1927 COTTON CROP SHOWS SHRINKAGE

Nearly 5,000,000 Bales Less Than a Year Ago, Latest Forecast Shows.

By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 20.—The census bureau today reported 12,-777,505 running bales of lint cotton gined and to be ginned from the crop of 1927, against 17,755,070 bales ginned from the crop of 1926. Ginnings for the season are 12,-950,473 bales of 500 pounds gross weight, which compares with the final crop estimated with the department of agriculture of 12,789,000 bales. According to the census bureau there remained 161,473 bales to be ginned, according to ginners' esti-

ginned, according to ginners' esti-mates after the March canvass against 234,041 bales from the crop of 1926.

Texas corrected ginnings to Jan. 15, was 4,227,750 bales.



SELECTION **OF JURORS SLOW TASK**

Many Prospective Jurymen Express Opposition to Inflicting Death Penalty.

Despite the fact that the court and attorneys in the case are doing everything they can in the interest of speed, slow progress is being made in the selection of the jury in the Robert Hill case. Only six jurors had been secured when Judge George L. Davenport adjourned court for luncheon at 12 o'clock today.

Of the 85 veniremen examined 70 per cent were disqualified because of conscientious scruples against inflicting the death penalty.

The state at noon had exhausted eight of its 15 peremptory challenges, while the defense had used 10 of the 15 allowed. Only 42 of the original venire list remain to be examined and should the percentage of disqualifications continue as they have been running it will not be possible to obtain the jury from the remaining men in the original venire. And if the panel should be completed from this list it will require the entire afternoon to examine them.

That Hill, who is pleading guilty to the charge of robbery with firearms in connection with the holdup of the First National bank of Cisco on Dec. 23, will go on the witness stand and tell his story of the robbery, becomes more evident as his attorneys question the veniremen. That the defense will also seek to place in the record of the case testimony to show that Hill, who is 22 years of age, has had little opportunities in life, is borne out by the questions propounded to veniremen by defense attor-
