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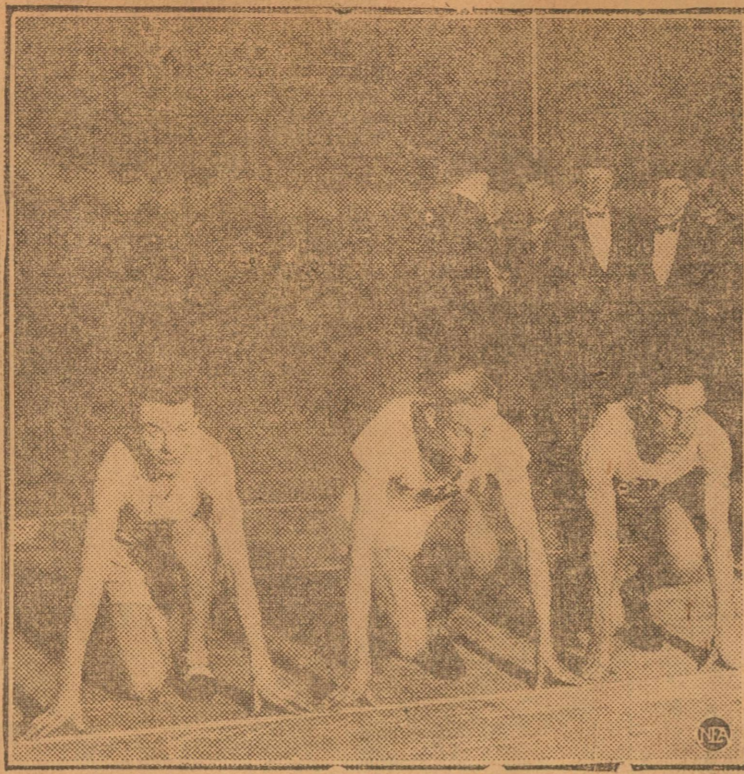
WINTER'S FUR CATCH

Tankersley Favors Home Labor on County Jobs and Lower Taxes

Lon Tankersley of Eastland, who has announced himself as a candidate for county commissioner from precinct No. 1 in the democratic primary of July 28 points out that he has been a resident of Eastland county for 20 years and says that he has given special attention to the road and highway problems of the county. He declares himself in favor of using home labor wherever possible and also thinks that taxes should be reduced. In a letter made public today Mr. Tankersley outlines his policies as follows:
 Since making my announcement several weeks ago I feel that possibly I should explain to my friends and those with whom I am not acquainted some facts concerning myself.
 I have been a citizen of Eastland county for 20 years and have resided in this precinct all of that time. I have noticed particularly the road and highway problems, along with the other duties I believe to be that of our commissioners and feel that if elected to that office I am fully qualified to perform every duty pertaining to that office.
 If elected to the office to which I aspire I will, to the best of my ability, see that every person in my precinct alike gets a square deal and I will play no favorites.
 I also favor the using of home labor on all roads and highways or any other contract work under the supervision of the commissioner's court.
 I further favor the reduction of taxes, as far as in my power lies, and promise to use every means in my power to bring about a substantial reduction.
 I favor the economical use of the county's funds and will, to the best of my ability, see that there are no funds wasted nor misappropriated in any way and will faithfully guard the funds entrusted in my care.
 I favor the enforcement of the law to the letter and will assist in every way in keeping with my office.
 In view of these facts I will say that I expect to meet every voter in the precinct before the election and

gather ideas of the needs of the different communities. Your vote and influence will be greatly appreciated and your pay will be by the honest and faithful service performed by your humble servant.

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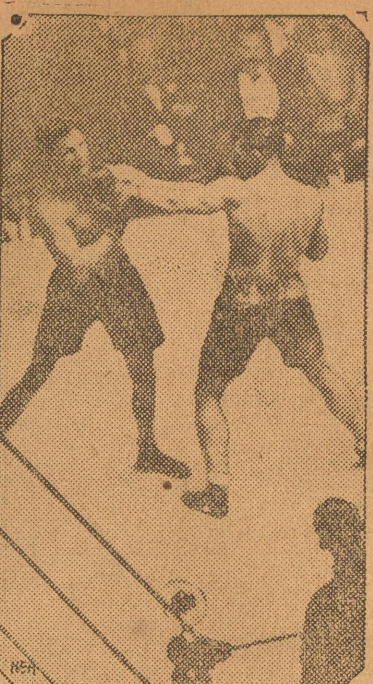

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Only 3 Federal League Players Now Remain

In the Major Circuit

By BERT M. DEMBY (United Press Staff Correspondent) CHICAGO, March 3.—Another member of the old Federal League alumni has dropped out of the big leagues, and his passing leaves only three players in the majors who saw service with the Feds.

