Three Lives Lost When McCleskey Hotel Burns

Fire which started in the McCleskey hotel just before 2 o'clock this morning destroyed that hostelry, noted in Ranger history, and claimed at least three lives of guests there, besides causing the injury of about 12 others, after which the flames spread to adjacent buildings and swept The flames spread so quickly that over an entire half block in the center of the city, causing a property loss of approximately \$100,000, with about \$25,000 insurance, about a dozen business concerns being burned out. The origin of the fire is unknown, but was thought to have been caused by a hot water heater on the second floor.

He must stor Gene Tunney—perhaps something of the war-cry: "Ils ne passeront pas," will sound in his battered ears—or go home and retires as undefeated eavyweight champion of England Georges himself has promised to quit if he is knocked out. He should, for the good of the game, or else defin-itely admit his limitations and take men-second raters-for whom he is a match, at purses of reasonable size. Just a few bouts too long has Georges capitalized the dazzling smile, the orchid dressing gown, and the gracious manner that draws society to his training camps.

There seems to be little reason to

suppose that Gene Tunney cannot beat the Frenchman, and yet the suspicion lingers that this time Carpentier may loop over one of those famous rights to good effect and sock his way to an American title he once took away from old Bat Levinsky.

The Frenchman has a flare for the unusual. In defeat, he figures on some way to lose without admitting openly that he is beaten. With a chance for victory, he dares to try

anything once.

He tried it, once, on Dempsey, and none of those who breathed resin at the ringside that scorching July day in Jersey City will ever forget how near our own champ was to going down. But having tried it and failed, and incidentally fractured a thumb, Carpentier was through. True, he did make one fleeting effort, after going down for a count of nine in the fourth. He leaped to his feet from a prone position with a single muscular twist and fell upon Demp-sey, but it was a futile effort, for the Frenchman was too weak, and a couple of the champ's choppin strokes and a rabbitpunch ended a

To some sporting writers, Gen Tunney has not always seemed quick thinker. And what Carp doe

to slow thinkers, is a caution.

The United Press corresponden saw the Frenchman knock out Joe Beckett of England twice-once 70 seconds and again in 15 seconds and it was Beckett's "dumbness" which was directly responsible in each case. Admitting Tunney's many virtues and ability it will behoove the Greenwich Village idol to have his brains working think for think with the challenger tonight.


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

Persons who have lost an arm of leg or who are totally disabled and members of the National Guard but citizens living in Ranger (that beir a city of over ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants) who are over sity (60) years of age, should have exemption certificates from the tax collector.

The law relative to the securing of a transfer from the tax collector applies only to those voting in the city of Ranger, that being the only city in the county of more than ten thousand inhabitants. If since paying his or her poll tax any person has moved from one voting precinct in Ranger to another, voting precinct then a to another voting precinct, then transfer should have been secure from the tax collector not less than five (5) days before the day of the election, and if such party has move into the city a transfer must have been obtained from the collector at least four days prior to the day of

Any one-fourth of the candidates may select two supervisors at any o all places where an election is held In computing this one-fourth all the candidate on the ticket for state, dis trict, county and precinct offices must be taken into consideration.
