STANDARD OIL ACCUSED OF INSIDE WORK

RANGER SCHOOL BOARD HEARING MANY MURMURS

Attack on McNew May Be Issue at the Next Meeting; Electing Teachers.

All members of the Ranger Independent District school board are expected to attend the meeting of the board next Tuesday, when the matter of filling vacancies still existing in the Ranger schools will be taken up, together with the suggestion by L. L. Neal, a member of the board, that Superintendent E. O. McNew resign. It was rumored, too, that Trustee John M. Gholson is not entirely satisfied with all teachers elected one day when he was not at a meeting, and that, as the election must be unanimous and he has a right to enter a protest if he does so within a reasonable time, he may object to the election of one principal already named and one or two teachers. This matter, too, is expected to come up at the meeting next Tuesday.

Mrs. Drienhofer's Views
Mrs. J. F. Drienhofer, a hold-over member of the board, said with reference to the request by Mr. Neal for the resignation of Superintendent McNew:

"When we elected Mr. McNew last year I protested against the two-year contract on the grounds that there would be a partially new board this year and that a majority of the board might not be satisfied. Mr. McNew told the board then that if the new board did not consider his services satisfactory, he would resign."

According to Mrs. Drienhofer, action is contemplated because of this promise. She said that Mr. McNew acknowledged making this promise, but insisted he said it a majority of the board asked him to resign he would take it under consideration.

Mrs. Drienhofer claimed that Mr. McNew failed to co-operate with the Parent-Teachers club and was present at only two meetings. She said some parents had complained because their protests to Mr. McNew about their boys being out of school received scant attention.

"Superintendent McNew visited the sewing club in the home of Mrs. Kilpatrick, whose re-election has been deferred principally by Mr. McNew's objection," said Mrs. Drienhofer, "and protested against the card entertainment given by the Parent-Teachers club to raise funds with which to send representatives of the sewing class to the sewing contest at Galveston, claiming that neither he nor Mr. Overall, principal, had been consulted, and this was an insult to them. Mrs. Kilpatrick told him she could not see why he should consider it so when he had been inside of classroom only once before, and that when she had asked him to visit it."

Carrying Out Orders
It was a card entertainment given by the Parent-Teachers club, aided by other club women of Ranger, and the Ranger school board had declared card entertainments taboo, along with dancing, as a matter of fact, Superintendent McNew was merely carrying out the school board's wishes in this instance.

L. L. Neal said that two out of each three persons to whom he had spoken concerning Superintendent McNew told him they considered him inefficient as an executive, although a good teacher and a splendid man. M. H. Hagaman, president of the school board, said he knew Superintendent McNew to be a good man and did not see why there should be any objection by the board to retaining him. He said Mr. McNew was both a fine teacher and an able executive.

Mrs. C. E. Maddocks protested that it was a shame Mr. McNew should have to answer an attack that contained no charges and that the members should have been given an opportunity to discuss the matter among themselves before it was brought out in open meeting.

John M. Gholson said that Mr. McNew had a two-year contract with the board, and he could see no good in getting the school board into a row just to make a change at this time.

FIVE MEMBERS OF OIL PROBE COMMITTEE DO NOT AGREE WITH WALSH

WASHINGTON, June 6.—The Walsh report condemning leases of naval oil reserves was denounced in a statement presented to the senate today by five members of the oil investigating committee.

LOUISIANA DEMOCRATS HOWL PROPOSED CENSURE OF KLAN BATON ROUGE, La., June 6.

Louisiana's four delegates at large to the democratic national convention in New York, June 27, will go unrepresented, it was decided at the state democratic convention meeting here last night.

The convention howled down efforts of some delegates to place the convention on record as opposed to the Ku Klux Klan.

PROFITEERS TRY TO RETAIN HOLD ON GOVERNMENT

Tariff Beneficiaries Liberal in Giving to Republican Campaign Expenses.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Beneficiaries of the profiteers' tariff were large and regular contributors to the expense of spreading republican propaganda in 1920, it is revealed by a list read into the Congressional Record by Senator Norris, republican of Nebraska, a few days ago. Harry F. Sinclair, to whom Secretary Fall subsequently leased the naval oil reserves in the Teapot Dome district, was also an underwriter of this exploitation of republican candidates and programs. He gave \$1,096 on Jan. 26, 1920.