When the Boston Red Sox announced the release of Johnny Tobin, outfielder, only Jack Quinn, Eddie Roush and Howard Ehmke was left to carry on for the Federals. Tobin spent three years in the Federal League—almost the full length of its existence. Playing with St. Louis, he speedily showed he was a major-league ball player and when peace was made in 1915, he went to the St. Louis Browns.

He remained with the Browns in 1916, but in 1917 was farmed to Salt Lake City. Recalled, he played the outfield for the Browns from 1918 to 1925 inclusive, went to Washington for a part of 1926, and then to Boston. At St. Louis, for seven straight years, he batted better than .300. Of the three Feds remaining, John Pincus Quinn is the dean. His Federal League experience was merely part of a career which has been pointed out in almost every league in baseball.

He began pitching when the American league was just starting and today, at the age of 43, still is throwing them past batters. Roush—champion holdout of baseball, jumped to the Federal League after the White Sox shipped him to Lincoln, Neb., in the fall of 1913. Going to the Indianapolis Feds, he played there in 1914 and remained in the Federal League with Newark in 1915.

Ehmke spent only a short time with the Federals. He jumped to the Buffalo Feds when Washington bought him from Los Angeles in 1915.

He showed very little with the Federals and found himself a free agent when peace was made. Going back to the Pacific Coast, he signed with Los Angeles and one year later again entered the American league. He still is with Philadelphia.

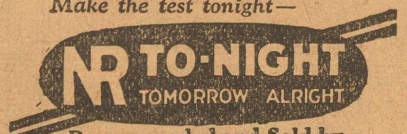
Eastland School Board Will Select Teachers

Roy Eury Is High Man

In Points Scored For Horned Frog Cagers

FORT WORTH, March 6.—The T. C. U. Horned Frog basket ball team scored 25 points more than their opponents in the 12 games played in southwest conference competition although they lost seven of the 12 contests and finished in fourth place in the cage race. The Frogs scored a total of 317 points against 292 points by their opponents. The Christians lost three games by one point, one by 2 points, one by 4 points, another by 5 and the seventh game by 8 points. They beat two opponents by four-point margins, two other by 6 points and the other by 27 points.

The Frogs won five of their six non-conference games, scoring 185 points to their opponents' 134. Roy Eury, the Frog's first year sensation at center, was high-point man for the 12 conference games, with 61 points. Eury did not win a regular berth on the Frog five until the eighth game. He was high-point man in the last four games played by the Frogs. Raymond "Rags" Matthews, used both at forward and guard by Coach Matty Bell, was second in scoring, with 58 points. Albert Ackler was next with 42 points. Steadman and Parrish next with 41 each and McDonnell next with 40 points. The Frogs' flashy first year guard, Horace Wallin, scored 33 points. Will Tomlinson, Belton, another first year man, broke into the conference scoring with one point.

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Needed a Contract.
There appeared in the public print not long ago a little item telling of the discovery by the New York Boxing Commission that there was not in its files a copy of the contract binding Tommy Loughran, world's light heavyweight champion, to the management of Joe Smith, who does his business for him.

There is a rule in the New York code requiring contracts between managers and boxers with the stipulation that a copy of the contract be filed with the commission. It was this rule which caused Jack Kearns and Jack Dempsey to go down on paper for the first time, and it was the contract forced by the commission that gave Kearns the evidence for the suits he instituted against Dempsey after they had broken up.

Loughran laughed a little bit when he was ordered to file a contract with his manager and said that he and Joe had never bothered about contracts. He knew, though, that Smith had no legal hold on his services and a lot of others in the boxing racket knew that Loughran could give Smith the "goo-by" any time he desired. That's the point in this little piece.

Even before Loughran won the light heavyweight championship and got into some real money there were a number of big-hearted boys around Broadway who wanted his contract.

They told Loughran that Joe Smith wasn't so warm around Rickard's Garden and that as a manager he wasn't hot any place. Loughran was having a hard time getting matches or recognition any place and they told him it was because of Smith.

Stood With Smith.
Joe Smith was a nice fellow and all that, they admitted, but they pointed out that he was not one of the mob and he didn't know the ways of the mob. They told Loughran if he got himself a real manager he could get into the Garden any time he wanted a match, and he wouldn't have to take all the tough ones that the boys wanted to swarm on Smith.

It was the same story that had been told a number of years ago to Tom Gibbons when several of the New York mob were trying to sour him on little Eddie Kane.

Loughran listened to all of it, not because he was giving it a serious ear, but because it is his nature to be quiet and to avoid arguments and discussions of any kind.

