CLEVELAND, June 10.—Calmly and with solemn mien, the republican national convention met for its first session here today and heard the keynote address of temporary chairman to 10:30 Wednesday.

Though its chief nominee is known and its platform well outlined; though its program is as cut and dried as it is possible to make it, the convention lacked in its opening none of the colorful pageantry that always attaches to this peculiarly American political institution.


