QUARANTINE PROPOSED FOR STARR COUNTY

RUNNING MATE FOR LAFOLLETTE TO BE CHOSEN

National Committee Now Meeting, Optimistic for Leader's Success.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 18.—Prospects of selecting a running mate for La Follette were remote today as the Progressive leaders met to perfect plans for the independent ticket. The delay was caused merely by the multitude of details to be disposed of before the national committee can get down to the naming of the vice-presidential candidate.

A new element was injected into the situation when it was reported that Senator La Follette again is pressing Burton K. Wheeler, Democrat of Montana, to be his running mate. It was indicated that Wheeler might reach definite decision later today.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 18.—With high hopes for the success of the independent ticket in the November election, a militant band of Robert M. La Follette's followers gathered here today from every section of the country to select his running mate. No decision as to the vice-presidential candidate will be reached until after a full discussion by the group of 42 which constitutes the national committee of La Follette's organization. While 16 names will be presented to the committee, it was understood that consideration has virtually narrowed down to the following four:

John J. McFarlan, master of the Pennsylvania state grange.
Peter Witt, Cleveland labor leader.
James Mauer, head of the Pennsylvania state federation of labor.
Earley Christensen, farmer-labor candidate for president in 1920.

McFarlan, a Democrat, who ran a race against Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania, was said to be the most likely choice of the committee. He is a real dirt farmer, fully informed on the farmers' needs and a rattling good campaigner, a factor much needed on the independent ticket.

Before any selection is made, it is understood La Follette may address the meeting and, while not attempting to dictate, may picture the man needed for the place. The meeting is being held behind closed doors in the Machinist building, across the street from the American Federation of Labor headquarters. The committee was called to order by William H. Johnston, president of the American Association of Machinists.

All members of the committee are in high spirits. Most militant of all is Representative Nelson of Wisconsin, progressive leader of the house, who has just opened headquarters in Chicago. "My survey of the situation has convinced me that La Follette will have enough or more than enough votes to throw the election into the house," he said. "It means, anyhow, the beginning of the only real liberal movement this country has ever witnessed."

Arthur C. Holder, secretary of the national committee, was even more optimistic than Nelson. He predicted that La Follette would carry 25 states.

SENATOR JOE BURKETT OF EASTLAND, candidate for governor, has announced that he will speak in Eastland county at Rising Star, Friday, July 25, at 10 a. m.; Carbon, Friday, July 25, at 1:30 p. m.; Gorman, Friday, July 25, at 4:30 p. m.; and at Eastland, Friday, July 25, at 8:15 p. m.

BURKETT TELLS ABOUT HIS PLAN FOR EDUCATION

Would Charge Tuition Fee for College or University Maintained By State.

SAN MARCOS, Texas, July 18.—In discussing the educational problems of Texas before an audience here Thursday Joe Burkett said in part:

"I believe that every child in Texas should be carried through high school. If they were, I am quite sure that we would have a far better, more prosperous, and a great deal more intelligent citizenship. It is a physical impossibility to make college graduates of more than three or four months school. These men and women attending these institutions have attained their majority and should take upon themselves the responsibility of citizenship. The state now owes them nothing but protection of life, liberty, and property. If training in these higher institutions of learning will enable them to make more prosperous citizens out of themselves, I see no reason why they should not be willing to pay a reasonable tuition fee. If they are not able to pay the tuition fee, there could be a student loan fund, and when they first go out into the world to make their own way they should return this money."

Pay for Luxuries.
"It is not fair to the poor children of Texas to suffer, that these men and women may have an education that will enable them to live in luxury. You have perhaps heard men say that if there had been a tuition fee through these institutions and to become prosperous, to reimburse the institution with a reasonable amount of money for each year that they spent there, is not entitled to such luxuries. Of course few of them will do it. That is why it would be necessary to charge this institution fee."

"Then there are people from other states who come here to get the benefit of this free education and the taxpayers of Texas have to sacrifice this money for the benefit of other states. And the children of our free public schools that are not able to support themselves have to suffer for it."

