COAL SHORTAGE TO TIE UP ROADS IN SEVEN WEEKS

Government Official Says Continued Strike Will Paralyze Transportation.

WASHINGTON, June 26-The reserve coal supplies of the railroads will be exhausted completely within seven weeks, if the coal strike continues as at present, it was estimated today by the department of commerce.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 26 .-Paralysis of industry and transportation on a countrywide scale is not many weeks distant if the coal strike continues, George Otis Smith, director of the United States geological survey-the man who keeps his fingers on the nation's reserve coal supply-stated in a speech today before the National Conference of Social Workers.

Basic refoms in the coal industry are necessary before permanent peace can come, he said.

governor is feared by physicians. "Thank God, she lived to see me vindicated," he said. "My enemies have brought this other great sorrow upon me." Throngs stood outside the Small home throughout the night, waiting for physicians' bulletins

ELECTRA, June 26.-Randall Gandy, 4 years old, met death last night 180 feet below the surface of the earth in the McKenzie Oil well, two miles east of Electra, while 5,000 frantic persons vainly tried to rescue him. The little boy was playing near the well and was seen to fall feet first into the hole. His mother lies in a Burkburnett hospital with a baby born a few days ago. She has not been informed of the boy's death. The father, Lee Gandy, for hours directed citizens in an effort to devise some means of rescue. The boy fell into the hole about

8:30 o'clock. The last faint cries from him were heard about 11. Water was gradually encroaching in the hole and he was forced to watch them gradually engulf him and exterminate his life. Grappling hooks could not be used because of fear of mangling the body. Several young men volunteered to be lowered in the hole feet first but none were small enough.




