MANY COMBATS ARE REPORTED OVER MEXICO

Eighteen Rebels Are Reported Killed During Fight at Salamanca.

MEXICO, Feb. 7.—There have been frequent combats between rebel and federal troops in four states in the past few days according to advices here and in one engagement 18 rebels were killed, it was reported. The most serious combat was reported when rebels attacked the town of Salamanca after cutting communications. There was a vigorous engagement, the advices say after which 18 rebel dead were counted. The war department said that combats have become frequent in the past few nights in the states of Jalisco, Michoacan, Aguascalientes and Colima. MORE THAN 125 WOMEN REGISTER AT THE OPENING OF THE TIMES COOKING SCHOOL

Mrs. Chitwood Demonstrates Making of the Rare "Danish Paste" at First Session Monday At American Legion Hall

The largest crowd of women that has ever attended the Ranger Times cooking schools, heard Mrs. Ida Chitwood lecture on how to make perfect pastry and pies, on the opening day of the school being held at the American Legion club rooms, Ranger. Additional seating accommodations had to be provided for the more than 125 women at the first session. The chief culinary product that Mrs. Chitwood made on the opening day of the cooking school was Danish paste, a crust that one of the leading chefs in the Hotel Pennsylvania of New York brought back the recipe for from Europe. Mrs. Chitwood also made the famous Sunshine Pie and French tarts. The recipes for all of Mrs. Chitwood's works are given on at the school each day and she urges that the women bring their notebooks and pencils to copy them. During the school, which will last one week, Mrs. Chitwood will follow every line of foodstuffs and will give lectures on correct diet and balancing meals. Mrs. Chitwood brought out yesterday that the important element in any pie is the crust. "Pie crust is made light and flaky by the expansion in the heat of the oven, of cold air incorporated between the particles of shortening and the flour that makes the paste. In mixing the paste, therefore, the object is to incorporate as much air as possible, and, once having incorporated it, not to press it out by too heavy handling," Mrs. Chitwood said. "Air is incorporated into pastry by cutting the shortening into the sifted flour and salt. The ordinary way of working the ingredients with the fingers warms the shortening so that it absorbs the flour, thus eliminating

About 25 Eastland county farmers met with County Agent J. C. Patterson Monday night at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce headquarters to discuss the plan of purchasing thoroughbred bulls and Jersey milk cows. Indications were made that bulls would be purchased for Ranger, Olden, Colony and Staff, thus making this district accessible to the thoroughbred stock. No orders were placed last night for the milk cows but several of the farmers and stock raisers indicated that purchase would be made before the purchasing committee left. The final time to send in requisition for the thoroughbred stock has been set at Saturday, Feb. 11. On Monday following the committee will leave for an inspection and purchasing tour. The committee will go to Fairburn and Taft to look over the thoroughbred stock in that vicinity. Others who met with the farmers at the meeting last night and discussed the value of the project were J. E. T. Peters, secretary of the Cico Chamber of Commerce; Dr. L. C. Buchanan, Ranger; Wayne C. Hickey, secretary of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce; George W. Briggs, secretary of the Eastland Board of City Development, and E. H. Varnell, Cico, vocational agricultural agent. All of the farmers present at the meeting seemed vitally interested in the better cattle movement and from all indications the committee will be able to purchase a carload of the fine cattle for distribution in the county.

Justice Collecting Many Car License

RANGER WILL GET PUBLICITY FROM RACE ENTRANTS

Details of Long Race From Los Angeles to New York Explained in Full.