To Aid Common Schools.
"I believe in our higher institutions of learning; I believe they are essential, but I believe that the schools of the masses—our colleges of the common people—should not suffer by paying more attention to the institutions of higher learning than to the lower schools. We must make our public schools our chief concern—must make them really worth-while institutions. Teach the boys and girls vocational training as well as literary learning. If this is done they can assist the state in its duties instead of becoming burdensome."

"I advocate a reasonable tuition fee, say \$150 a year or more, to be paid by those attending these higher institutions which would go to help support them. Surely a man cannot be parasite enough to wish the state to put him on the charity list. No man would get out and beg people to give him money to go to school without a promise to pay it back. No man or woman of age would rob an ignorant child of money that they themselves might live in ease and pleasure, and yet when they ask these institutions to charge no tuition fee they are doing just that."

MacLaren Plans to Resume His Flight North Tomorrow

TOKIO, July 18.—Major A. Stuart MacLaren, British round-the-world flyer, will be off again for the storm-swept north at 4 a. m. tomorrow, said a dispatch from Yezo island, radioed from where MacLaren was found. The message said that the big plane was not damaged and the four passengers were well and in good spirits. Fog forced the landing, the dispatch said. MacLaren will fly to Paramushiru tomorrow if the weather will permit. There a major base for the flight is located.

FOREST FIRES ALONG PACIFIC COAST HAVE RUN THEIR COURSE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18.—Fires which have raged in the Pacific coast forests for a week had virtually died out today. Ranchers were beginning to return to their homes, sometimes finding them in ruins. Campers were beginning to venture into the timber lands again.

HOUSTON-BEAUMONT ELECTRIC LINE TO BE BUILT

HOUSTON.—All obstacles have finally been cleared away, and work is to begin soon on the Houston-Beaumont electric line, according to officials of the company. All of the \$5,000,000 bond issue was taken by the S. P. Thayer and Son company, an investment company of Washington, D. C., and Pittsburg, Pa. The J. D. Davis company of Atlanta, Ga., has made \$50,000 bond under its contract for building the road, which is to be completed in fifteen months, dated to begin July 20. The line is first to be completed to Orange, and then probably extended to Lake Charles, La., according to plans of Ed Kennedy, promoter and general manager of the road.

Gangsters Brought Into Rhode Island Political Squabble

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 18.—The Providence News today prints a sensational story asserting it has affidavits from a New York and Boston gangster in which he confesses that gangsters were hired by the Republicans to break the recent filibuster in the state legislature. The gangsters are said to be the men who introduced bundles of gauze and paper treated with powerful chemicals into the legislature halls during the filibuster, causing several to be overcome.

Quotations on 26 gravity was discontinued Thursday. Until today prices of the Texas Pipe Line company were the same as those of the Sinclair, Gulf and Prairie companies.

TWO DANGERS CONFRONTING NATION ARE POINTED OUT

EL PASO.—The "homeless man" and the "automobile family" are two of the most serious dangers to the country and the American home today, according to J. B. Rawlings of the Associated Charities here. Rawlings pointed out that 25 years ago the "homeless man" was the man too old to work. Today he is the boy from 16 to 25 years of age, who is seeing the country at the expense of communities, Rawlings said.

TYPHUS FEVER SITUATION IS VERY SERIOUS

Federal Government Making Investigation. Rangers May Also Go to Border.

AUSTIN, Texas, July 18.—Developments in the typhus fever situation in Starr county came fast this morning and the belief at the state capital is that before the close of the day a quarantine against the infected county will be established.

The federal government has taken cognizance of the situation and an official is now en route to Rio Grande city to investigate. While only 18 cases of typhus are reported officially, a statement made here says that there are several hundred. State Health Officer Duggan claims that the health officer at Rio Grande city is not giving proper co-operation.

Oil Refineries to Suspend Because of Lower Crude Prices

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 18.—The shutdown of many small refineries in Oklahoma and the probable suspension of activity by strictly independent oil refineries are predicted here, following the cut in crude oil prices announced here yesterday.

