Hagen came from behind with the

By winning this year's title at Hoy-lake, the New Yorker has establish-ed a record. He has captured two British open championships in three years and finished second a third time, only one stroke separating him rom Arthur Havers, winner in 1923. Hagen was victor in 1922.
Walter has explained to the United

ress corresondent that he prefers ot to be leading at the end of a first day's play, in an open championship. He likes to be tied for second, or third, or fourth. This year, when the cards were in after the first day, he was in third place, which suited him perfectly. He suffered none of the strain of pace-making, and there to golfer in the game with greater confidence in his own ability to gain ne necessary strokes to overcome rival's two or three stroke advant-

By taking it easy the first day, is one could be said to be taking thing easy when they are shooting a diffi-cult course under championship rules in the low seventies, Hagen had some hing in reserve for the finish rush.

Brimming with confidence, Hage went out that second day at Hoy lake, crept slowly but surely up or C. W. Whitcombe, who was leading and played flawless golf on his last nine holes—even 4's—to win by one

Whitcombe, faced with the unnerv ng prospect of being in a position to win his first open title, broke under the strain. 