One of the greatest publicity events that Ranger has known for many years will be the running of the cross continental race by two of Ranger's own athletes, Homer Ship, star high school track man who was captain of the 1926 track squad and co-captain of the junior college eleven last fall, and Kenneth Campbell, for several years, holder of the district mile event over the oilbelt section. They will make their appearance in Los Angeles on Feb. 12th and announce that they are participants in the Los Angeles to New York race representing the "City of Flowing Gold," Ranger. The race will be conducted in the following manner: The contestants will be started from Los Angeles by night control points, ranging in distance of approximately forty to seventy-five miles apart, according to the condition of the road, climate, etc., will be specified in advance of start. Contestants may run or walk, as they please, the actual time consumed by each between their start and finish at control points being credited daily. Each morning all contestants will start at the same manner as at Los Angeles and will run daily on the same system. For example, should contestant number 77 gain 30 minutes on the second contest each day, he will be started each morning with the field, and although he may be leading the race by thirty hours on the day before the finish of the race in New York, he will be started with the field from the previous night control on the morning of the finish at the same time all other contestants start. This is the only manner in which the race can be supervised successfully by officials. A caravan of trucks, busses, private and official cars to provide transportation for officials, doctors, directors, shoe-repairmen equipment, newspaper and press correspondents, photographer, motion picture news weekly cameramen, personal effects, etc., will accompany contestants over the entire route from Los Angeles to New York City. The race will begin on Sunday, March 4. The route has been designated and each large city that the contestants pass through are offering prizes to the entrants reaching the city first.

Average Of Retail Food Prices Shown

DALLAS, Feb. 7.—Although there has been a big increase in the price of retail food, since 1913, it is found that Texas cities pay no more on the average, and on many articles, less than other cities in the country. An average marks that Texas buys its necessary foodstuff at a lower price, it is found in statistics from the United States department of labor. The cities of Atlanta, Ga., Dallas, Houston, Little Rock, Memphis and New Orleans are compared as to the cost of what practically every Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Jones will buy for dinner tonight. Mrs. Smith of Memphis will pay 43.5 cents tonight for a pound of sirloin steak, which cost her when she was first married in 1913, 24.2 cents. In Dallas, Mrs. Smith saved some money. That same pound of sirloin cost her 37.8 cents, although in 1913 she could have bought it for 23.6 cents. Prices in Houston were 35 cents, still cheaper; 37.1 cents in Little Rock, 39.9 cents in Atlanta, 36.3 cents in New Orleans. On Sunday for her hens for the visitors, Mrs. Smith of Atlanta spends 36.1 cents for a pound out of Mr. Smith's Saturday night check. Hens in Dallas are cheaper, costing 32.1 cents a pound. Hens are 32.5 cents in Houston, 29.8 cents in Little Rock, 32.5 cents in Memphis, and 35 cents in New Orleans. Although Mrs. Smith paid 10 cents a quart in 1913 for fresh milk for John Jr., in Atlanta, she now has to pay 13 cents a quart for Bessie Jane. Dallas pays 13 cents a quart for its milk; Houston, 15.6 cents; Little Rock, 15 cents; Memphis, 15 cents, and New Orleans, 14 cents. Butter in Atlanta is 56.7 cents a pound. In Dallas it is 56.7 cents, Houston, 55.7 cents; Little Rock, 54.8 cents; Memphis, 55.6 cents, and New Orleans, 56.4 cents. In Atlanta, eggs are 57 cents a dozen, this meaning strictly fresh. Storage eggs run cheaper. In Dallas 48.8 cents will buy a dozen fresh eggs; Houston, 42.9 cents a dozen; Little Rock, 43.4 cents; Memphis, 48.8 cents and New Orleans, 46.6 cents a dozen.

CONFERENCES TO BOOST MOODY AS NOMINEE HELD

AUSTIN, Feb. 7.—Conferences have already been started in practically every county in the state seeking to make Governor Dan Moody presidential nominee, according to W. A. Keeling, former attorney general. In today's Austin American, Keeling is quoted as saying "We are sincere in our belief that Moody can be president and a systematic serious drive is under way and gaining strength every day. Officers and volunteer units will be perfected shortly."

