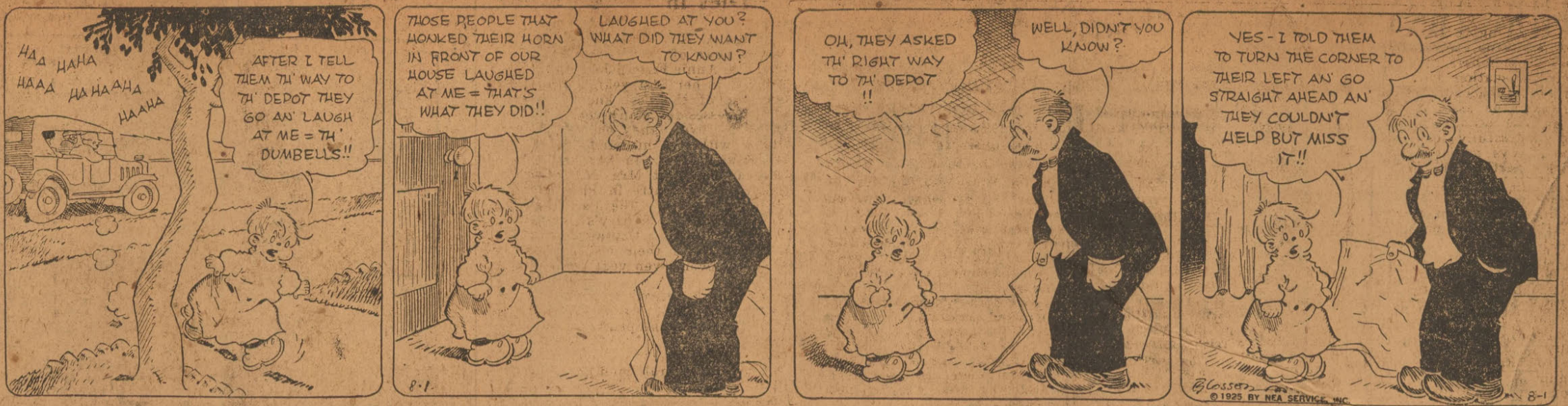

The committee from the Carl Barnes post having charge of the stadium entertainment events has arranged an attractive opening program. The entertainment will start with a band concert from 8 to 8:20. Following that will be four boxing bouts, the first starting at 8:30. Kid Kelley of Breckenridge will be matched four rounds against Dan Swift of Wichita Falls.

McCleskey of Eastland and "Freckles" Peoples of Breckenridge will spar four rounds, which are expected to be fast. "Rusty" Cahill of Breckenridge and "Battling" Jennings of Oklahoma City will give an eight-round exhibition.

The concluding number will be a 10-round battle between Ralph Brady of Syracuse, N. Y., now making his home in Ranger, and Danny Clark of Wichita Falls. Brady is looked upon as one of the fastest boys who has been in Texas. He has boxed many of the best men of his weight in the United States and recently returned from Tampico, Mexico, where he was matched in a number of bouts.

YOUNG TOURISTS SEEING EUROPE WITHOUT MONEY

LONDON, Aug. 1.—"Pike's Peak or Bust," as a slogan of determination is giving away before a newer version—"Europe—and Busted."

England and the continent just now are thronged with American student-tourists who are "doing Europe on the slenderest purses of any great contingent of travelers that has ever come over from the United States.

Conversion of the former steerage quarters of the great passenger liners into "tourist thirds" with round trip fares of \$150 or thereabouts, and 31-day tours at only \$300 has brought into this country and Europe a good many thousand young hopefuls—hopeful, that is, that they will have enough funds to get back home on.

The Cunard liner Aquitania is recently in with 800 students, traveling third class; the Leviathan, of the U. S. lines recently landed an equal number, and will shortly be along with more.

The Royal Mail and the French lines, also have rehabilitated their old steerage quarters in the new third class as it is called, and report close to capacity shipments on several of their boats.

Judge A. E. Firmin of Ranger received news of the death of his sister, Mrs. Annie Firmin Jack, of Philadelphia, in her 81st year. Mrs. Jack was one of the best known American actresses for many years, having traveled over the entire United States with her husband's company as leading lady.

Mrs. Jack retired from the stage many years ago, but continued her activities in Shakespearean readings, concert singing and teaching up to a few months back. In 1919 and 1920, she spent several months in Ranger, forming many friendships and visiting many of the Central and West Texas counties with her nephew, Mr. Albert Firmin.