In the list presented by Senator Norris there was credited a total of \$70,178.16 contributed during the period from Jan. 2, 1920, to Sept. 23, 1920. Of this amount the republican national committee gave about \$10,000 and other republican organizations about \$2,400. The remainder—some \$58,000—was donated by individuals, most of whom were connected with corporations that have since profited directly or indirectly from the republican tariff.

Manufacturers Liberal.
Among these concerns were manufacturers of woollens, cottons, and silk textiles; manufacturers of clothing; manufacturers of iron and steel; manufacturers of rubber and chemicals, and paper. Various articles and commodities, including the ordinary necessities of the home, to which the republican administration afterwards gave "protection," are represented. These are pianos, sugar and coal, spectacles and corsets, furniture and carpets, electrical apparatus and machinery, aluminum for kitchenware and marble for tombstones; tools and hardware, clocks and coffins, seeds and refrigerators—nearly everything that is worn or used in life or death. And oil is there, too. Harry Sinclair was not the only contributor among the oil interests.

The money, supplied to the National Republican was supposed to pay for subscriptions to that publication which was then sent to various individuals. On this point Senator Norris made the following statement in the senate:

"It is interesting to note that Mr. Sinclair, of Teapot Dome fame, on the twenty-sixth of January, 1920, contributed \$1,096, which I suppose paid for a year's subscription for 1,096 persons."

Proposed Change in Law.
Contributions to political parties in the forthcoming presidential campaign are not unlikely to be subjected to congressional scrutiny as were those made in the presidential primaries of 1920. The solicitation of political funds in amounts "without limit" by a republican supporter of President Coolidge has given new pertinence and propriety to a congressional investigation, many believe.

The committee on election of president and vice president of the house has just recommended new legislation to control expenditures in behalf of presidential, vice presidential and congressional candidates. In a report made by this committee there is a reference to the Newberry case and a tentative draft of a bill which congress is urged to enact. This would fix at \$10,000 the maximum expenditure by a candidate for senator and at \$2,500 for a candidate for representative or permit as an alternative the expenditure of an amount equal to 2 cents each for all the voters in a state district, but not exceeding \$25,000 for candidates for the house. In the case of presidential campaign there is a recommendation for complete publicity of contributions received by political parties each year. The present law requires that only such contributions as are received during a presidential campaign be reported to congress.

It is recommended also that the several states should attempt to adopt uniform corrupt practices legislation in harmony with the federal statutes.

WOMAN HELD FOR MURDER CHARGED WITH LUNACY

WACO, June 6.—Trial of Mrs. Dena Hale, indicted on charge of murder in connection with the death of J. D. Hamlin, an aged grocer, last March, was continued today following the filing of a complaint charging lunacy.

Hamlin was shot and wounded, February 27, and died a month later from the wound.

INDIANA DELEGATION TO SUPPORT INDIANA LEADER

INDIANAPOLIS, June 6.—The Indiana delegation to the convention today pledged itself to support Samuel M. Ralston for the presidential nomination. It was taken after the state convention, at Ralston's request yesterday, decided to let the delegation go unrepresented.

Negro Bandits in Kansas City Rob Bank Officers

Strike In London Paralyzes Subway And Workers Walk

LONDON, June 6.—A strike which is charged to the communists has paralyzed London's gigantic network of subways today. Powerhouse workers in about two-thirds of the city's plants overruled objections of labor leaders and walked out.

Not more than 10 per cent of the subway trains, which carry millions daily, were in operation, and the surface street cars and buses were unable to handle the overflow. Many walked to their work from the suburbs.

Powerhouse workers have demanded an advance of 10 shillings and a minimum of three pounds a week, with one week vacation on pay each year. Labor leaders charge communist influence behind the strike.

Revolutionists in Albania Are Fighting Desperately to Win the Capital.

TWO RICH YOUTHS IN CHICAGO INDICTED FOR MURDER AND KIDNAPING

CHICAGO, June 6.—Indictments against Nathan Leopold Jr. and Richard Loeb, two University of Chicago students and sons of multi-millionaires, formally charging them with kidnaping and murdering Robert Franks were returned in open court today. The indictments, which were returned late Thursday, accuse the two youths of kidnaping the boy for ransom and murdering him, both of which crimes carry the death penalty.

Although looked upon as a certainty and merely a formality since confessions were obtained from the two youths, the indictments represent the state's actual start in its efforts to convict and hang the two young "intellectuals," who committed murder and tried to collect \$10,000 ransom "just for the fun of it." They now must stand trial.