British Premier Loses Measure on Vote in Parliament

LONDON, July 18.—The Macdonald government was defeated in the house of commons today, 211 to 249, on a vote on a proposed amendment to the unemployment insurance bill. The defeat was due to many federal liberals voting against the government.

CLEM SHAVER NAMED CHAIRMAN DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

NEW YORK, July 18.—Clem Shaver of West Virginia, the man who did more than any other to bring about the nomination of John W. Davis, has been decided upon as chairman of the democratic national executive committee and Davis' campaign manager, the United Press was informed today.

ONE COLLEGE TO HAVE ONLY FRESHMEN THIS YEAR

GAINESVILLE.—Only freshman work will be offered at the Junior college here during the 1924-25 term, according to an announcement accepted and the island voted \$100,000 for the purpose of building the school and laboratory, and the project is so well under way that Columbia will begin laboratory work in its course in tropical medicine.

Health Officials Crusade Against Common Drinking Glass

FEDERAL, State and Municipal health authorities, with the co-operation of official, semi-official and private disease prevention organizations, have declared war on the common drinking glass. Forty-five states have framed laws against its use and these statutes have been reinforced by local health regulations in which the reuse of these receptacles without sterilization is prohibited. Most of these laws and local regulations attach severe penalties to violations.

Neglect and carelessness in public places is so widespread, however, that the health authorities have asked for the co-operation of the public in the reporting of offenses against the sanitary code. This assistance is solicited so that there will result a reduction of the communicable diseases that are transmitted by the use of the common drinking receptacle.

Bacteriological analysis has disclosed that the spread of colds, grippe, influenza, pneumonia, diphtheria, tonsillitis, measles, tuberculosis, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and influenza is due in a large measure to the common glasses improperly washed between users. The U. S. Public Health Service Bulletin No. 57 gave particular warning of this danger.

The General Health Bureau, a volunteer agency for disease prevention, has pointed out the menace through:

8:30. George woke me up to go to work. Gave me a scalding hot bath. Then a brisk massage with a brush—not so clean. Another scalding bath, and then put me back on the shelf. He says now I'm sanitary. darn me!

9:00. My master took me in my new career. I was in a very cool fluid that I'm filled with. She leaves some red stuff on me, but George gets most of it off when he washes me again in hot water. I'm beginning to hate this hot water. They'll carry this washing too far, mark my words.

9:30. On the job again. Rough boy gets me. He has a buck tooth and he chips me. On my first day, too. It wasn't George's fault. The rough boy carried off what was left of beautiful young lady's roshness.

10:00. My turn once more. Big man with moustache. Not so clean, neither of them. Don't want men to kiss me, leaves something I don't like on my inside. George getting tired; doesn't get all the stuff off.

10:30. Another lady—not beautiful this time. She's impolite, too. Talks through me. She sneezes. Glad to get another bath. George talks to the lady and gets me only half clean.

11:00. Why do men drink so much? This one has a cough. Tells George he had a bad siege but is nearly better now. He coughs again to prove it. I can't dodge. These baths getting worse all the time. Wish I could get a real good bath.

11:15. This man has a hang-over, whatever that is. George says this will fix him up. I don't like this man. He doesn't smell nice, neither does the stuff he drinks.

11:30. Hurrah! A lovely little girl. George's master tells her mamma she—the little girl—is the

picture of health. I wish I were cleaner, because I like her kisses.

12:00. George gives me a plunge in some sloppy water. Says he don't care; he's going to have lunch.

12:15. A girl. She oughtn't to use me, the way I feel. There's some funny stuff where the rough boy chipped me. She drinks me clean. I'm sorry for her.

11:20. Back to the men. This fellow says he's got a nasty headache; doesn't feel so good. Neither do I; the hot baths are getting scarcer and scarcer.

12:25. In the dirty water again. Ugh! I hate it. Bits of butter-milk, drops of this and that. I'm getting all clouded up.

