



Farm Improvement **Principal Business Development** in Year

AUSTIN, Feb. 13 .- "Possibly the outstanding development during the year 1927 was the improvement in agriculture," according to Bervard Nichols, editor of the monthly Texas Business Review, published by the bureau of business research of the University of Texas. "For several years prior to 1927 agriculture was passing through a rather prolonged years prior to 1927 agriculture was passing through a rather prolonged period of unfavorable returns," Mr. Nichols observed. "The situation was changed about the middle of last year and the general farm price index has been above the all commo-

index has been above the air commo-dity index since that time. "The first month of the new year changed the situation very little and the outlook for agriculture is encour-aging for the first half of the year at least," Mr. Nichols said. "Frost demease could in Lanuary has been damage early in January has been largely overcome; the loss of crop will be largely overcome by higher prices. Decreased acreage of some early truck crops will be made up by larger plantings of others.