OIL BELT LEGION POSTS TO HAVE MEETING TONIGHT IN STRAWN

J. B. Heister, vice post commander of the Carl Barnes post of the American Legion in Ranger, requests that all members of the post be at the legion rooms, ready to leave for Strawn, to attend the council meeting of the Oil Belt Legion posts tonight at 7 o'clock.

COLONEL FLYNN, SALVATION ARMY LEADER DIES SUDDENLY

CHICAGO, June 6.—Colonel John Flynn, who for 18 years has held the important office of field secretary of the central territory of the Salvation army, with headquarters at Chicago, while participating in a parade at Chicago, suddenly dropped dead on the street.

The colonel had been in active army service for the past 35 years, having successfully administered some of its most important leading commands, both in this and other countries. He first joined the army at Hadley, England, in the year 1889, and was imprisoned in connection with the Whitechapel riots when the army endured its severest persecutions by the street mobs.

The colonel organized the Salvation army Chicago territorial staff band, considered to be one of the leading army bands in the world. He leaves an army family, his wife, Mrs. Colonel Flynn, an officer who has been in active army service for the past 37 years, two sons and three daughters, all of whom are actively engaged in Salvation army service, holding commanding positions.

"STAND-PAT" CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS

CLEVELAND, June 6.—Senator William D. McKinley of Illinois was named chairman of the committee on credentials of the republican national convention, according to the announcement today by William M. Butler, pre-convention manager for Coolidge.

McKinley belongs to an old stand-pat conservative group of senators. He supported the Mellon taxation plan and was one of the senators who voted to sustain President Coolidge's veto of the bonus bill.

BLACK HIGHWAYMEN SHOOT PATROLMAN, WHILE CROWD IN STREET LOOK ON; GET \$26,000

Rival Delegations Fighting For Votes In Republican Hall

CLEVELAND, June 6.—Fights by rival delegations from Arkansas, Tennessee and Texas for seats in the republican convention came before the republican national executive committee today for decision. The Tennessee controversy has been virtually settled, with both sets of delegates being given seats in the convention with half a vote to each.

Contests from some parts of the south call up the old problem faced by the republican party since President Lincoln died, that of how to break ground for a new organization south of the Mason and Dixon line. Attempts may be made to carry the fight from Georgia to the convention, the J. L. Phillips faction in that state having been defeated by the negro leader, Johnson, and preparing to file an appeal.

Campaign Against Mosquito and Fly Begun In Eastland

J. Phillips, who for the past two seasons has had charge of the campaign in Eastland against mosquitoes, returned to Eastland the first of the week and is now at work exterminating what few mosquitoes and flies have appeared and eliminating breeding places.

For the past two seasons Eastland has been bothered very little by mosquitoes or flies and the same methods employed heretofore to keep them out are being used this season.

It is the duty of each and every citizen of the town to cooperate with Mr. Phillips in keeping the pests out. In fighting mosquitoes it is effective to keep open top cisterns, water barrels and other water containers closed or keep sufficient oil in them to kill the mosquito. In fighting flies all breeding places should be cleaned up.

CHARLES B. WARREN DOES NOT WISH TO HURT HIS CHANCES BY TALKING

SAN ANTONIO, June 6.—Mexico's efforts to obtain a loan with which to pay the interest on its foreign debt should succeed, according to Charles B. Warren, United States ambassador to Mexico, who arrived here today.

Mr. Warren said, when asked if he would accept the vice presidential nomination on the republican ticket, that he would not like to discuss it. He said there was no foundation for the report that he intended to resign the office of ambassador.

U. S. AND CANADA SIGN TREATY TO FIGHT BORDER RUM SMUGGLING

WASHINGTON, June 6.—A treaty signed today between the United States and Canada providing for co-operation combating rum smuggling along the northern border.

BANDIT'S GOLD DISTRIBUTED TO THOSE IN POKER PARTY

GALVESTON, June 6.—Charles Luczewski held up a poker game in "Fred's Place" and after collecting all the money to be found about the table, started for the exit. He died with a bullet in his body before he reached it.