House Appropriates \$65,000 For Survey

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The house today acted towards settling long standing boundary differences between the U. S. and Mexico by passing the Madden bill appropriation of \$65,000 for a survey by the state department from El Paso to Quitman, Texas. The survey would meet provision of a proposed treaty adjusting the differences. A comparison of taxes in Texas with other states showed that Texas pays 17 1/2 cents per horse power plus 40 cents to 75 cents per 100 pounds on licenses. Some of the other states investigated by Colquitt's committee are Alabama whose tax is based on horsepower, \$11.25 to \$30; Arkansas, \$15 to \$150; California, \$3 registration fee; Colorado, 1-2 of one per cent; Kansas, on weight, \$8 plus 50 cents per 100 pounds. Many of the states have the gasoline tax which was put into effect in Texas last year. The size of the tax in other states is Alabama, two cents; California, two cents; Kansas, two cents; Colorado, two cents; New Mexico, five cents; Mississippi, four cents; Arkansas, five cents; Oklahoma, three cents, and Texas, three cents. One fourth of the gasoline tax is used for the upkeep of the roads in Texas. "The estimated revenues in Texas from the gasoline tax and the license tax will be \$28,000,000. If we estimate on every million cars," the survey read, "in the state at an average of \$800, the two forms of taxation would be equal to three and one-half percent on the average value. If we estimate the average value of cars at \$700 the tax would be equal to four per cent. The average tax in the larger cities of Texas, where most of the automobiles are, is three and one-half per cent to four per cent for ad valorem purposes, state, city and county taxes, inclusive."

JUSTICE TAKES TIME TO STUDY STEWART CASE

Standard Official Challenges Senate's Right To Demand His Answers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Justice Jennings Bailey, took under advisement in District of Columbia supreme court today the question of the United States senate's right to compel Col. Robert W. Stewart to answer questions put by the Tea Pot dome committee. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana formally challenged in court the senate's power to require him to testify concerning disposal of \$3,000,000 in liberty bonds, profits of the Continental Trading company. The senate maintained it had such power and asked dismissal of a habeas corpus writ on which Stewart was released last Saturday. It was on this motion that Justice Bailey reserved decision. Justice Bailey gave Stewart's attorneys until next Monday to file a brief on law involved and the senate was given until Friday to file a reply.

Texas Will Have \$33,500,000 For Roads This Year

DALLAS, Feb. 7.—Texas will have approximately \$33,500,000 in 1928 to maintain and build new highways, according to the survey of Former Governor O. B. Colquitt, until recently chairman of the state tax survey committee. During the next five years Texas should complete at least 1,000 miles of first class roads each year, Colquitt's report estimates. During 1927, 31 per cent of the total cost of government, or \$20,092,000 was spent on highways. This year Colquitt believes that \$28,000,000 should be derived from the three-cent gasoline tax and the automobile license tax. In addition to this the state will have around \$5,298,429 from federal aid. The latest report of the state highway commission stated there were 7,345.55 miles of state and federal aid roads in Texas with nearly \$38,000,000 spent on them since 1924. One third of this sum came from the federal government.

SALESMANSHIP.

Business institutions, both large and small, all over the country are rapidly adopting the idea that salesmanship is about the most important factor in the success or failure of any business venture. Most of them also have very materially changed their ideas of what really constitutes salesmanship.

A decade or two ago the old-time drummer was the usually accepted type of ideal salesman. But the old-time drummer with his domineering manner has gone and his place has been taken by the modern salesman.

There are just as many, yes many times more, traveling salesmen today as there used to be drummers, yet you cannot tell one from a business man in any other walk of life by his manner and dress.

The salesman of today dresses neatly but not gaudily. Meet him on the streets or in a place of business where he is conducting a sale and you might take him for a customer rather than a salesman.

Granted that every salesman must have a good product, honestly manufactured and well advertised, his work consists principally in making and keeping friends among his customers. His object is to help the merchant, to advise with him about his needs and then do his best to meet those needs. He does not resort to any of the old tricks of the trade that were so common 15 or 20 years ago. His success depends on keeping a customer just as much as it does on getting that customer. The best salesman of today would no more intentionally overload an inexperienced customer on his product than he would rob his cash register. For he knows that an overloaded customer means a loss in business.

The salesman of today is more of a goodwill man than he used to be. Not the loud-talking, back-slapping kind, but the genteel, quiet fellow who really makes a friend of the man on whom he calls.

Salesmanship is largely a matter of friendship, especially where the question of quality in goods is about equal and manufacturers and jobbers have not been slow to recognize this fact. A very good traveling salesman remarked not long ago that he scarcely ever made a sale these days, but that he was very particular in maintaining the friendships he had formed in his territory. His idea was that as long as his friendship was secure and his goods stood the test his territory was well cared for.