Mrs. Jack's demise removes one of the oldest of American actresses, and her many friends will deeply regret her loss. She was paying a short call at a friend's when stricken, her death being instantaneous.

DALLAS BANK ACQUIRES COSTLY BUILDING SITE

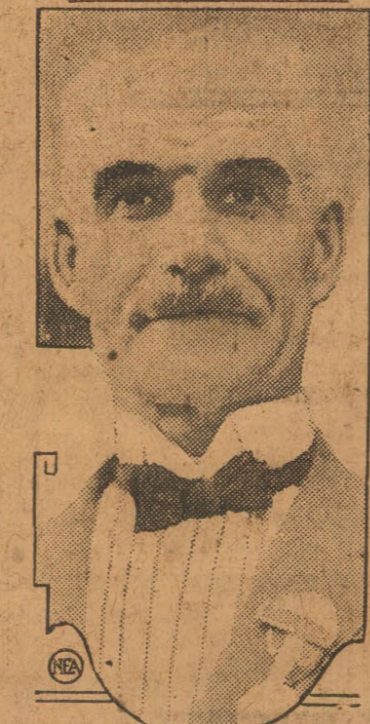

White and Thalheimer will represent the southwest in the national doubles tournament in Boston, August 22.

J. B. Adoue, singles champion, will meet John Barr, while White and Thalheimer will race one another in the singles semi-final Monday.

FEDERAL PRISONERS TO BE SENT TO HUNTSVILLE

AUSTIN, Aug. 1.—That the Texas prison system is going to receive and care for a number of federal prisoners became evident today with the receipt of a copy of the new prison population report which is sent to the executive office every day. Thus far only 107 have been received and reported to the government. This number is expected to increase about 100 shortly and soon to 600, according to press reports from Leavenworth, Kansas, the seat of the southwest federal prison, which is filled to overflowing.

WITNESSES FOR TOGO RAY ARE LATE ARRIVING

Habeas Corpus Hearing Begun and Continued to Unnamed Date

The habeas corpus hearing for Togo Ray, charged with murder, which was begun in the Ninety-first district court Friday afternoon, was continued until such time as a number of defense witnesses could get to Eastland from Brownwood.

In the proceedings Friday afternoon, M. E. Lawrence, attorney for Ray, objected to the state introducing the written and signed statement of the defendant in which he stated that he shot S. B. Houston, the slain man. This objection was made on the ground that the recent legislature passed a law by the terms of which the state is prohibited from using testimony of this nature secured under such circumstances unless it is a rebuttal testimony. The court temporarily overruled the defendant's objection. He said that some such act was passed by the legislature, but that he was not familiar with it and that after he had had time to go into the matter he might change his ruling and so cure the record.

J. M. Ray, father of the defendant, was on the witness stand for a considerable time Friday afternoon and told the story of his and the slain man's domestic troubles and also of the trouble had with the co-accused on the morning before he was killed in the afternoon.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 1.—A slim, fragile wisp of a girl left Chicago with her mother three years ago and came to California, hoping to regain some of her lost health.

The other day that same girl, in a flaming red running suit, with crimson cheeks to match, a dazzling specimen of feminine virility, broke three world's track and field records for women.

It was Helen Filkey, now recognized as the greatest woman athlete in the world.

At the Women's National A. A. U. championships at Pasadena, Helen competed with America's finest sportswomen, and in one afternoon ascended to the topmost rung of the woman's athletic ladder of fame.

New World's Records

She set new world's records in the running broad jump, the 100-yard dash and the 60-yard high hurdles. Her leap in the broad jump was 17

feet, she clipped the century in 11 2-5 seconds, and ran the tall hurdles in 8 3-10 seconds.

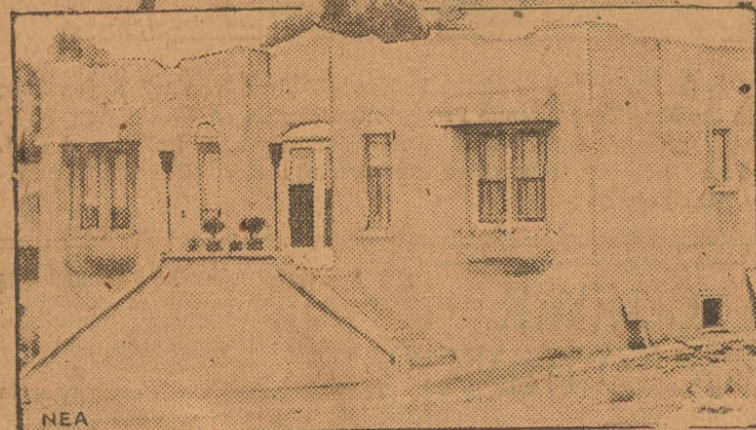
A girl capable of these feats should be a proverbial Amazon—husky, masculine and rugged. But Helen Filkey is neither masculine nor muscular. On the contrary she is possessed of a feminine charm and loveliness for which many of Hollywood's film producers would pay her handsomely to star in their pictures.