CHESLEY OF CISCO IN RACE FOR COUNTY COMMISSIONER

John I. Chesley of Cisco has announced as a candidate for county commissioner from the Cisco precinct, the position now held by Henry Stubblefield. Mr. Chesley is 32 years old and has spent most of his life in Eastland and Stephens counties. He has been engaged in farming, stockraising, banking and insurance business.

AMERICAN FLYERS PLAN TO CONTINUE WESTWARD FLIGHT

SHANGHAI, China, June 6.—Lieutenants Lowell Smith, Leigh Wade and Erik Nelson, American round-the-world flyers, expect to leave here at 5:30 a. m. Saturday for Amoy.

Vice Presidential Nomination Problem Before Republicans

CLEVELAND, June 6.—Rumors of all kinds were flying about thick and fast today on the eve of the republican national convention, which opens next Tuesday. The hum of political machinery of the great republican organization increased to the accompaniment of the clatter-bang of carpenters' hammers as they tacked up more bunting and made last-minute preparations.

Vice presidential possibilities which appear to be favorites before the convention include Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois; Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, and Senator William E. Borah.

MILLERAND IS TRYING TO FIND RICH PREMIER

Socialists in Chamber of Deputies Trying to Force President to Resign.

PARIS, June 6.—President Millerand having refused to resign at the request of the socialists, the latter are considering ways and means to force him out. They appear to have a majority in the chamber of deputies in support of the extremist proposal to pass a vote censuring the president.

Meanwhile Millerand today went about the business of finding a premier. The president resumed conversations with leaders of the senate and chamber of deputies at the Elysee, and it was believed he would find a successor to Premier Poincare by evening.

KALAMAZOO STUDENTS IN JAIL CONTINUE STUDIES FOR THE EXAMINATIONS

KALAMAZOO, Mich., June 6.—The county jail today became a classroom, as scores of high school students arrested in connection with charges by eight school girls, studied for their final examinations. The boys brought their books to jail with them, determined to get ready for the examinations.

One boy who has been on probation with charges alleging a statutory offense was sentenced to the state reformatory at Ionia for a term of between one and 10 years. Garland Bucks, track captain, was sentenced to the county jail for 45 days for contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl.

"PERCY" THE SNAKE IS UNEQUAL TO STRAIN OF SHRINERS CONVENTION

KANSAS CITY, Kan., June 6.—"Percy," the nine-foot snake brought to the Shrine convention by the India temple of Oklahoma City, died today of exhaustion. The pace was too fast for Percy.

GERMAN REICHSTAG FORMALLY ACCEPTS DAWES REPORT

BERLIN, June 6.—German reichstag today formally approved action of the government in accepting Dawes' report as a basis for settlement of the reparations problem.

RANCH HAND SHOT BY UNKNOWN ASSAILANT

VERNON, Texas, June 6.—Search was on today for the man who shot and wounded Buck Diggs, 16, at the home of Claude Lawhorn, near here last night. Diggs was shot in the head, but not seriously hurt. He was alone in the house at the time and the assailant struck him after firing the shot and then fled, Diggs said.

Diggs, who is employed by Lawhorn, could give no motive.

INDEPENDENT OIL OPERATORS MAKE CHARGES

Claim Government Trying to Turn Over Indian Land in 3 States to Octopus.

SANTA FE, N. M., June 6.—That the government plans to turn over five million acres of oil lands in three western states to the Standard Oil interests was charged by the independent operators who organized here today to fight the deal.

The operators recently applied for oil prospecting permits on the Navajo Indian reservation. The department of interior, they charge, is seeking to cancel their entries and place the land on sale. This, they contend, will make the land available to the Standard Oil company, the only concern financially able to acquire the tracts.

A similar government action is pending in Utah and Arizona the operators allege. They plan to carry the fight to the federal courts and to congress, if necessary, to force the department of interior to recognize their entries.

Klan Democrats In Indiana Go Over To Republican Party

INDIANAPOLIS, June 6.—Members of the Ku Klux Klan today announced intention of bolting the democratic party and rallying to the support of Ed Jackson, republican candidate for governor, as the aftermath of their defeat in the democratic state convention here yesterday. The delegates to the convention nominated Dr. O. C. McCulloch, plurality winner in the party primaries and an avowed anti-klan candidate for governor. They also adopted a platform plank decidedly anti-klan in sentiment.

The reputed strength of the Klan bloc in the convention did not materialize.