But when he was offered \$50,000 to throw over Smith and sign up with one of the New York mob, he said his little piece, effectively and quietly.

"Joe Smith and I grew up together," he said. "We started in this business together and we're going to finish together. If we don't get anything we'll split it and if we get a million his end is going to be right there. If you have to double cross your best friend in this business to

get into the big money I'm going to get out of the business."

Kane Was Knocked.
Joe Smith is a quiet, mild-mannered little fellow who admits—and takes pride in it—that he does not know all the tricks of the mob. He was discouraged when he couldn't get Loughran into good money without doing business, but he plugged right along and finally got there.

Smith with a light heavyweight champion is now in the position where the matchmakers have to come to him, and they know better than to approach him with any larceny plans.

Tom Gibbons, when he was going at his best, had trouble in getting good matches and he was told that it was Eddie Kane's fault.

Gibbons listened to some of the mob run down Kane for about an hour one day and he decided to end the discussion of the subject.

"I have forgotten what percentage Eddie and I have been working on, but after listening to you fellows I have decided to increase Eddie's end. He needs a raise because you fellows have convinced me that he is the most honest manager in the business," Gibbons said.

May Break Record.
Babe Ruth has it all figured out that he may make a new home-run record this year. The Babe always has had a modest and becoming way of admitting he is good, but after he hung up his record of 59 homers in one season he confided to friends that he doubted he ever could hit more.

"I could hit 'em," he said, "but they won't give me the chance. They won't pitch to me. If they would give me a good one to cut at once in a while I might give a lot more of them a good ride."

Approaching the 1928 season, the Babe figures his chances better to break the record again than he did at this time last year.

"I'm in better physical condition than I was a year ago," he said. "I was kind of sluggish or something through the first quarter of the race last season. I want to get going from the first game this year."

"There's no use saying that the fear of Buster Gehrig last year made a lot of those pitchers work on me."

Pitchers Fear Gehrig.
"They didn't want to pass me to get a crack at Gehrig, but they didn't get real scared of him until the season had half passed. They thought when he started banging all those homers that he was hitting over L.S. head and that they would soon find his groove. When they couldn't find his weakness they couldn't pass me every time they were in a hole."

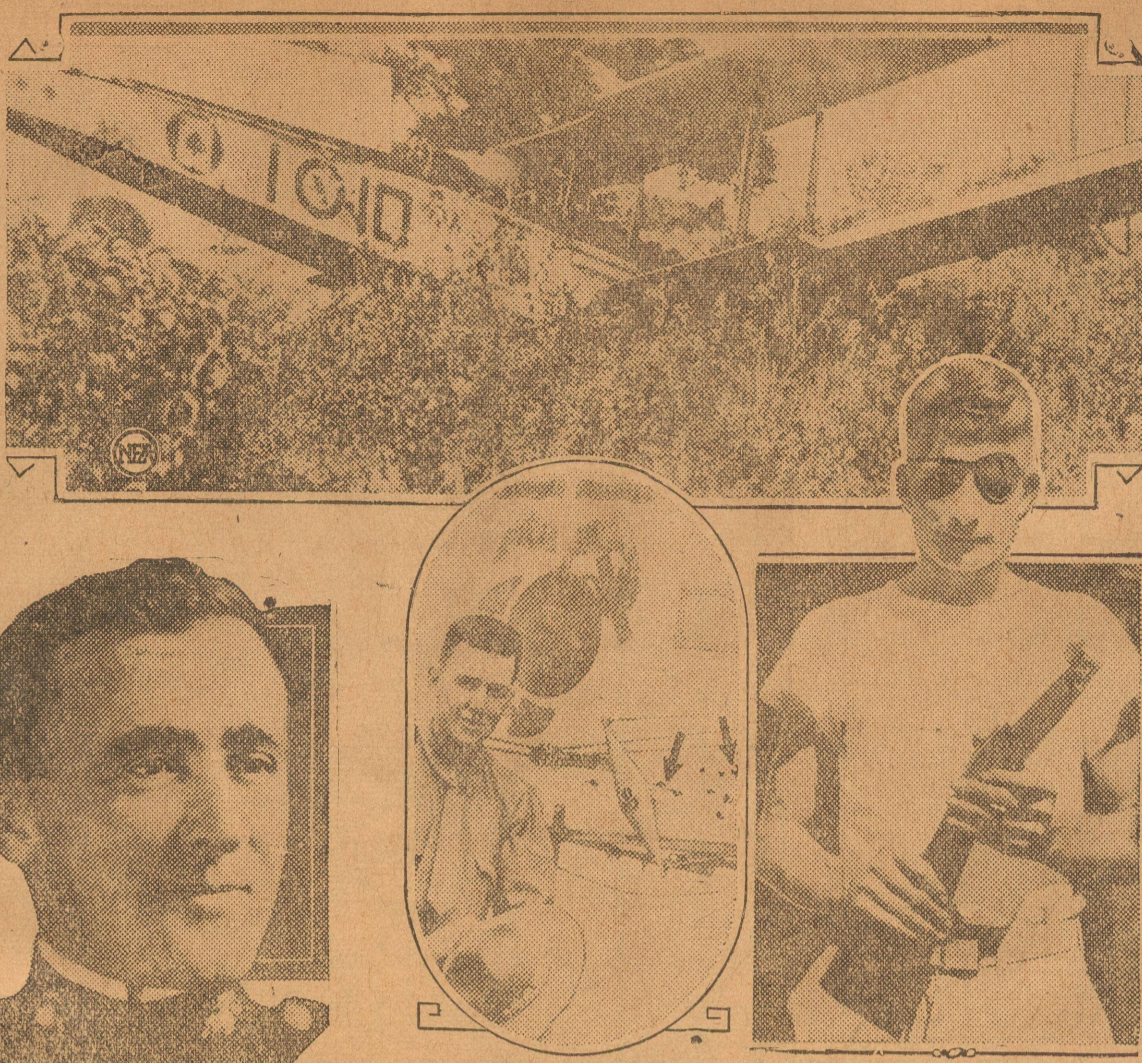
"You may say, if you have read some of the papers that Gehrig has a weakness and that he can't hit a high fast ball inside. Well, if that's his weakness, I wonder why those pitchers don't make him eat high fast ones if they can pitch them? That big bird hasn't any weakness or it would have been discovered before this time. If I had all the weaknesses some of the critics have found in me I would strike out every time I went to bat. Those pitchers aren't out there to make suckers out of themselves so the crowd can cheer a home run."

