

Miriam A. Ferguson Probable Choice of Texas Democrats for State's Chief Executive Office

Early Returns Show Her In the Lead, and Each Succeeding Report Indicates That Her Gain Is Increasing Steadily; Cureton, Gilmore, Moody, Terrell and Smith **Probably Winners in State Run-Off Con**tests; Edwards-Miller Race in Doubt.

the returns began coming in at the close of the polls at 7 o'clock tonight.

The Times-Herald, which is considered sympathetic towards Robertson, the klan candidate for governor, is burning lights on the Magnolia building here, the understanding being that green lights would be burned when Robertson was leading and red lights when Ferguson was leading. At 9:40 o'clock tonight the red lights were burning, as they had since the beginning of the count. .

Practically complete returns from 19 counties on the governor's race and partial returns on the other races announced at 7:30 o'clock were as folllows:

For Governor-Ferguson, 7,053; Robertson, 5,148. Lieutenant Governor-Edwards, 2,796; Miller, 2,956. Attorney General-Moody, 4,025; Ward, 1,067. Comptroller-Baker, 1,764; Terrell, 3,571. Railroad Commissioner, Six-year Term-Gilmore, 3,562; Weaver, 1,750.

All run-off candidates endorsed by the Eastland County Con stitutional club appeared to have won a decisive victory in the primaries of Saturday, according to complete reports from all the larger voting boxes in Eastland county and incomplete returns from scattered and smaller boxes.

The klan candidates went down in defeat in the face of the large vote that turned out, which was generally, contrary to expectations, as large as the vote cast in the first primary. Since that primary, several weeks ago, the anti-klan forces appear to have gained strength, so that they were easily able to elect all their candidates in the run-off primary.

The total vote cast in Ranger in the first primary was 1734, and in the run-off primary it was 1729, a loss of only five votes. While this was virtually 1,000 votes under the registered voting strength of Ranger, it was considered very good in view of the large number who are away on summer vacations.

The vote cast in Eastland, in Cisco, Gorman, Rising Star, Desdemona-in fact, at virtually every box in Eastland county, was nearly, or quite as large as in the run-off primary as in the first primary, indicating the interest aroused.

Successful local candidates who were in the run-off primary, are:

T. J. Cunningham, nominated for judge of the county court at law, over C. L. (Clyde) Garrett.

R. W. Edwards, nominated for sheriff over the present encumbent, J. D. Barton.

L. C. Gorton elected justice of the peace of precinct 2, place 1, oevr Hayden Neal.

The contest between Richardson and Seabourn for constable of precinct 1 was still in doubt. Richardson got a substan tial majority in Olden and Seabourn in Eastland, with the Mangum box to be heard from.

NAVY AFTER RUM-RUNNERS.

Orders have been issued by Attorney General Stone to United States attorneys at coast and border points to employ the tariff act of 1922 against liquor runners whenever possible. Under section 593 of the tariff act, smugglers of goods, including whisky, are liable to imprisonment in a federal penitentiary and a fine of \$5,000, while under the prohibition laws the punishment of. the smugglers is much less certain and the penalty lighter.

Next month will see many of the destroyers transferred from the navy to the coast guard come into commission. Twenty former destroyers are now being reconditioned for duty against the rum smugglers. These destroyers are armed with three and four-inch guns and have a speed of from 25 to 35 knots. Besides the destroyers the dry armada will consist of two former navy mine sweepers and more than 300 fast motor boats.

Federal Commissioner Haynes has caused the bonded liquor to be concentrated into a few warehouses, and established a system of issuing permits for withdrawels that leaves few loopholes. Government chemists report that a large percentage of moonshine sold illegally in the United States is "poisonous."