12:30. Another nice girl. I'm ashamed of myself. However, she doesn't seem to mind.

12:45. George is back. Still tired. No hope of that nice hot bath in clean water.

12:50. George has turned anarchist. Says he doesn't care what the law is; nobody'll notice.

1:00. George is wrong. Man comes in. Orders something and then pours it into sloppy water. Shows a badge and takes me away. A rest at last.

Prince of Wales Big Drawing Card To Sporting Events

By FRANK GETTY. (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, July 18.—If any promoter would ensure the success of his sporting event, let him persuade the popular Prince of Wales to come. Then all he need do is dust off the "S. R. O." signs.

There is something magnetic about the British heir apparent which draws folks like flies at a honey jar. He is a better drawing card than Babe Ruth, Jack Dempsey and Mary Pickford rolled into one. The British-American polo matches are to be resumed at Meadow Brook this fall, for the first time since 1914. It's been so long since we had these matches that most folks seemed to have forgotten that polo is the sport of kings and something to go to just to say you've been there.

The tickets, which are expensive, weren't going like hot-cakes or anything of the sort. So the United States Polo association announced that the Princes of Wales would attend.

For the next few weeks the postman groaned beneath the load of applications for tickets from all parts of the country. There was a deluge of letters each morning at the association's headquarters. Everyone and his wife—particularly his wife, perhaps—just had to go to see the polo this fall. Telephones jangled continuously with demands for reservations. A few days ago the seat sale was thrown open to the public. And even though the prince's coming is somewhat uncertain, there are practically no seats left for the polo.

It's the same way with a fight. When Tex Rickard was flirting with a calendar, trying to pick the best date for the (maybe) Wills-Firpo fight, he bethought himself of nights that were unacceptable and days that wouldn't do. Then he read about the Prince of Wales's coming to this country, and the problem was solved. Tex selected September 5, and immediately laid plans to persuade his royal highness to attend, knowing full well that if word got around that the prince was to be there, there would be no vacant seats.

The chances are that if the prince actually does see the fight, however, it will be in strictest incognito, accompanied by an announcement that he will not be there. Considering the unwieldiness of a big fight crowd at night, the authorities are not anxious to take a chance with the distinguished visitor's comfort.

It has always been a bit of a mystery as to whether Wales was present at the Dempsey-Firpo fight—that never-to-be-forgotten night at the Polo Grounds last summer. The report got around that "Lord Renfrey" had slipped down from Canada and was among those present. It was never confirmed. Sometimes Tex wouldn't deny it; sometimes he would.

The proposal has been made to mount the Prince of Wales and have him participate in some practice matches at Meadowbrook.

The prospect of seeing the heir to the British throne do one of his celebrated broodies from the back of a galloping nag is certainly an enticing one to the American sports lover. After all, it seems only fair that the United States should see one fall in 15; aren't we cousins and all that sort of thing?

The international polo matches start September 6, and will end on the 10th or the 13th, according to whether a third game is necessary. The American open championship, in which two British teams are entered, starts immediately after the Anglo-American matches are out of the way.

THIS IS THE LARGEST INCUBATOR IN THE WORLD

The largest electrical chicken hatching plant in the world is located at Petaluma, Cal., where a great new hatchery is rapidly being completed, which will house an electric hen capable of covering 508,000 eggs at one setting. That would indeed be the talk of the barnyard if it could be visualized before the eyes of the common two-legged variety of hen.

The Petaluma hatchery is electric throughout, and its new plant will be able to ship 25,000 chicks daily. The output for a single season is three million chicks. Thirty of the largest egg farms in the vicinity are kept busy supplying eggs for this hatchery.

The owner of this super-hen studied electric incubation for two years, both in this country and abroad, and finally came to the conclusion that hatching by electricity is the last word in artificial incubation. He holds that it produces a sturdier, healthier chick and one that matures more rapidly to the producing age.