"Mother brought me to California three years ago when I was awfully sick," she said. "But I got better out here, and of course I was always more or less interested in athletics."

CIVIL WAR "ENOCH ARDEN" MEETS HIS CHILDREN AGAIN AFTER MORE THAN 50 YEARS

JOAQUIN, Texas.—The gray-clad line emerged from the tangle of brush and young trees, paused for a moment as if to gather all its strength, and charged hotly up the slope.

The air was split with the shrill rebel yell. In answer, came a thunderous roar of artillery fire. The gray line faltered, closed its ranks and came on again.

The great battle of Chickamauga was on.

Tragedy hovered over the green slope at nightfall. And amid the confusion of the battle field, where the screaming shrapnel wiped out whole companies and men's names were less than a puff of star dust in the outer darkness, the fate of the individual soldier did not count.

So that is why young John A. Pinkard, private in the army of the south, got lost—lost from his company, lost from the sight of men that knew him, lost from everything that had made life dear to him.

Pinkard, who dragged himself off the field and fell in with the first bunch of troopers he met, was reported as dead. And so—but let him tell it.

Pinkard now is 95, a retired minister, a quiet old man who is waiting in this quiet Texas village for the leas of life to run out.

"When I enlisted I had a wife and a child by a former marriage," he says. "During the first year of the war another child was born. My wife and family stayed with her parents."

"Now when I left we had taken a wounded soldier to our house to recover and he stayed there during my absence. After Chickamauga news came to my family that I had been killed. It was three years before I could return home.

"When I got back, at last, I found preparations for a wedding in progress. My wife, believing me dead, had worn mourning for two years—and then she had learned to love the young man left behind four years before."

"I gave her her choice. She chose him."

"Well"—the old man bent his head a little. "We talked it over, and I arranged for her to have a divorce. She kept the girls and I took a train to get as far away from that