BOB SWEENEY BUYS ELKS OLD CLUB HOUSE, WILL REMODEL PROPERTY

Bob Sweeney, drilling contractor of Ranger, who bought the old club house of the Elks when they moved into their new quarters plans to make a residence out of it. With the expenditure of a little money the place can be made into one of the finest residences in Ranger, according to a member of the building committee.

Mr. Sweeney arranged to take over all indebtedness of the Elks against the lot and building and pay the lodge \$500 cash.

The lot and building were bought by the Elks during the boom days and approximately \$20,000 was paid as the purchase price. With about \$6,000 still against the place, Mr. Sweeney agreed to pay off the notes and pay the lodge \$500.

PAINT ON LIPS LEAVES STAINS ON THE GLASSES

HOUSTON, June 6.—Soda jerkeys in Houston are on a peeve which is daily growing worse. It is all brought about by the crimson stains which adorn napkins, spoons and water glasses after the ever present flapper with the artificial glow on her lips has patronized the products of the coke jugglers. Employees of soft drink establishments declare that the number of stains is on the increase and that the spots are growing larger and taking on a deeper hue each day.

Nor are the flappers the only ones who make the soda squirt's life one round of washing stains from cups, glasses and spoons. If the members of the coke lading fraternity are to be believed, it is not uncommon to find stains on glasses and napkins following the exit of many of the flapper clan.

FOUR BODIES ARE TAKEN FROM WATERS OF GULF AT M'FADDEN

PORT ARTHUR, Tex., June 6.—Gulf waters claimed four victims, two women, and two men and a fifth man was reported missing at M'Fadden's beach, early Thursday night. The dead are: Mr. and Mrs. Randall Bonnette, Miss Adele Montague, 17, Romer Somner, about 28.

Reddy Carlson, Jr., about 24, is reported missing.

Only the abandoned touring car in which the party is known to have gone to the beach gave a clew to the tragedy. Four bodies were recovered early today when washed ashore.


CONVENTION MONTH.
 Before June closes both parties will have held their national conventions to be immediately followed by another, the third party convention. Then the fireworks will commence all along the line.
 The republicans face their convention with everything apparently settled, though not settled to either their satisfaction or their confidence. The leaders are making heroic efforts to "iron out" some of the kinks and eliminate or soften some of the bumps that loom up.
 The democrats look forward to their meeting in New York with nothing settled. There are loud claims for this or that candidate, but absolutely no certainties. The line of attack upon the republicans is fairly well indicated, but the man to lead the assault is not yet clearly in sight. Between the liquor question and influences that play both political ends against the middle, the leaders have a rough road to roll over.
 Promoters of the third party movement do not hope to elect a candidate, but desire to give the people an opportunity of expressing their real political sentiments. If a new party should be framed as a result of that expression.
 The single taxers already have a ticket in the field with candidates in 26 states.
 The prohibitionists may put a ticket in the field, and the socialists will either endorse or nominate.
 The presidential election of this year will be the most momentous in the history of the nation for the reason that the women of all the states will, for the first time have an opportunity to vote, and there is no basis for predictions in any direction. At the last presidential election, when Mr. Harding had such an overwhelming majority, not more than half the qualified voters went to the polls. This year the total vote cast may be double.

"TAIL OF THE TICKET."
 While the managers of the third party movement do not anticipate the election of their standard bearer, they do expect to elect more senators and representatives in congress, and perhaps throw the presidential election into that body. In that event, if the political divisions in the house of representatives are such that a choice for president is impossible, the selection will fall upon the United States senate, and that body is limited by the constitution to a choice between the vice president nominees.
 It will be seen, therefore, that, as conditions are now shaping, there is a reasonable chance that the next president of the United States may be one of the vice president nominees, and the greatest attention is being given the "tail of the ticket" by party managers.

Canada is considering the question of discontinuing legalized betting on the race tracks. Records show that about \$60,000,000 is wagered during the few months of the year. Of this amount, \$36,000,000 is contributed on race tracks in Ontario. While most of the money lost on Quebec race tracks comes from English-speaking contributors, including visitors from the United States, business men contend it is detrimental.

Golf Charts Teach Strokes and Standing Positions

To check the game of experienced golfers or to teach beginners, a set of six charts, printed with directions and illustrations showing correct standing positions, grips and strokes, and other fine points, has been devised. With them, one may read a lesson in golf technique and follow it at the same time. Printed on heavy paper, the charts are to be placed on the floor. Standing over them with club in hand, the player is able to get the proper grip and position and execute the stroke in correct form. The diagrams afford a constant check and means of comparison for accuracy in every detail.



