ONE WOMAN INJURED IN HOTEL FIRE DIES

PRIMARY DAY TOMORROW FOR THE DEMOCRATS

Polling Places Open From 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Candidates On the Ballot.

Precinct chairmen will be the judges of the election in the polling places of Eastland county in the primary election tomorrow. The voting places will open at 8 o'clock a. m. and close at 7 p. m. One hour after the polls are opened the judges begin counting and continue it without interruption until all the votes are counted. That is the law, but some election judges hold that the law of God is ahead of the law of man and insist upon closing the count at midnight, when an election is held on Saturday and the count is not completed before midnight. When this course is taken the counting is resumed Sunday midnight.

To what extent the voting in Eastland county will continue without interruption and to what extent it will be interrupted by Sunday, at all boxes where the counting will run beyond the midnight hour tomorrow night, is not forecast. It is possible that the vote will be completed before midnight in many of the smaller boxes, but it is doubtful if the results from the larger boxes will be known before Sunday or Monday. Each voter subscribes to the pledge, "I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this party."

Voting boxes in Eastland county are: One in Eastland, two in Cisco, five in Ranger, one in each of the following places: Gorman, Carbone, Cook, Desdemona, Dothan, Eri, Kokomo, Long Branch, Mangum, Nimrod, Okra, Olden, Pleasant Hill, Pioneer, Rising Star, Romney, Sabanno, Scranton, Staff and Tudor.

BURKETT COMES INTO HIS HOME COUNTY TODAY

Will Make His Concluding Speech in Cisco Tonight. Reviews Platform.

Joe Burkett of Eastland, candidate for governor of Texas, returned to Eastland county today from the last lap of the campaigning tour of the state he has been making. His final appeal to the voters is being made in his home county today. He spoke at 9 o'clock this morning at Ranger, at 11 o'clock in Gorman, and was scheduled to speak at 2 o'clock this afternoon in Carbone, at 4:30 o'clock in Rising Star, and at 8:15 o'clock tonight in Cisco, where a mighty final rally is to be made.

Speaking last night in Wichita Falls, Senator Burkett expressed faith in his nomination and discussed his platform in plain, simple language of election without fear or doubt as to the outcome, he said. "For I believe there are enough serious-minded thinking people who have heard me and have read my platform to realize the necessity of placing in the governor's office a man who stands for an honest, economic and constructive administration of our state's business, and who will be faithful to the trust." At no time have I attempted to mislead the people and have never failed to state my position in plain, simple language on any issue large or small that was of interest to the people, and I never will. I have advocated safe, sane and sound principles which, if I am given the opportunity to carry out, will be of untold benefit to the people of Texas.

Platform Constructive.
"If I am your next governor, and I believe I will be," continued Senator Burkett, "I will be the governor of all the people and not of any man or set of men. I am and have been my own campaign manager and I am under no obligations to a campaign organization and am the only man in the race so situated. I have not sought the endorsement of any organization of any kind, and am therefore under no obligations to any set of people. I alone am responsible for my program and if elected your governor will owe allegiance to Texas and her citizenship as a whole. My platform has been favorably received in every section of the state and hundreds of people have complimented me as being the only candidate with a constructive platform."

In discussing the educational problems, Senator Burkett said, "No right-thinking man can help but agree with me that we should charge a reasonable tuition fee in our institutions of higher learning. We are spending too much per capita on growing men and women who are unable to take up the responsibilities of citizenship rather than to be a burden to the state in these schools and are actually denying the children of scholastic age, to whom we owe an education, even the rudiments of learning."

Central State Bank Plan.
"My opponents before they informed themselves—a thing they should do before attempting to speak on any subject—jumped all over my central state bank plan, saying that the state is to go into the banking business, but now they have suddenly quieted themselves, having learned, I presume, that I do not advocate that the state go into the banking business. What I have advocated and am advocating now is that the state of Texas make provision for the state banks over Texas to establish a central bank by subscribing a certain per cent of their stock, thus creating a strong bank, much like the federal reserve banks, with a capital of from 50 to 100 million dollars. Let the majority of the board of directors be state officials so that the bank will not be operated for the benefit of a special few as is the federal reserve banking system. Then, in times of financial stringency this central state bank could borrow from the United States treasury department to the amount of its capital stock at 3-1/2 per cent interest, which could be, in turn, loaned to the member banks of the state banking system to be loaned to the farmers and stockmen on approved security."

How Joe Burkett Forecasts Standing In Governor's Race

Nolan, Queen of Weatherford, owner of the Southland hotel and a one-third owner of the McCleskey hotel, arrived in Ranger late yesterday. He said the insurance would cover the loss to the Southland hotel and the hotel property would be restored at once. The two McCleskey boys, both living in Weatherford, own a one-third interest in the property and Mr. Queen said it was possible they would replace the hotel building with a two-story brick structure, with the sidewalk placed on the proper street level. Mr. Queen is a candidate for district attorney in Parker county.

Nurses in the Clinical hospital made coffee on an electric percolator Thursday morning and served it with buns to the firemen, both of the regular force and volunteers. The Eastland firemen, who made a record run to Ranger and gave valuable aid in preventing the spread of the flames, had gone home before this breakfast offering, much to the regret of the nurses.

A number of Ranger's leading

business men worked hard on top of the Guarantee bank building yesterday while the flames were raging across the street, contributing their efforts to keeping the bank building from catching fire.

Joe Fry of Ranger, whose mother was lost in a fire about two years ago, was one of the hardest volunteer workers in the fire debris yesterday, searching for fire victims. About 25 of the volunteer workers were guests of the Ranger Lions at luncheon, and the Elks club served them supper, thus showing appreciation of what they were doing.

Four Times Burned Out.
Joe Coplas, proprietor of the cafe next to the Ranger garage, closed his place at the usual hour of midnight and when awakened by the shots at the fire hall just a block from the corner. Feeling that the tin structure in which his cafe was located would withstand the blaze he stood on the roof helping to fight the fire and only thought of his own property when flames burst from the Ranger garage.

Breaking open the window with his fist he got into the building and removed the cash register, but in breaking the glass cut the artery in his arm. The furniture, coffee urn, piano, tables and chairs were removed, but the new counter, recently installed at a cost of \$180, a built-in refrigerating box, which cost several hundred dollars, nearly 40 feet of linoleum and entire stock of groceries were an entire loss, approximately about \$3,000, with no insurance.

This is the fourth fire through which Coplas has passed, three of them in Ranger and one in Breckenridge. He has not decided whether he will locate again in Ranger, or go to South Carolina, where his brother lives.

AIR COOLING MACHINERY IS COSTLY TO INSTALL
DALLAS.—Air cooling machinery recently installed in a local theater looks simple, but it isn't, according to the manager.

First it takes the air from the sidewalk level, directly above the basement. Then it washes the air and cools it to a temperature of 57 degrees. Then it whirls the air to the top of the theater, where the cool air pours down over the audience, escaping into the basement and out into the street.

The cost of installation averages \$27 for each seat.
