the milk, which had no effect. According to the narration, the youth who was destined to die within five or six hours from the time he took the overdoes of the drug, drank a carbonated drink which speeded up the process and potency of the drug.

The youth went to some

him because they did not want to be involved. They refused to take him to a hospital but shuttled him from car to car for the next few hours. The 'friends' took him to the place he had purchased the drug, the people he had bought the drug from refused to help. Finally, concluded the narrative, one friend took the youth to the hospital where he died in the emergency room.

This is just part of one of the numerous true-to-life drug tales given during the meeting. All the stories were familiar to the drug abuse group, as the things happened to people they know or knew, as some of them are now dead.

Emphasized was the fact that 'Speed' or methedrine is the most dangerous drug of all. It drug is usually pushed off on kids or new users who are not