New Theory of Radio Is Advanced
 In the opinion of Carl Pfanstiel, a Chicago radio engineer, the wave theory of radio will soon be exploded completely, and the radiant-energy theory take its place in explaining radio phenomena. Serviceable Dandelion Hoe
 Occasionally the breaking off of a lobe of a hoe renders it unfit for further use and it is then usually thrown away. However, a serviceable tool for the purpose of removing dandelions can easily be made from it. The shaft of the broken hoe is straightened in line with the handle, and the blade is cut and filed to the shape shown, a V-shaped notch being cut in the end and filed to a sharp cutting edge. One of the points is cut to form a pulling hook, the throat of which is, of course, dull. A tool of this kind is very handy, as it can be used to cut the dandelions at their stems or pull them out entirely.



MUMMY OF KING TUTANKHAMAN PRESERVED WITH GYPSUM, WHICH HAS HELPED PRESERVE HISTORY

(Prepared Exclusively for The Ranger Daily Times)
King Tut-Ankh-Amen was buried some 3,400 years ago. An English lord, an American scientist and some others two years ago discovered his tomb. Under the jealous guard of the Egyptian government, they unsealed it and found, among other marvelous and priceless relics, the mummy of the great reformer king, and it was perfectly preserved.

How? What material did the ancient undertakers use to preserve the monarch's body for tens of centuries—until Judgment Day, as they thought, when the spirit would return to inhabit the clay?

First of all, the ancient embalmer made a plaster mask of the dead king's face and bust, and this was painted so as to present a portrait of him. Next, the embalmer removed the internal organs and, by use of asphalt and other simple chemicals, completely dried the remains. Then he wrapped the body in fine linen, binding the portrait-mask to the body with wrappings. So the mummy was made ready for its case. This usually was of wood, covered in part with a thin coat of plaster which was painted, often with another portrait of the dead person and with hieroglyphics (picture writings) relating the life of the dead.

These hieroglyphics are what have enabled archaeologists to reconstruct the history of Egypt—one of the most glorious of ancient civilizations. So from the scientists point of view, the preservation of these hieroglyphics is of first importance. And that depends on the material they were painted on.

That material is gypsum. The plaster cast of the mummy's head, on which the portrait was painted,

and the plaster coating of the mummy case, on which hieroglyphics were painted—both are of gypsum.

Lord Carnarvon's party also found in Tut's tomb vases and other finely carved articles of alabaster, another rock crystal form of gypsum. In the Pyramid of Cheops and other famous Egyptian graves are gypsum-plastered walls. They have stood up for thousands of years. They are covered with the same kind of plaster used today as the best interior finish for modern buildings.

The Asiatics, too, knew gypsum. The great Field Museum in Chicago contains statues and other works of the Chinese and East Indians made of gypsum. Pliny, the Roman writer on natural history, described its use during the first century, A. D. Walls of gypsum plaster were found in the ruins of Pompeii. All the great church masterpieces of the Italian Renaissance are frescoes painted on gypsum plaster. Michael Angelo insisted on it; he demanded three-coat plaster work as a basis for his paintings—a rule that holds good in building construction today.

Paris, France, is located over a gypsum deposit; that is how plaster of Paris got its name. Many of the cathedral statues throughout France are carved wood, covered with plaster, then painted. That covering plaster is gypsum. Warfare has destroyed many of these works of art, others still are in perfect condition, for gypsum endures through ages—as the findings of King Tut's tomb testify.

So much for the ancient history of gypsum.


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HUGE BRIDGE SPANS MIGHTY HUDSON.

ALL-AMERICAN BAND PLEASES LARGE AUDIENCE

Musical Numbers and Lecture Bring Chautauqua to Close Tonight.

Gilbert's All-American band scored a decided hit with the large audience at last night's Chautauqua entertainment in Ranger. By far the largest crowd of the week was present.

The program was excellently arranged, with a sufficient variety of numbers to make it interesting throughout. The compositions varied from classical pieces such as Oberon's overtures to band music of patriotic medley. The evolution of Dixie, played in masterful style, was Director Gilbert's interpretation of the famous southern song, "Dixie." The piece was played in many different styles showing the wide versatility of the members of the band, jumping from a waltz to a rag and from that to grand opera and then the original music. Combined with the scenic and lighting effects, it scored a triumph. The patriotic medley started out with the first war of the United States and came down to the world war. An attractive addition to the program was the depicting in uniform of the various wars, the last pose being "Liberty."