"Another help I got in 1927 came from the fact that the Yankees were way out in front and discouraged the other clubs badly. If there was a hot pennant race like they had in the National league I know I would have been passed oftener and Gehrig, too, would have been given plenty of walks. If the Yankees got away like they did last year and have the pennant sewed up by August I ought to get more chances to step into them."

When it comes to talking baseball, the Babe certainly is no dummy. He's a smart baseball player and he knows the game. He's big enough to admit that if Gehrig wasn't hitting behind him he might not have banded out 60 homers last year.

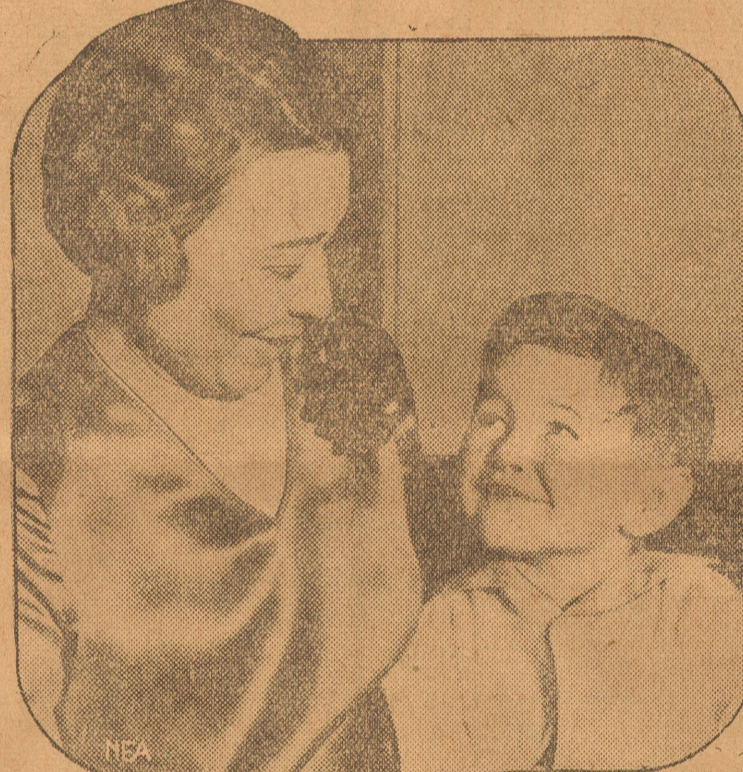