Sales is one of the biggest factors that go to make success in any line. Goods of any kind have no particular value unless they are moving. Factories cannot exist unless their products are moved out as rapidly as they are ready for the market and jobbers cannot continue in business unless they in turn move the goods of the retailer and the retailer in turn moves them on to the consumer. The salesman who puts stock in a store is just as much interested in seeing it moved out to the consumer as he was to see it put in stock and his work is not finished until he co-operates with the retailer in moving it.

MAGPIES AS WELL AS TAXES RILE FARMERS

By United Press.
 WASHINGTON—Magpies, famous in nursery rhymes, are getting bad reputations among farmers, according to the agriculture department.

Once magpies were considered beneficial around farms as their diet includes injurious insects, but investigations by government experts showed them to be ardent rogues.

Magpies steal eggs from chicken yards to carry to their young and sometimes kill chickens. They show great partiality to cherry orchards.

The worse offense of the birds is harriving weak or wounded animals and even occasionally sound and healthy creatures. Its method of killing game is torturous—pecking and enlarging a wound of an animal, finally resulting in death.

Where magpies have become a nuisance the agriculture department recommends poisoning or shooting of strychnine, so this poison makes the best bait.

BOY 14 HAS 64 'BABY HOLDUPS'

That he had committed 64 thefts from children in four weeks, was the confession made by a fourteen-year-old boy in Glasgow, Scotland, recently. He is said to have waited at store doors and when children came out with purchases he held them up and told them that the wrong change had been given them and that he had been sent to get the change back that the error might be righted. He then disappeared and used part of the money to gamble with adults.



Bingham picked them up while in China last summer. They are propaganda cartoons issued by Chinese nationalists and communists to illustrate their versions of what foreign imperialists were doing to the people. The tall and handsome senator from Connecticut says the style of the art is Russian rather than Chinese.

The largest cartoon, covering most of one side of Bingham's inner office, shows a Chinese being killed by a foreigner in uniform. Another shows a Chinese entwined by a serpent labeled "unequal treaties" and beset by a rat, a tiger, a wolf, an alligator and a wasp, representing other evils. In another, our own Uncle Sam is shown garroting China, whose head is caught tight by a closing door entitled "unequal treaties."

A gent in Prairie du Chien, Wis., thinks the house rules committee makes the baseball rules.

"Inform rules committee open the right way to count bases," he writes a Minnesota congressman. "You should investigate with congress and Mr. Calvin Coolidge to try to be sen-

sible in national game base ball no base to count on fly ball, out on first base, three strikes is out—." And more of the same.

The Association Against the Prohibition Amendment professes to be liberal and tolerant and not pharisaic and intolerant like the Anti-Saloon league. It doesn't always live up to its professions, which may be a point for the league, because the league makes no such pretensions.

In a recent propaganda "news release" the association, with elaborate sarcasm, welcomed into high places in the dry ranks General Augustino Cesar Sandino of Nicaragua and Sultan Ibn Saud of Nejd.

"Such scum as this," it said in effect, "are the sort who join American prohibitionists to enforce prohibition on their people."

Leaving aside old Ibn Saud, who was at last accounts the best fighting man in Arabia, the association shunned the liberal viewpoint altogether. The liberal viewpoint is that Sandino, long since admitted by his enemies to be more than a bandit, is

a foolishly brave patriot unfortunate enough to be opposed by U. S. marines. Furthermore, when two good fighting men like Ibn Saud and Sandino make their troops stay sober it would seem that the association might with good grace let that fact be hallowed by the league.

Smith, director of the play, is working with the cast nightly and expects the members to be in perfect form by Monday night.

The play, "Comrades" is the official American Legion play for Texas.

The second annual Olympic winter sports will start this week at St. Moritz, Switzerland.

The United States is represented by a strong team, including speed-skaters (ski-men, figure skaters and bob-sleighters).

A victory in a majority of the events on the winter program would start this country off on the right track towards another triumph in another Olympiad.

Germany is making a particularly strong bid for Olympic honors this year, and would have no objection to starting in right away with a victory in the winter games.

These games, of course, do not compare in importance with those at Amsterdam next July, but there is no harm in winning them, if one has a mind to do so.

Germany and France have entered the strongest teams. Strangely enough, Japan is to be represented in the winter sports.

American men and women are entered in 11 events, as follows: Speed skating, figure skating for men, and for women, couple skating, ski-running and jumping, two ski races and one event for jumpers.