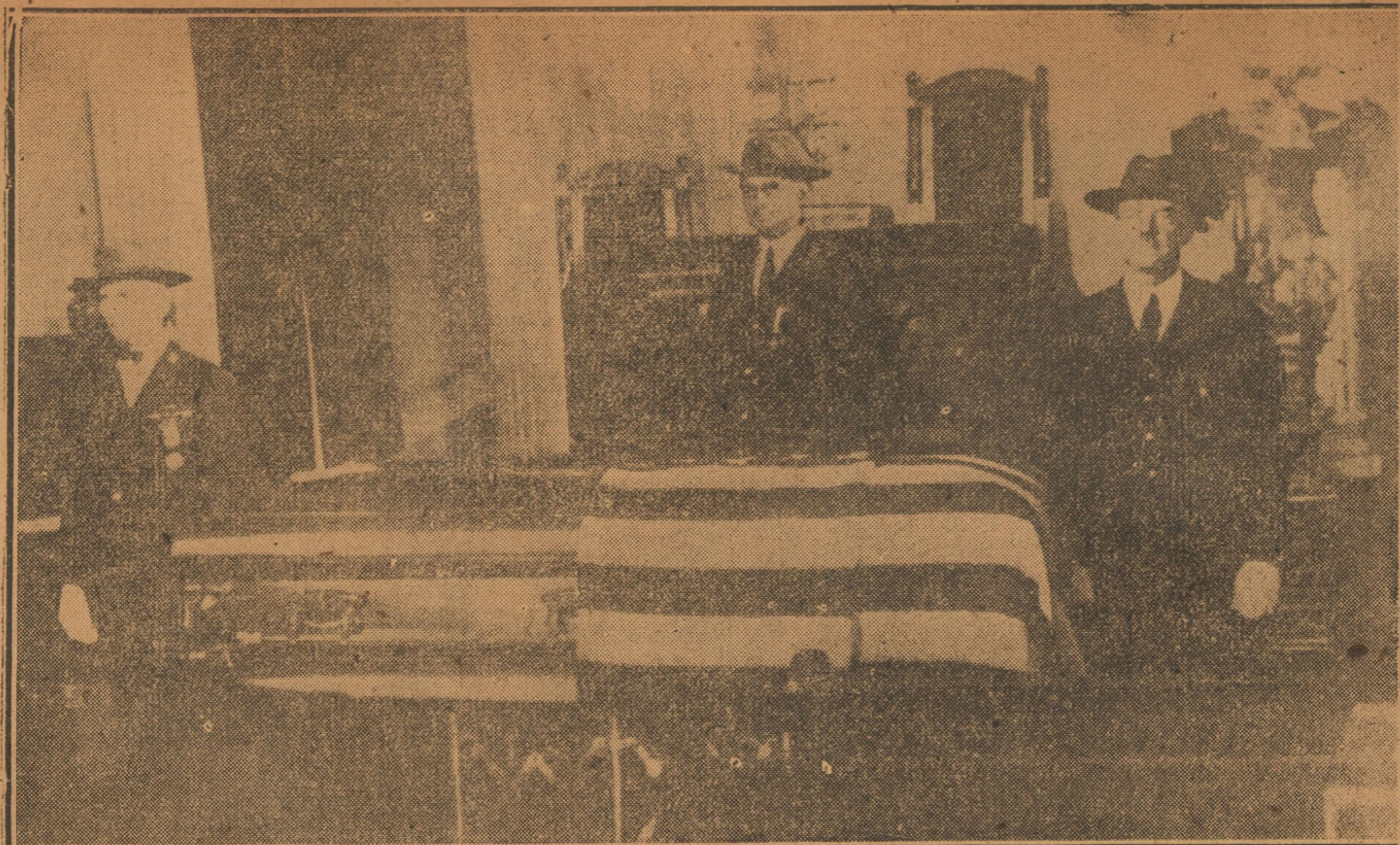

HUGE PETRIFIED SKELETON DUG UP BY EARTHQUAKE

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Aug. 1.—A gigantic petrified skeleton, which scientists have not yet decided was a mastodon or prehistoric toothed whale, has been discovered on Green mountain, highest point on historic San Miguel Island, 30 miles from Santa Barbara's shoreline.

San Miguel Island was badly rocked during the recent earthquake, and many of its tall cliffs tumbled into the sea.

The skeleton's tusks measure 15 feet in length, and together with the mammal's skull were found protruding above ground at the summit of the mountain. The balance of the bones were buried in the earth's surface, but the entire skeleton was virtually intact.

If the find proves to be a mastodon, it will disrupt the entire sequence of geology as worked out by scientists on the Pacific coast, according to D. B. Rogers, Smithsonian excavator. If it is a toothed whale, its discovery will be an equally valuable contribution to science and history.

"If it is a whale," Rogers said, "it died about the time the bottom of the sea rose, as it has been exposed to the air during the process of petrification, and is therefore imperfect and brittle. If it had petrified beneath the water, I believe it would have been as solid and hard as other specimens we have in the museum."

Capt. Bob Ord, veteran Santa Barbara navigator, made the discovery, and reported his find to scientific investigators. Except for the tusk of a sabre-toothed tiger found there 10 years ago, no mammal had ever been found on the quake-heaved island before.

