The average American is prone to take things for granted. The miracles of modern invention to him soon descend to the level of the common-

In this connection we are reminded of an incident at Phoenix, Ariz., several years ago when the third big public exhibition in this country of Cherry and the hostess. the ability of man to fly through the air was demonstrated.

We had not had the opportunity to go out to the fair grounds on the afternoon when the first flight was made and we asked a citizen on his return from the grounds how the performance succeeded.

"Rotten," he replied. "They just flew around like a couple of darn birds."

He had witnessed one of the marvels of all the ages, the sight of man flying through the air by means of a device of human invention. And he passed it off with the casual comment "rotten."

All of which is merely by way of preface to consideration of the celebration recently by the American Institute in New York of its 100th anniversary. In its celebration there was made manifest the stupendous changes our national life has undergone during the past century.

A glance at the list of things the institute has done in its 100-year career is sufficient.

The first telephone was displayed in this exhibition hall. So was the OLDEN MISSIONARY SOCIETY. first telegraph. The McCormick reaper went on display there. Colt's fire arms got their first showing there. The first modern printing press was given its initial display there. In 1851 the institute awarded a gold medal to the makers of the first sewing machine.

Brought up as we are in the midst of mechanical marvels, it is almost impossible for us to realize what life was like in the old days. It seems odd to think that such matter-ofcourse things as the telegraph, the telephone, the sewing machine and so on were all invented less than 100

In the old days, if a man's house was on fire and he wanted to summon help, he had to run cross-lots to get it. Now he simply rings the fire department.

In the old days, newspapers had to wait days for news of importance. All the news from Europe was anywhere from two weeks to a month in getting across the Atlantic; even at home, the people of Philadelphia could not know what was going on in Boston, Mr. Patterson for the boys, and Miss for instance, until three or four days later. Every school boy knows that the battle of New Orleans was fought after the war had formally ended. Doctor Says Middle Life Is Time to Guard Against Heart Ills

By United Press.

By WILLIAM S. SADLER, M. D. (Written for United Press) CHICAGO, March 28.—Heart disease is responsible for twice as many deaths as ny other disease. In 1926 the death rate from heart disorders increased from 186 to 199 per 100,-000 population in the United States. Practically one person out of ever 500 dies of some form of heart disease. No other cause of death is

mounting with comparable rapidity. Since very few persons under 40 years of age die with heart disease, and since both the heavy death rates and the larger populations are in the younger years, the heavy heart disease rate means that the chance very great that any man over 40 will pass away from this disease.

Important among the causes of heart trouble are the after-effects of the infectious diseases. Most of the ground-work for heart disease is laid down in childhood, and in our efforts at prevention we must con centrate on the children of school age and guard against the more common infectious diseases.

When young adults are systematically examined, as is now done on entrance to colleges, it is found that a large proportion have heart mur-murs. These subjects deny that they have ever had heart trouble or that they have any symptoms of it at the time of the examination. When closely questioned they tell of having had rheur tism, St. Vitus' Dance, or some eruptive disease, but they


