A Native of Ohio. Burton, chosen by President Cool-idge himself for the keynoting position, has served a long and useful career in his party. He is a native of these parts, having been born in Jefferson, Ohio, in 1851, which makes him 73. His education was calculated to make of him the sober conservative person he has always been, for he attended Oberlin college, an Ohio institution noted for the earnestness of its educational purpose. Later he went to Dartmouth and New York universities. Back in 1875, before Cleveland be

gan shouting about its size and go nto rivalry with Detroit over which was bigger, Burton hung out his law-yer's shingle here. In those days some of the mightiest men of the law in this section were getting unde way and you had to be a pretty thor ough lawyer to compete with them.

Burton got along. He got along so well that in 1888 he was elected to the house of representatives, serving in the fifty-firs and fifty-fourth congresses, and the right along to the sixtieth. Once h got into congress, Burton soon came known as a devotee of facts. He would pursue a fact to its lair in a mountain of statistics, and drag i relentlessly forth. He also developed a strong party loyalty which brough him to the notice of the leaders. But ton didn't have to be told what t to: he had a mind of his own that made itself up, but the party leader were pleased to find that his mind sually made itself up their way. Burton soon came to the front a a waterways expert. He studied the question of inland waterways from every angle, one of these being the angle of "pork." In those days the rivers and harbors appropriation bil was the choice medium of those wh wanted to get something for folks at home out of the public treasury, as a means of continuing in politics. Many a dusty stream had good money spent on it in this man-Fought Against "Pork." Burton set out to fight this prac-tice. The climax of his fight came in the senate to which body he was ele vated by his state in 1909. There he, with the help of progressives principally Senator Kenyon of Iowa, conducted an all-night filibuster against a rivers and harbors bill full of "pork." Burton put on carpet lippers and a bathrobe and dran
