In a formal resolution the board says the unions by their action have forfeited all rights before the board as railway employes and that new organizations of shopmen taking the striking men's jobs should be formed to represent the shop em-



It was discharged, the ball penetrating just below the point of young Nash's jaw, dislodging a number of teeth and shattering part of the bone. The bullet lodged in the jaw.

Following the accident, the two boys started running toward town when they were stopped by Mrs. Ewart. The wounded boy then fainted but regained consciousness after reaching the hospital.