The final and concluding program for the Chautauqua tonight will be a musical entertainment by Clements and a lecture, "America's Way Out," by that eminent scholar and world-famous writer, Dr. William F. Ellis. Dr. Ellis is one of the best informed men on international conditions. In bringing Dr. Ellis to the patrons of the Chautauqua the authorities have secured one of the most sought after leadliners on the American platform today.

Dr. Ellis worked on six battle-fronts during the world war and went five times through the submarine zone as a newspaper correspondent. During all his travels for the last 10 years Dr. Ellis wrote the Weekly International Sunday School lessons.

FORESIGHT OF LAFOLLETTE.

Senator LaFollette's apparent determination to become a candidate for the presidency on an independent ticket is clearly defined in his recent letter in which he denounced communists and asked his friends to ignore the convention which this element will attend. In the 1916 republican convention he presented 13 planks for the platform. They were all flatly rejected by the committee but in 1921 they had all become laws. In the republican convention of 1920 Senator LaFollette presented seven planks for the platform. They were not only rejected but his name was roundly hissed by the delegates. In 1924 three of these seven propositions have become laws and the other four are what is splitting the party.

Senator LaFollette is going to be a power to be reckoned with in the coming campaign. He is one of the few outstanding personalities in American politics today. This was shown in the vote of the mock convention in Yale and Dartmouth universities, where LaFollette received votes sufficient to make him a balance of power.

SOUTH AFRICA ELECTION.

Much interest centers around the results of parliamentary election, on June 17, in the Union of South Africa. The gold mining industry and its leaders are not indifferent to the vital issues separating the South African party from the nationalist-labor pact, in both national and economic spheres and are taking an active interest. Aside from the fact that most of the shareholders of the industry, being loyal British subjects, naturally favor a party supporting the British connection as opposed to the nationalists' desire for a republic, the latter has definitely expressed its hostile intentions toward the industry in various ways and the fight promises to be bitter on both sides.

Canada ranks third in the world as a gold-producing country, being exceeded only by the Transvaal and the United States. Ontario is now the principal gold area in the dominion producing about 40 per cent of the output.

Congress has agreed on a bill to loan \$25,000,000 each year for five years to American ship owners to help them install the Diesel marine engine.

intended to build up a young team was not with serious intention. Soon after he had taken the management of the team, Killifer told his friends that he would not try to buy a pennant-winning club and that he that would last for a long time. The Cub manager has justified the confidence that his employer placed in him, and he has vindicated himself by bringing out this year a team that has been one of the big surprises of the year. John McGraw said the Cubs were the best team he had seen this season and he said they looked more promising than the Reds or the Pirates. McGraw's name is always associated with any conversation about

buying pennants, as he is held as the chief offender in baseball, if there is any offense in buying star players. The Giant manager, however, is taking a hand now at developing his own players. Practically all of the major league club owners are prosperous now, and they are not inclined to sell players. This was shown conclusively by the frequency with which the owners of the St. Louis Cardinals have laughed off offers of a small fortune for Hornsby. Under the conditions, it might be argued that McGraw has been forced to build instead of buying the ready-made articles. McGraw has been successful largely because he kept the future uppermost in his mind. He has made over

his club a dozen times, and he never has allowed it to go to seed. Self-government can be used as a mighty force for the common good, and we are a failure as a citizen unless we throw the full force of our personality into it. Let us not evade our responsibility but fulfill it, and be a patriot in the highest and truest sense. If so many woodsheds had not been converted into garages, perhaps the children would be as good as they used to be.

Uncommon Facts About Cheese

By HELEN HARRINGTON DOWNING

Director Home Economics, Calumet Baking Powder, Chicago

Cheese was once regarded as just an accompaniment to a meal, and then with crackers in place of other dessert. It is only recently that we have discovered it is almost an entire meal in itself. With this discovery the idea that cheese was difficult of digestion has practically disappeared.

Cheese is a highly concentrated and very nutritious food. It consists, in most varieties, of lumps of protein surrounded by envelopes of fat; containing no starch, it should be served with bread, macaroni, rice, etc. This explains the wholesomeness and generally satisfying qualities of the humble bread and cheese sandwich, or the more ambitious and appetizing macaroni and cheese dishes.

