MAIS LEADING

ANTI KLAN CANDIDATES IN EASTLAND COUNTY LEADING

Miriam A. Ferguson Probable Choice of Texas Democrats for State's Chief Executive Office

Early Returns Show Her In the Lead, and Each Succeeding Report Indicates That Her Gain Is Increasing Steadily; Cureton, Gilmore, Moody, Terrell and Smith Probably Winners in State Run-Off Contests; Edwards-Miller Race in Doubt.

All run-off candidates endorsed by the Eastland County Constitutional club appeared to have won a decisive victory in the primaries of Saturday, according to complete reports from all the larger voting boxes in Eastland county and incomplete returns from scattered and smaller boxes.

The klan candidates went down in defeat in the face of the large vote that turned out, which was generally, contrary to expectations, as large as the vote cast in the first primary. Since that primary, several weeks ago, the anti-klan forces appear to have gained strength, so that they were easily able to elect all their candidates in the run-off primary.

The total vote cast in Ranger in the first primary was 1734, and in the run-off primary it was 1729, a loss of only five votes. While this was virtually 1,000 votes under the registered voting strength of Ranger, it was considered very good in view of the large number who are away on summer vacations.

The vote cast in Eastland, in Cisco, Gorman, Rising Star, Desdemona—in fact, at virtually every box in Eastland county, was nearly, or quite as large as in the run-off primary as in the first primary, indicating the interest aroused.

Successful local candidates who were in the run-off primary, are:

T. J. Cunningham, nominated for judge of the county court at law, over C. L. (Clyde) Garrett.

R. W. Edwards, nominated for sheriff over the present incumbent, J. D. Barton.

L. C. Gorton elected justice of the peace of precinct 2, place 1, over Hayden Neal.

The contest between Richardson and Seabourn for constable of precinct 1 was still in doubt. Richardson got a substantial majority in Olden and Seabourn in Eastland, with the Mangum box to be heard from.

DALLAS, Aug. 23.—Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson has been leading in the run-off race for the democratic gubernatorial nomination ever since the returns began coming in at the close of the polls at 7 o'clock tonight.

The Times-Herald, which is considered sympathetic towards Robertson, the klan candidate for governor, is burning lights on the Magnolia building here, the understanding being that green lights would be burned when Robertson was leading and red lights when Ferguson was leading. At 9:40 o'clock tonight the red lights were burning, as they had since the beginning of the count.

WELSHMEN MAKE PRINCE OF WALES A "WELSH BARD"

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The Prince of Wales has been given the highest honor Welshmen can confer. He has been made a "Welsh bard," and duly initiated into the inner circle of Druids.

This is the first time any non-Welshman, even a Prince of Wales, has been given the full degree of the Welsh society which is based upon ancient rites of the Druids.

The ceremonies were held at Pon-

typool, in South Wales, where thousands of Welshmen assembled to cheer the prince.

The Arch Druid, supreme officer of the bards, wore a crown of oak leaves and was dressed in robes of ancient design. To the sound of the "hiras horn" which blew, of old, to proclaim war or to herald peace—the Arch Druid unsheathed the traditional sword of the Welsh kings.

"Is there peace?" he asked, in Welsh, brandishing the sword.

"Peace" replied the white-robed bards.

Twice more the Arch Druid asked

the question—holding the sword in readiness—and twice more received the assurance of the clan.

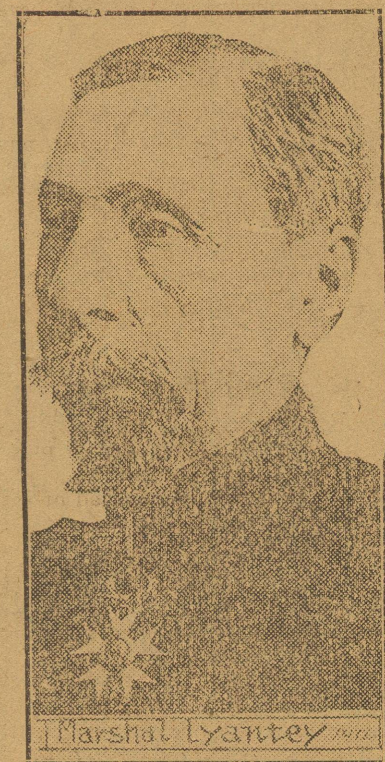
Thus satisfied that nobody was seeking trouble, the Arch Druid put a crown of oak leaves on the Prince of Wales' head, sheathed his sword, and the remainder of the day was devoted to singing songs.

