





Use standard recipe for baked shell. 4 cups strawberries 4 tablespoons cornstarch ½ pint cream

Mix half the sugar with the berries. Bring to boil in a saucepan. Then add the rest of the sugar mixed with the cornstarch. Stir until it begins to thicken. Then cool and turn into the baked shell. Cover with sweetened whipped cream. Chill before serving.

Japanese Lemon Pie Use standard recipe for baked shell.

4 egg yolks beaten 1 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt

juice of 1 lemon
½ teaspoon baking Mix egg yolks, sugar, salt, lemon juice and rind. Cook in double boiler stirring until thick. Cool. Beat egg whites stiff, add baking powder. Fold into first mixture. Turn into baked crust, set in moderate oven (350° F.) to brown.



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

Another tenth believes that "some dark horse" will get it, and the rest are divided between Hoover and Dawes, with Hoover in something of a majority. These divisions are not representative of personal desires and have no particular importance, although your correspondent undertakes to gossip with such persons as are most likely to know what's going on.

There has been a mild revival recently of the "draft Coolidge" talk, and that may well be a significant iter, in the current fanning.

Mr. Coolidge, of course, is not a candidate. Neither is Vice President Dawes, but if Hoover fails to win a majority of delegates the choice is likely to lie between them. In case of a deadlock, Dawes has been considered the most logical compromise, but if the forthcoming struggle becomes bitter enough, the Hoover crowd, already considering the vice president the one big threat in Hoover's path, may turn to Coolidge if ver's path, may turn to Coolidge if only to keep the nomination from

It is to be remembered, of course, that politicians will turn about face just as often and as quickly as they

think they stand to get something out of it, but that fact might cut either way, as between Dawes and Coolidge.

The point just now is, however, disregarding Hoover's apparently excellent chances of victory, that Coolidge hasn't promise to refuse the pomination any more than has Dawes. nomination any more than has Dawes. Both of them are non-running candidates until one or both make it clear that they would not take the job if