Throughout the heavy hatching season, from the first of February until June, the temperature in each of the twelve hundred incubators is maintained at 103 degrees without the slightest variation. In the new plant of this hatchery, electric heaters are to be installed in the offices, so that it will be an all-electrical plant, using no other kind of fuel except electricity.

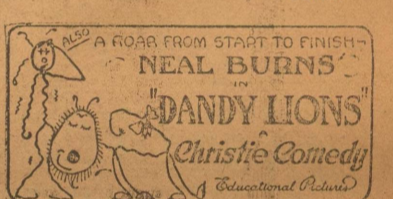

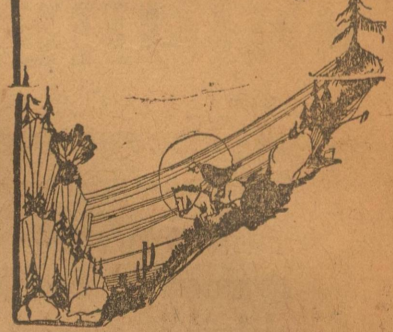

Public Service Co. Learns Publicity Has Great Value

LONDON, July 16.—Advertising, as applied to public utilities, was discussed today in a speech before the Association of Ad Clubs of the world by L. S. Storrs, president of the Connecticut Company of New Haven.

"Advertising, especially in the electric railway field, is comparatively new in the United States," he said. "It took almost a death blow to our industry, during the late war, to make us realize what publicity could do for us. But now we know, and have taken up this agency never to lay it down again.

"Possibly nowhere may be found more concrete proof of the good results of advertising and publicity than in our electric railway industry.

"The founders of the electric railways in the states, less wise than your transportation men, built around a fixed rate of fare. As a result, when the war forced up wages and other costs and five cents no longer produced sufficient revenue to meet expenses, our question was to convince the public that a higher fare was needed and no more than just.

with the national association's activities. It was the motto of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, somewhat extended, "Truth in Advertising and Publicity." Furthermore, the policy was carried out to the letter. The whole truth about the situation favorable and unfavorable to the industry—and there was plenty that was unfavorable, was laid before the public.

"Co-incidentally, companies throughout the country were urged to adopt the same policy. Now, six years later, more than three hundred companies are using advertising and publicity of many kinds. Newspaper advertisements, posters, booklets, motion pictures, stickers and speakers are being used to tell the story of the electric railways to the American public.

"Results pay a high tribute to the power of advertising. When our industry began telling its story to the public, one-sixth of its total mileage was in bankruptcy and the rest was

headed for a crash. Today, practically every large property has emerged from receivership. The nickel fare, or any fixed fare appears to have been shaken off for all time, and the average fare is about 7 cents compared with 5 cents six years ago.

Service Goes With Ads.

"Nor is the monetary result the only one from this publicity. It was quickly realized that advertising is wasted unless service goes with it, and as a result service has greatly improved. Furthermore, the advertising men have brought most of our executives out of their shells. The public now realizes that they do not have horns, as demagogues long have insisted, and the public and management alike have learned the wisdom of Charles Lamb's remark to the effect that it is difficult to dislike a person one knows.

We have only started our advertising work in the electric railway field, but it is growing and we are optimistic over its future. 1923

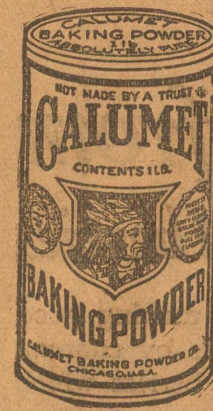
something like \$2,500,000 was spent for advertising by our electric railways. The appropriations of several companies exceeded \$100,000, and a number of them are approaching a two per cent gross appropriation. That is a fair start, but it is not the end, for results have convinced us that full and truthful publicity pays.

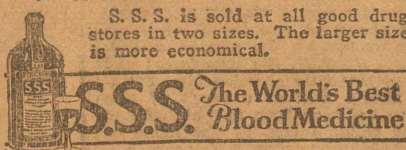