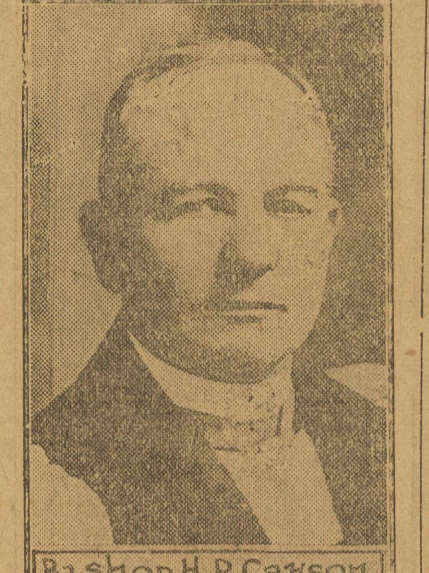

WALTER P. CHRYSLER'S TRAFFIC TALKS

DELAYS COSTLY
 According to a report made by the Committee on Regional Plan of New York and its Environs street traffic congestion in Manhattan causes a loss estimated at \$500,000 a day, while for the area in the region known as New York and its environs the estimated loss is \$1,000,000 a day. These figures are reached by comparison with other communities where careful estimates were possible. The loss in Worcester, Mass., was found to be \$35,000 daily; in Cincinnati it was \$100,000, and in Chicago, \$200,000. Not many cities will have the same problems as New York but every city should have foresight and prepare now to meet the time when there will be more motor vehicles in use.

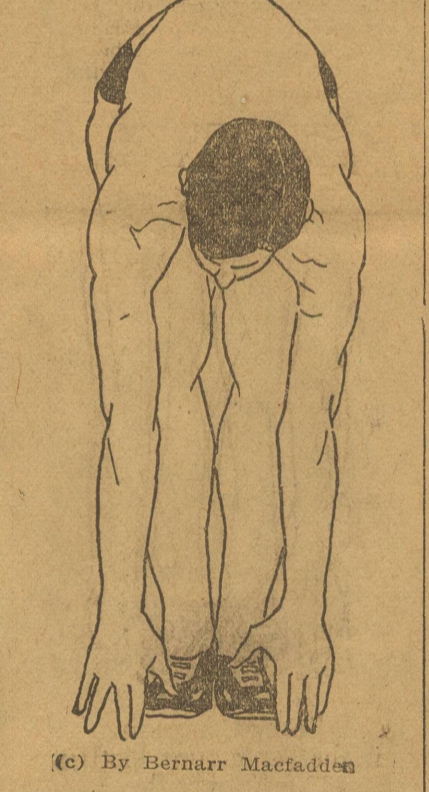
Bishop Uses Airplanes on Haitian Tour.