Marines and forces commanded by Augustino Sandino. Above is a big marine plane brought down by Sandino bullets in the jungles of Nueva Segovia, not far from the section where a pack train of the marines was ambushed and five marines killed. Below at the left is Lieut. Edward F. O'Day, in command of the ambushed train. In the center is Lieut. Lamson Scribner, standing by his plane with arrows pointing to bullet holes, received during a dive into a machine gun nest of Sandino rebels. 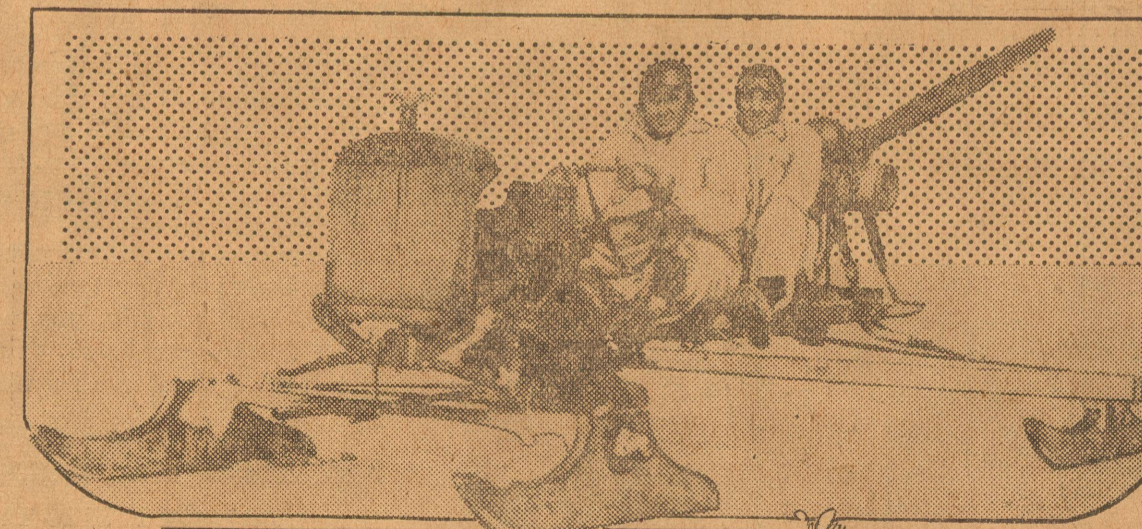
Charges Birth Was Faked

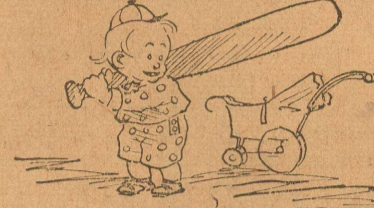
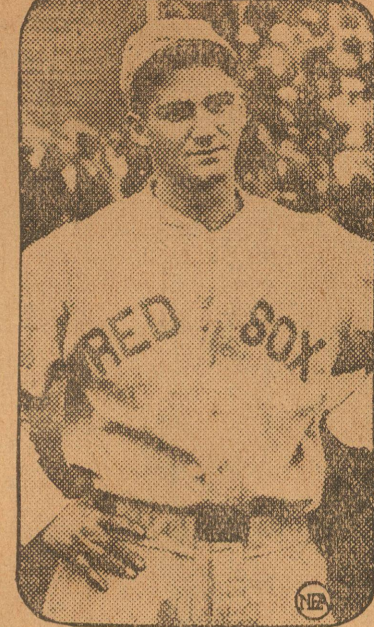

They Burn Up the Ice at 70 Miles an Hour



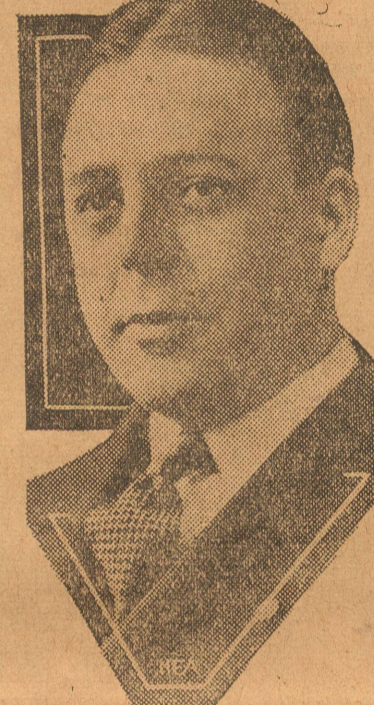

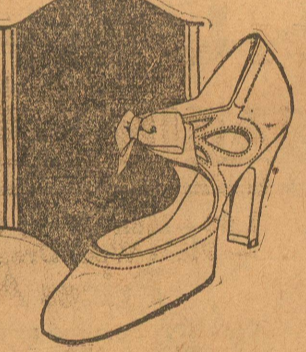