Twenty-four nations, a record

number, are taking part in this week's program at St. Moritz.

As for the Olympic games at Amsterdam, which will come later in the year, no little dissatisfaction is being expressed in connection with the water sports.

European rowing authorities are squawking about the facilities for the crews which will compete at Amsterdam.

The strip of water selected for the Olympic races is exceedingly narrow. Only two boats can row abreast on the course chosen by the Netherlands Olympic committee.

Since between 30 and 40 crews will compete, each of the survivors must row four races in five days.


With plans completed for sending to Amsterdam a capable team of American boxers, it is interesting to note that Great Britain also will be represented in boxing at the 1928 Olympic games.

A special meeting of the Amateur Boxing association of Great Britain recently passed a resolution to send a team of boxers to the ninth Olympiad.

The British will be represented in the rowing events at Amsterdam, also, although the British Amateur Rowing association has voted not to send crews.

The National Amateur Rowing association, which has almost as much to say where water sports are concerned, has decided to send a crew to the Olympics.

New Football Rules

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—The national rules committee after a week end meeting, passed upon three changes in gridiron code for 1928.

The committee ruled that: 1. That either a muff or a fumble of a punt may be recovered by the kicking side, but not advanced

beyond the point of recovery. 2. That a backward or lateral pass must be tossed at least two yards to be classed as such and that it may be recovered by the defensive side if grounded but not advanced, thus doing away with the protection afforded under the rules last year to hidden ball and other trick passes behind the line of scrimmage.

3. That no player on the side making a forward pass and who has crossed the line of scrimmage may interfere with an opponent until the ball has been touched, thereby doing away with what the committee believes has been unfair blocking and checking, to screen the pass receiver, by players who themselves are not eligible to receive the pass.

One finds missing the names of Paddock, Murchison, McGrath, Helfrich and Taylor. Also, it is noticed that Harold Oakley holds only one place on the Ferris selections instead of the three as in other years.

Youth is no respecter of age, and it is youth that has displaced these veterans of the track world. Karl Wildermuth, Lancelot Ross, Sabin Carr, Ray Conger, Johnny Gibson, Herman Phillips, Anton Burg, and other young track stars are taking the spotlight.

It must not be taken for granted, however, that the veterans are through. With the exception of Loren Murchison, who is recovering from a recent illness, all of them are pretty certain to be in competition this summer.

Age of Specialization. It is worthy of note, in view of the recent statements of Dr. Otto C. Peltzer on track specialization, that only two athletes gained more than one place on Ferris' all-star squad.

Willie Ritola, the Finnish runner, and Harry Hinkel, of the New York A. C., have four and two places, respectively.

Ritola is given, and given deservedly, first choice in the six-mile run, the 10-mile run, the steeplechase and the cross-country. He won national titles in all these events last year.

Hinkel displaces Willie Plant as America's premier walker, being placed in the list for the three-mile and seven-mile events, while Plant is chosen in only the mile pace.

Dr. Peltzer, praising American track standards, said that athletes specialized in events. This statement is clearly emphasized by Ferris' selections, as a different man is chosen for almost every event.

Watch This Tenorio. Don't be surprised if you hear plenty from now on of Lope Tenorio, the Filipino lightweight, who drew with Bruce Flowers in New York a few days ago.

Tenorio, previous to meeting Flowers, had defeated Stan Loayza and Joey Glick in bouts at Cleveland, and went on to New York to fight Flowers in a headliner at the Garden without ever having appeared there before.

That, so we are told, is the second time in the history of boxing that a fighter has been in the main bout at Madison Square Garden without having first appeared there as a preliminary fighter.

Tenorio, in both Cleveland and New York, has shown the makings of a great as well as a pleasing fighter. He can punch, he can take it, and he likes to fight. It is not strange that he is a fighting fighter, however, as most of the boys who have come over here from the islands in the Pacific have been crowd pleasers.

Tenorio, before he started wielding the mitts, was a street car conductor in his native land. It can be safely

said that those days are over, and it won't be nickels that he will be collecting from now on.

