Damage Slight But Fear is Felt for Nearby Cities and Villages.

MEXICO CITY, March 22.-The capital and surrounding states today had recovered from a night of terror occasioned by the most vigorous earth shock experienced in 17 years.

Lights in Mexico City were extinguished when the shock shattered electric wires. Thousands of persons ran into the darkened streets. The shocks lasted only three minutes and so far as could be told today there was no great damage done.

While the disturbance lasted only three minutes the streets and buildings of Mexico City were dark for more than five minutes.

Uneasiness was felt at the capital today that interior towns, such as those in the state of Guerrero, might have suffered heavily from the shock.


