NAMES OF 2 **DALLAS MEN ARE HINTED**

Senator Heflin Declares Somebody Made Millions by Advance Information.

WASHINGTON, March 23.-A statement that two unnamed men knew in advance of the famous agriculture department cotton price trend report of last Sept. 15, was made to the senate cotton investigators today. The department report was credited with causing a disastrous slump in the market which, according to Sen-ator Heflin, Alabama, "enabled somebody to make millions of dollars."

Charles F. Freeman, New York commission cotton broker, told the committee that M. H. Thomas, Dallas cotton man, informed him over longdistance yesterday that he knew two men in Dallas who knew of an alleged communication from a representative of Anderson, Clayton & Co., on Sept. 14 to A. H. Hayward, New Orleans, concerning this forecast. Hayward in a telegram to the committee has denied he received any such communication.