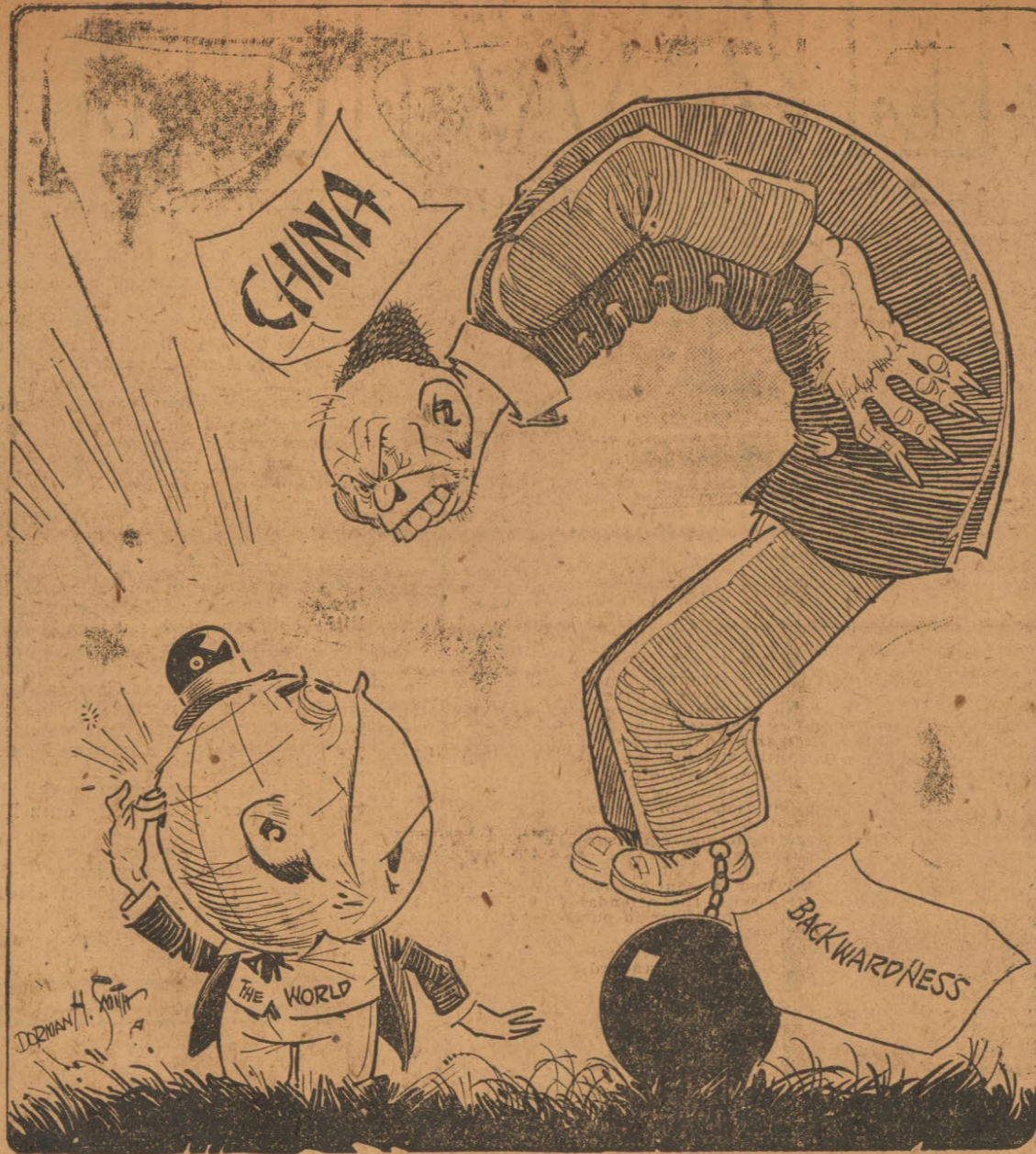

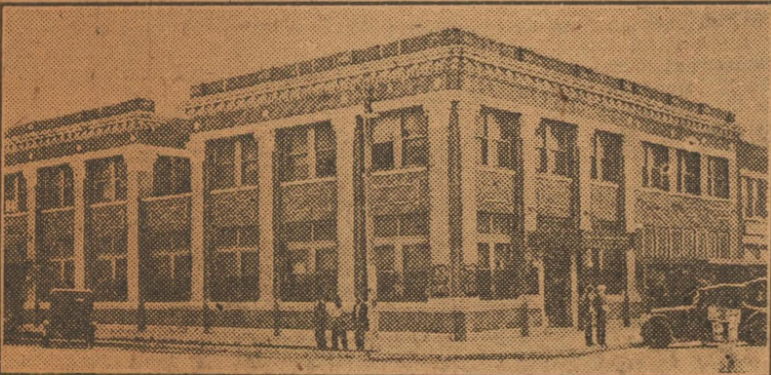
GRASSHOPPER PEST APPEARS DIMINISHED THIS YEAR

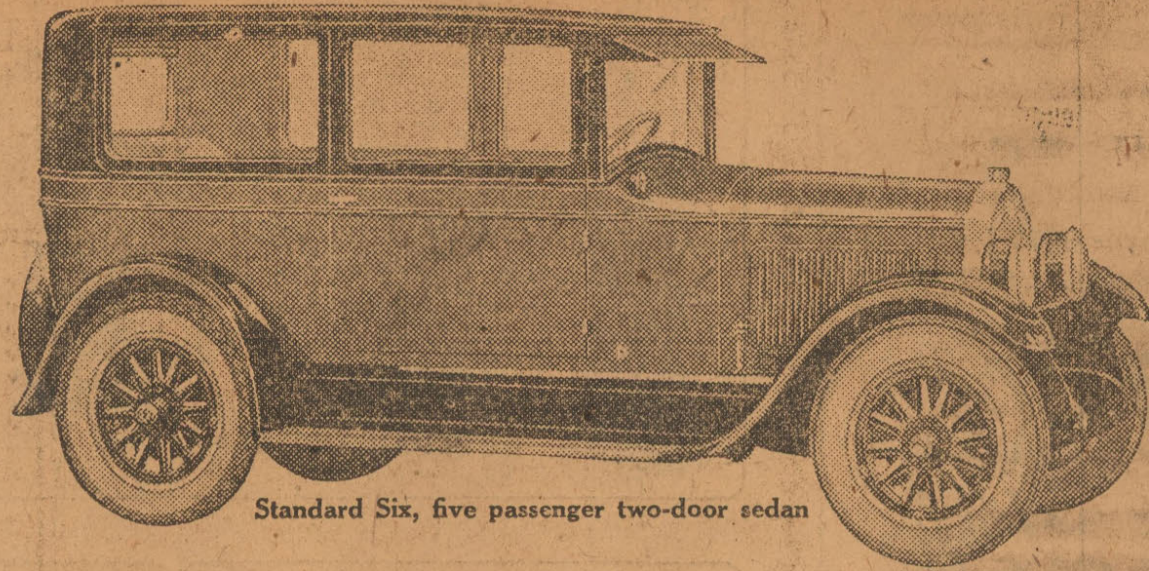
TEXAS PREPARING FOR COMMODITY RATES HEARING

Yet federal reserve bank representatives from all parts of the country told Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Dewey, recently, that they don't believe his attempt to popularize \$2 bills will succeed. They reminded him of his failure to get silver cartwheels back into circulation.

"Yes," argued Dewey, "but there was some sense in that. Cartwheels really are pretty heavy to lug around. This prejudice against \$2 bills is so silly."

"No sillier than a prejudice against Friday the 13th," rejoined the bankers.

Still, they promised to try.

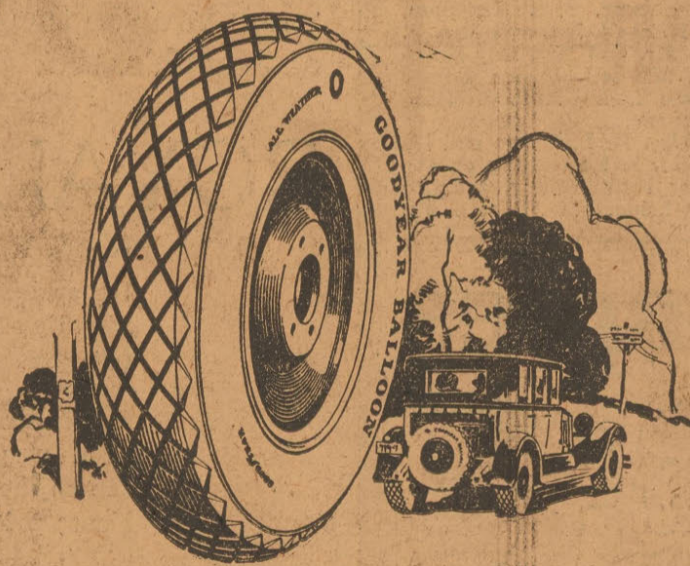
THE country's tremendous demand for paper currency has the bureau of engraving and printing simply run ragged. Working overtime, it can't turn the stuff out fast enough. Dewey's

idea is to make people use bigger bills, so they won't need so many. "I'll save a bill," is his reasoning, "every time I get a two, accepted in place of two ones." And so he will, but can he get enough "twos" accepted to make the saving amount to much?

SOME more suggestions were offered:

- 1. Enlargement of the government's money-making plant. 2. Bills about the size of cigar store coupons, such as many countries get along with. They save raw material and fit into pocket-books flat, avoiding the creasing, mauling and wadding up, which wear them out so fast now. 3. More durable bills—tougher paper, to make them last longer.

THE trouble with all these schemes is that they take time and the engraving and printing bureau's emergency is right now. It's already behind with its work and the demand is piling up. Something's got to be done, and pronto, or there'll be a paper money famine throughout the land.

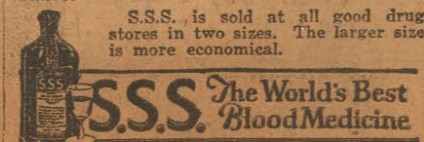
