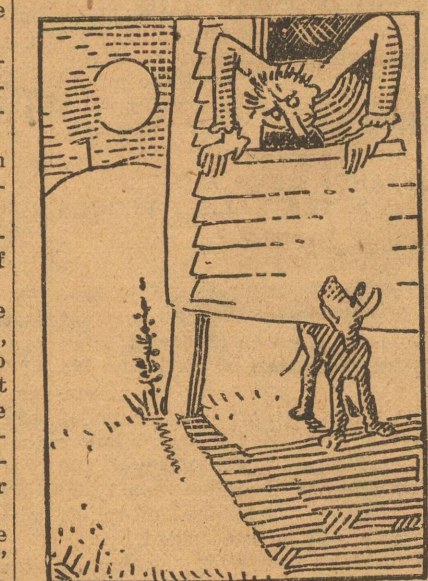
SHAKESPEARE FOLIO IS SOLD FOR LARGE SUM

'DRY' RIFLEMEN KILL SMUGGLER IN FLEEING BOAT

Prohibition Agents With Department's Expert Marksmen Capture Booze Craft.

NEW YORK, July 8.—One man was killed and another captured by prohibition officials during a chase after rum runners in Gravesend Bay. George Hallender, a fisherman, of No. 301 Flatbush avenue, Brooklyn, was killed. His companion Fred Hommel, forty, living at the Rogees hotel, Rockaway Park, was arrested. Hallender and Hommel were taken on the launch Seabird, on which were found twenty-five cases of whisky, valued at \$3,000, concealed in bur-lap bags.

Shot While Fleeing.
The Seabird was sighted just before dawn, running without lights, circumstances which caused Customs Agent James Lynch and his crew on board a government launch to hail her. Instead of answering, the Seabird turned tail and fled.

Lynch and his men fired in the air, but the Seabird continued her flight. They then directed their fire to the boat and brought Hallender down. Hommel shut off the engine and the Seabird drifted until the government boat came up alongside.

Hallender was taken to the Coney Island hospital where he died.

Hommel was examined by the authorities, and yesterday afternoon was indicted on the charge of violating the Volstead act.

According to the authorities the launch Seabird has been engaged in weekly smuggling expeditions.

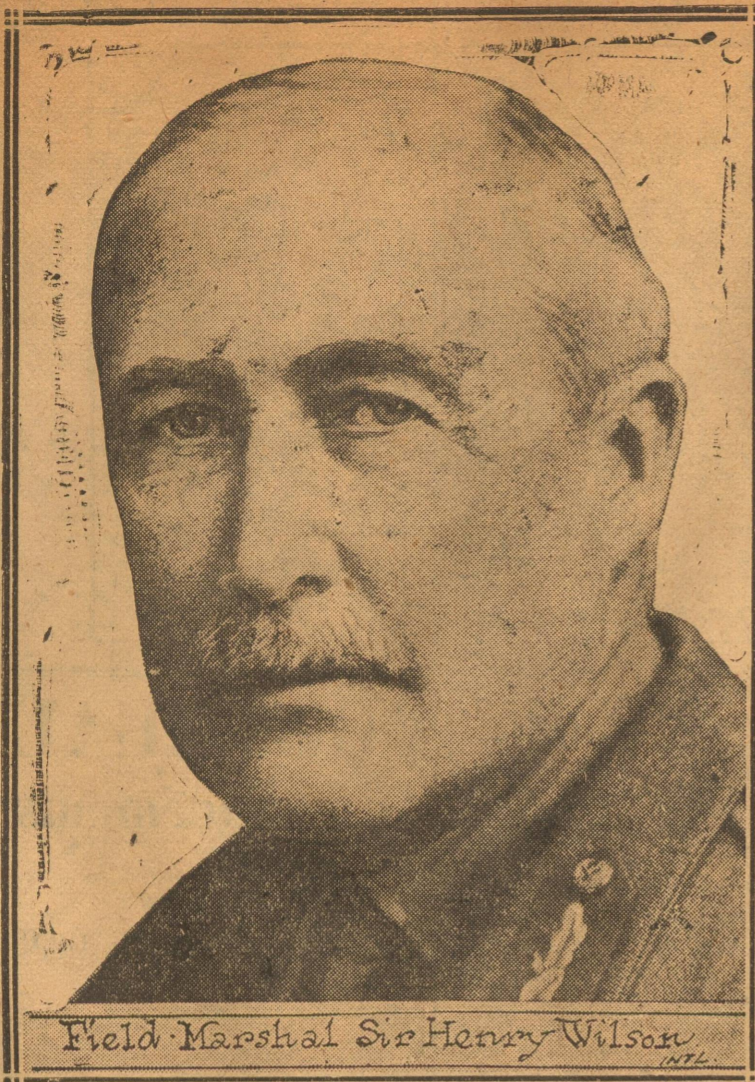
Sharpshooters Ready.
A week ago Wednesday night, it is claimed that the officials sighted and gave chase to the boat, but owing to the Seabird's speed the prohibition agents were outdistanced. Following this failure, Agent Lynch was yesterday provided with a speedy boat manned by rifle experts of the prohibition department.

