

AMERICANS IN PARIS DRINK MUCH CHAMPAGNE

PARIS .- The world is now drinkng as much French champagne as in pre-war days, but France is drinking the greater portion of it. Russia, Germany, Scandinavia and the United States rate below their old-time con-sumption, but Americans are still strong allies of France in this re-gard when they arrive here. Figures produced by the French Wine Producers' association covering the last six months indicate that the consumption of champagne has equaled that of the corresponding period of 1913. Before the war, however, the French only consumed 25 per cent of the output, and the remainder was exported. Today the consumption in France has reached 65 per cent of the output, and the remainder, only 36 per cent, is exported. There are two explanations of this.






