James Glaze has recently returned from Houston where he attended the annual stockholders meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston.

The meeting was attended by representatives of 68 Federal Land Bank Associations located throughout Texas.

About 450 persons were present for the meeting.

Delegates, alternates and guests heard President Herbert H. Decker give the annual report and addressed by Edwin A. Jaenke, governor of the Farm Credit Administration; Nat S. Rogers, president of the First City National Bank of Houston and President of the American Bankers Association.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term loans on farm and ranch property throughout Texas.

Mrs. Rennels said application was made to the Texas Fine Arts Commission in Austin for \$692.25 in matching funds to obtain the program for Muleshoe. She explained that the Texas Fine Arts Commission will match funds to bring cultural events to localities. However, stressed Mrs. Rennels, this cannot be a profit-making venture as all funds over the actual expenses involved must go into a special fund to be used for additional cultural programs to Muleshoe, including such things as plays, musicals, dances and other art and creative events.

Texas created the Texas Fine Arts Commission in order to make available to localities federal funds. This is done through the National Endowment for the Arts which is based in Washington.

Culture has been defined as "the training, development and refinement of mind, morals and taste, enlightenment."

Fine arts is further defined as "those arts considered to be purely esthetic (pertaining to the beautiful rather than to merely pleasing or useful) or expressive, including painting, drawing, sculpture and architecture, and sometimes literature, music, drama and the dance."

Doctor Shortage Hampers Service

With most smaller hospitals, especially in what may be considered the more remote areas of the country, finding acute doctor shortages hampering operations, more and more hospitals are going the hospital district route.

Doctors are declining to accept positions in small out-of-date hospitals. It has been explained that the average citizen does not realize when a hospital has a drastic shortage of working equipment, but doctors are completely aware of what a hospital has to offer when they are contemplating that hospital or town as a base of operation.

Too, many hospitals have been forced to close their doors as their equipment and services are not adequate to meet Medi-

care and Medicaid qualifications. Administrators comment that the small hospital does not pay for itself with patient loads without the funds from the two agencies.

Last weekend, Clarendon in Donley County, became another name in the long and growing list who took the route and voted in a Hospital District. The new hospital district will be known as the Donley County Hospital District.

Their community was hampered by a 60-year old hospital and a recent condemnation of the facility by the State Health Agency.

Donley County has approximately 2200 voters and 1336 of those registered showed up at the polls to cast their vote Cont. on Page 2, Col. 4