Lynch claimed that following the capture an attempt was made to bribe the officers to let the prisoner go.

The agent testified that thirty cases of liquor were found by him in the Seabird.

FIELD MARSHAL'S MURDER STIRS BRITAIN

Britain was stirred as it had not been in recent years by the assassination of Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, former chief of staff of the British army, shot down in front of his London home by two men. It was reported Irish extremists were responsible, as Sir Henry had been in favor of a "mailed fist" in handling the Irish situation.

London Butcher Claims Throne of the Principality of Monaco

LONDON, July 8.—The Smithfield market section of London has been aroused by the news that George Frederick Grimaldi, a former butcher, claims the throne of the principality of Monaco and the ownership of the Monte Carlo gambling hell or gold mine, according to the viewpoint.

W. R. Martin, formerly the partner of Mr. Grimaldi in the butcher business, said:

"He undoubtedly is the eleventh Marquis Grimaldi of the peerage of Genoa, and he always stated he intended to claim the throne and title when Prince Albert died. He sold me his interest in the butchershop in 1914 when he proceeded to Monaco to be on the spot when Prince Albert died. The college of heralds recognized Mr. Grimaldi's claims after an investigation."

An English history of the Grim-

aldi's shows they were soldiers, statesmen, cardinals and princes in Genoa during the middle ages. One became the prince of Monaco and another was killed by English arrows at the battle of Crecy while commanding the Genoese cross-bowmen aiding the French. The ninth marquis was a cabinet-maker at Blackfriars.

The pretender's son, George Grimaldi, who is a motor engineer in London, said:

"The late prince of Monaco, who was married in 1869, had a son, Prince Louis, the present aspirant, but the marriage was annulled by the Holy See in 1880, and also the Salic law, precluding legal descent thru female line, overthrows the alleged prince's claim.

"In 1867 the sixth marquis, my ancestor, was exiled to France and came to England. Our descent from

him lies before the royal college of heralds. It took ten years for us to obtain certain documents to substantiate our statement that our family traditions were true."

An official of the college of heralds asks:

"Who will form the court of appeal and before whom will the claim be submitted?"

Grimaldi is now at Monte Carlo, where he has made public notices demanding the throne and the ownership of the gambling casino.

M'CORMICK SAYS HE'LL FILE LIBEL SUITS BY SCORE

CHICAGO, July 8.—Harold F. McCormick, head of the executive committee of the International Harvester company, announced his intention to sue for libel every newspaper which published the report that he purchased a gland of another man to be grafted into his own body.

With this as the first count in his libel suits, other counts, he declared, will include charges of telephone tapping, invasion of his sick room, the surrounding of his house and trespass upon his property.

It was Mr. McCormick's first statement since he went to the Wesley Memorial hospital for an operation three weeks ago, and he made it plain that he was chiefly incensed at the repeated stories that he had taken advantage of the unfortunate circumstances of a fellow man to deprive him of a vital organ.

"That is utterly untrue," he said,

and he pointed out that when the rumor first became current Dr. Victor D. Lespinasse, who attended him in the hospital, issued a denial that a human gland was used.

"This denial," said Mr. McCormick, "was printed by some but not by all of the newspapers which printed the original story."

That the telephone wires into Mr.

McCormick's house had been tapped was officially reported to the Chicago Telephone company during the day. Telephone tapping, it was said, is a criminal act.

PRINCE LOUIS HONORE RULES MONACO



Following the death of his father, Prince Albert Honore Charles, Prince Louis Honore has become the ruler of Monaco, in which Monte Carlo, the gambling resort, is the chief city. Prince Louis is fifty-one and served in the French army in the world war. He is the son of his father's first marriage, to Lady Mary Douglas Hamilton, who had her marriage annulled by the Vatican on the ground that she had been forced into it by her mother and Napoleon III. The civil decree held that the marriage should be regarded as never having taken place, but Prince Louis was declared legitimate. Lady Mary carried her son to Italy, and his father made an attempt to kidnap him, which embittered the son against the father, and a reconciliation was not effected for many years.

TWO OFFICERS HELD IN WICHITA FALLS KILLING

WICHITA FALLS, July 8.—James G. Colvin, 38 years old, an employee of the city for four years, is dead and City Detectives Tom Shook and Charles Bebout each are out under bond of \$10,000, charged with murder as the result of an attempted raid on Colvin's house at 10 o'clock Wednesday night. The five city officers who went to the Colvin home, having a federal search warrant, claim Colvin fired a shot before the two officers fired. Five bullets passed through the body. Mrs. Colvin states that both of her husband's guns had been taken from him and that he never fired a shot, and that after the guns were removed he was dragged from the porch to the corner of the house, where the shooting occurred. Two officers had made a visit to Colvin's house earlier in the evening and were denied admission to the place to search without a warrant. They secured a warrant and returned to the house at 10 o'clock, when the shooting occurred.