From a dietetic point of view, cheese should not be eaten with a meal in which meat has played an important part. A lunch of a chop followed by cheese for dessert represents a meal too high in protein, and it is such combinations as this and the after effects that have given rise to the impression that cheese is difficult of digestion. Cheese broken into small pieces, or grated and sprinkled over a dish as is the universal custom in Italy, is most easily assimilated.

American cheese, while nutritious, has not been highly considered by connoisseurs, in fact, not until recently has America been regarded as a cheese producing nation.

There has been a marked improvement recently in American cheese, and many foreign brands have been exactly copied. The French Camembert is now most successfully made here. The American varieties of Cheddar, Swiss and Limburger cheeses are excellent.

The famous English cheeses are Cheddar, Cheshire and Stilton; these are all strong, strongly flavored cheeses, eaten when very well cured.

Parmesan cheese, used the world over in cooking, is a skimmed milk

cheese containing little fat; it is three years in ripening, will keep for years, and so hard that it is only used after being grated.

Gruyere is another thick, firm cheese, originally made in Switzerland from goat's milk. France produces a wide variety of cheeses, many of them creamy, dessert cheeses such as Brie, Camembert and Neuchatel. The famous Roquefort cheese has world-wide distribution. The whole district from which it comes consists of rich fertile lands, where thousands of sheep are raised and the cheese is made from the milk of the ewes. Every owner of a small flock, or a few ewes, makes his own cheese. It is made in thin layers, with black bread crumbs sprinkled between, and placed in cellars, or caves, where some special bacteria develops which gives the Roquefort its peculiar flavor.

The cheeses of Holland are hard, rich and yellow, somewhat like the English cheeses. The best known is the Edam, a round, hard cheese, the outside of which is colored red and wrapped in tinfoil for the market.

The United States government investigations have been of great aid to the cheese industry, giving the American manufacturer an opportunity to develop and establish a reputation for making cheese equal that of foreign import.

Care of Cheese.

When cheese is first purchased, wrap it either in oiled paper or in a damp tea towel and store it so as to avoid coming in contact with strong flavors or odors.

Being a ready-to-eat product, cheese is heated merely to melt it and incorporate it with the rest of the mixture. This operation does not require high heat. And, too, being high in protein content, cheese must be cooked at a low temperature in order to obtain a product that will be easily digested. Therefore, in most cheese dishes, the double boiler is used. By this method a chaser dish

Cheese Patties. 1 pound cheese Salt and paprika 3 eggs 2 tablespoons cream Pastry shells

Grate or chop the cheese very fine; add the beaten yolks of the eggs and thoroughly blend. Season with salt and paprika. Fold in the whipped egg-whites and fill into tins lined with rich pastry. Bake a delicate brown in oven. Serve with a vegetable salad.

Cheese Biscuits. 4 cups pastry flour. 4 level teaspoons Calumet baking powder. 1-2 cup grated cheese. 4 level tablespoons butter or lard. 1-2 cups milk. 1 level teaspoon salt.

Sift flour once, then measure, add salt and baking powder and sift three times; add grated cheese, then rub in shortening with fork or spoon, add milk, mix lightly, turn out on a well floured board and roll or pat one inch thick, cut and bake in quick oven (450 degrees) fifteen to seventeen minutes.

Cheese Souffle. 2 tablespoons butter. 3 tablespoons flour. 1-2 cup scalded milk. 1-2 teaspoon salt. Few grains cayenne. 1-4 cup grated American cheese. Yolks 3 eggs. Whites 3 eggs.

Melt butter, add flour, and when well mixed add gradually, scalded milk. Remove from fire; add yolks of eggs beaten until lemon-colored. Cool mixture, and cut and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake twenty minutes in a slow oven. Serve at once.

Cheese Cake. 1 cup sweet milk. 1 cup sour milk. 1 cup sugar. Yolks 4 eggs. Juice and grated rind one lemon. 1-4 cup almonds, blanched and chopped. 1-4 teaspoon salt. Scald sweet and sour milk, strain

through cheesecloth. To curd add sugar, yolks of eggs slightly beaten, lemon, and salt. Line patty pans with paste, fill with mixture, and sprinkle with chopped almonds. Bake until mixture is firm to the touch.