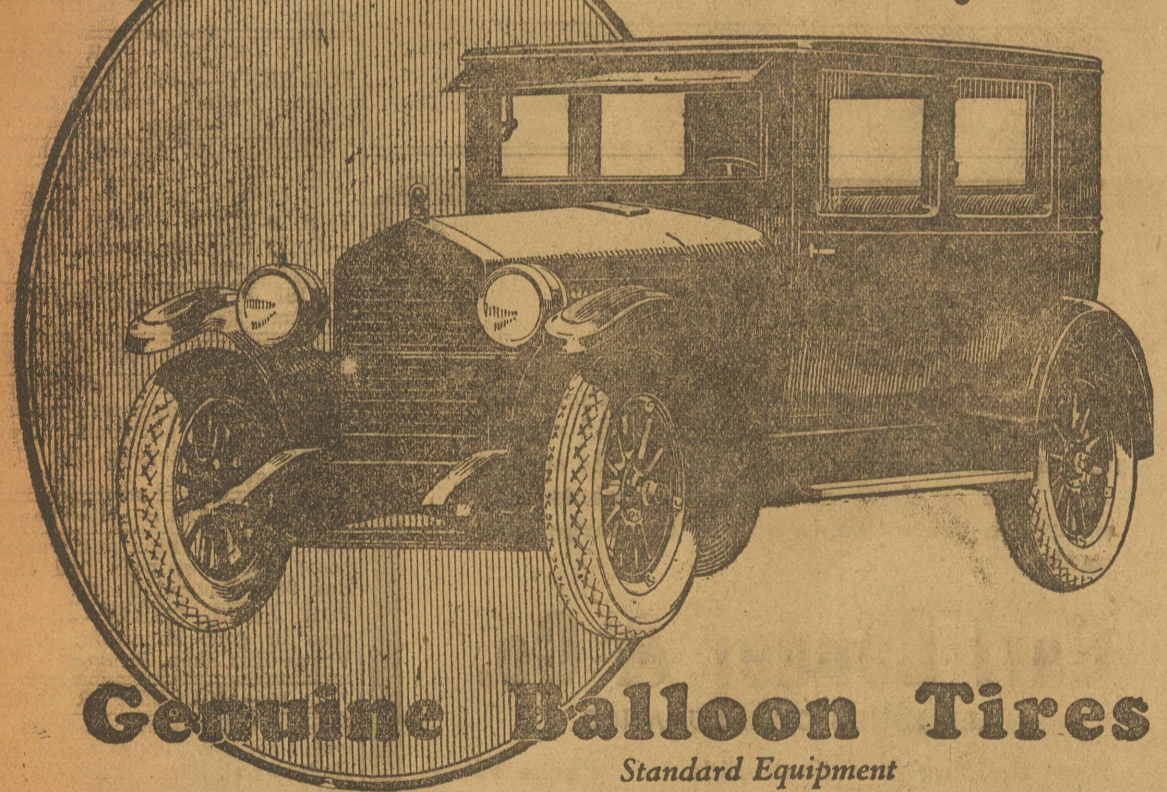

RANGER PLANS TO FILE SUITS TO GET TAXES

Names of Delinquent Tax Payers to Be Published Unless Settlement Is Made.