Tommy Burketown was lured away from the camp, and the father and several other natives fell upon him. He was then taken to a gully, and there the assailants commenced an age-old tribal practice of butchering him alive. Strips of flesh from the shoulder to the hip bone were cut from the medicine man's body. Meantime, word had been sent across to the mainland concerning the af-

fray. Detectives rushed across to Palm Island in a swift motorboat and surprised the natives, interrupting their savage ritual.

Farmer's Are Greatest Consumers Of Lumber

Special Correspondence.
COLLEGE STATION.—American farmers use more wood than any other class of American citizens about thirteen billion board feet of lumber and 900,000,000 fence posts, being used annually in addition to enormous quantities of fuel wood, C. B. Webster, farm forester, extension service and Texas forest service, A. & M. College of Texas has pointed out. At least twenty percent of this material is used to replace wood lost by decay, a loss that runs into millions of dollars each year. In fence posts alone the annual replacement is enormous and expensive. A method that has been found satisfactory in preventing decay in wood and that is adaptable for use on the farm is to apply coal tar creosote to the timber. An open tank method is best for posts and can be easily used on the farm, Mr. Webster said.

Sociologist Urges More Rural Exercise

Special Correspondence.
COLLEGE STATION.—Although farm life affords ample opportunity in its ordinary workings for plenty of physical exercise, there is as distinct a need for recreational activities in the rural sections as in the cities, Prof. Daniel Russell, head of the department of rural sociology, A. & M. College of Texas, said in recent discussion of a recreation program for every rural community. Properly interpreted, recreation means anything outside the regular routine of life that will bring wholesome relaxation and benefit to the mind and body, he added. Among features suggested for a rural recreation program he included nature study for farm boys and girls, proper reading program, pageantry and dramatics based on farm history, athletics, other games and various community social affairs.

WOULD MAKE PARIS SKYSCRAPER CITY

PARIS.—One of the leading architects of France, M. Le Corbusier, has a plan to make Paris a city of skyscrapers, with avenues 20 yards wide and cross streets at intervals of 350 or 450 yards. An immense structure of 60 floors would be built in the center of each of these enormous blocks. In the heart of the new capital M. Le Corbusier would have a subterranean railroad terminal feeding all lines running out of the city and an over head airport for aircraft, the street surface being reserved for automobile traffic.

In this manner, the architect contends in his book "Urbanism" Paris would consist of two cities, one devoted to business, the other a residential district, separated by a main avenue running from east to west. He believes that the initial outlay in condemnation proceedings and rebuilding, estimated at a billion dollars, would be ample repaid by the increased efficiency and real estate income.






ested. "The base enemies of law and


order are determined to chivvy you

It will be necessary to give a brief description of the house and its interior arrangement, for the somewhat peculiar structure of the building played a vital part in the seemingly insoluble problem posed by the murder.

The house, which was a four-story stone structure, originally built as a residence, had been remodeled, both inside and outside, to meet the re-

The main entrance to the building was directly on the street, and extended straight back from the front door was a wide hallway. About half way down the front hall, on the right-hand side, was the stairway leading to the floors above; and directly beyond was the stairway, also on the right, was a small reception-room with a wide archway instead of a door. Directly opposite to the stairway, in a small recess, stood the telephone switchboard. There was no elevator in the house.

Another important feature of this ground plan was a small passageway at the rear of the main hall and at right angles to it, which led past the front walls of the Odell apartment to a door opening on a court at the west side of the building. This court was connected with the street by an alley four feet wide.

In the accompanying diagram this arrangement of the ground plan can be easily visualized, and I suggest that the reader fix it in his mind; for I doubt if ever before so simple and obvious an architectural design played such an important part in a criminal mystery. By its very simplicity and almost conventional familiarity—indeed, by its total lack of any puzzling complications—it proved so baffling to the investigators that the case threatened for many days, to remain forever insoluble. Beef Fritters

Bits of cold left-over beef, useless for anything else, make a delicious meal for four people.

- 1 cup chopped cold beef
- 1 tablespoon chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup flour
- 1 egg beaten
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Beat egg, add milk, flour and baking powder sifted together. Beat smooth. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well. Drop by spoonfuls into Crisco heated to 360° F. or when bread crumbs brown in 60 seconds. Fry until brown and thoroughly cooked. Drain on brown paper. Serve with any left-over gravy or the following sauce:

Balloons

Fried Spinach Balls
