Men Resign at Noon Monday, But Chief Fills Ranks With New Men.

Three members of the Ranger Fire Department today at noon handed in their resignations to Fire Chief George Murphy, when they were informed that the city commission would not allow a raise in salary at this time.

The men, Bryan Parrish, driver; Quicy Hammett and Charlie Isbell, firemen, laid aside their uniforms immediately after a small fire on Melvin street had been extinguished.

Fire Chief Murphy stated this af ternoon that the men asked him to apply to the city commission a few days ago for a raise in salary and at that time informed him that if it was not allowed they would resigna-

ficials. He further stated that taxes were coming in slow and that the expenses of the city were such that a raise in salary could not be conscien-

tiously given.

The firemen stated that their salaries ranged from \$100 to \$110 a month and it is understood that they asked for a flat rate of \$125 a month. The men are also furnished their rooms at the firehall.

The firemen told Murphy Sunday night that they had agreed that they should be paid a higher salary and that if they didn't get the raise they were "going to quit."

Dalton Reese, driver, was the only paid fireman, besides Chief Murphy, that did not hand in his resignation this afternoon.