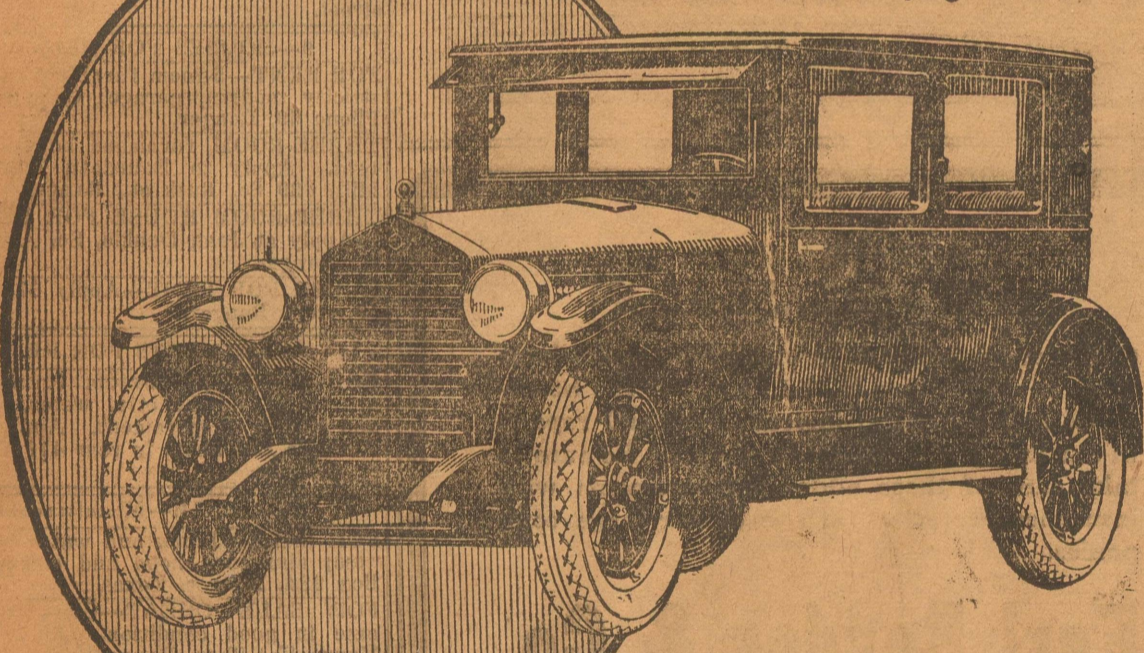

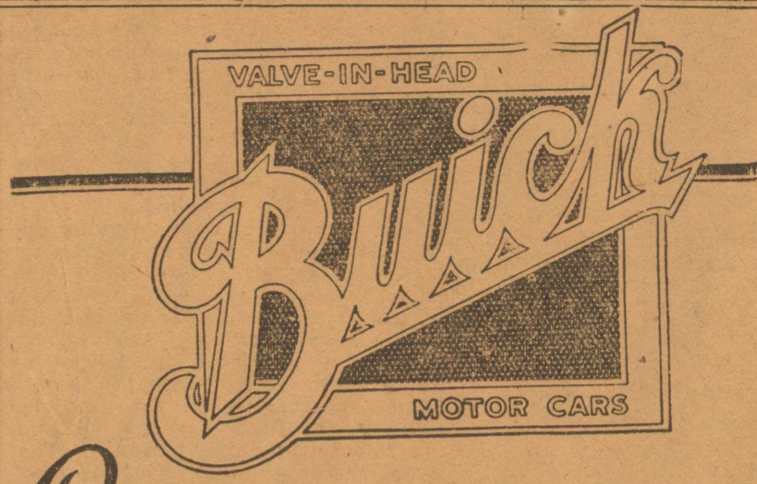
The meeting began Thursday and closed Sunday afternoon. A big barbecue was one of the features of the meeting.

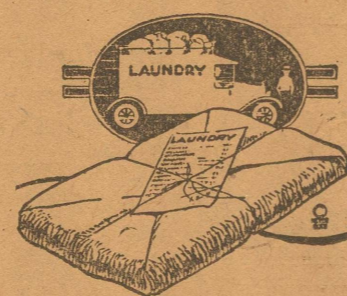

STUDY OF GLANDS FOR MENTAL DEVELOPMENT ATTRACTING ATTENTION

By United Press.
 PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23.—Making over man's mental as well as his physical characteristics is possible through scientific rectification of abnormal gland functions.

This, according to Dr. Clayton Wheeler, gland specialist of Los Angeles, will ultimately mean that many social liabilities, inmates of penitentiaries and asylums, will be made over into lawful citizens.

Dr. Wheeler left here for Chicago to make an investigation of the cases of Nathan Leopold Jr., and Richard Loeb, declaring he was confident the supposed abnormalities of these two young men are due to unnatural

functioning of certain glands—a condition which might be changed.

Wheeler, as a specialist, has gone deeper into the question of gland functions than the popular study of rejuvenation by gland operations. He says glands are responsible for many things in mankind.

"By manipulation of certain glands, one twin can be made a dwarf and the other a giant," Dr. Wheeler said.

"An idiotic child in an asylum can be made mentally alert by implanting a thyroid gland, for example.

"The internal secretions of the human body are the result of gland functions. Some are over-developed or depressed, and these bring certain results and characteristics."

The study of glands only began to attract attention a few years ago, Dr. Wheeler said. Since then it has opened up a new field of medicine, he believes, and the research work is only skirting the edges of future possibilities.

HOLLAND CONCLUDES LIQUOR TREATY WITH RESERVATIONS

ONE DISEASE DISPLACES OR HEALS ANOTHER

Physicians Discover Malaria Germs Will Cure, or Modify, Paralysis.

LONDON (By mail to United Press).—Daring medical experiments, so far apparently successful, have been undertaken recently in deliberately giving persons one disease in order to cure another.

At the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine patients suffering with general paralysis have been shot full of malaria germs upon the theory malaria would cure or modify the paralysis.

Eighty-four paralysis cases have been treated. Of these, 23 have so improved that they are about to be discharged from the hospital. Never before, it is said, has any paralysis patient been discharged from this hospital, because no cure nor any appreciable improvement was ever accomplished before.

Seventeen other cases have shown "distinct mental and great physical improvement," it is reported. This total of 40 cases of distinct and sometimes remarkable improvement out of 84 cases—which before had been regarded as hopeless—causes the physicians conducting the experiments to believe they are upon the track of something that will open up an entirely new field of medical research.

The experiments were based upon observations that occasionally in the tropics severe diseases counteract each other completely. Physicians had reported that in India, Bengal fever and pneumonia had offset each other. Most persons having both at the same time recovered. Most persons having only the fever or pneumonia, died. So, at the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine they simply began to mix different diseases and see what happened. Ultimately the apparent efficacy of malaria bugs against paralysis was found. Experiments are continuing, mostly with malaria germs in opposition to other diseases.

Of course, one awkward phase of the matter is that the patient cured of paralysis, or improved, is left with malaria. The answer to that, say the experimenters, is that it is better to have malaria than to be paralyzed, and that quinine can cure malaria, whereas, nothing before has been able to cure paralysis.

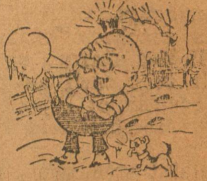

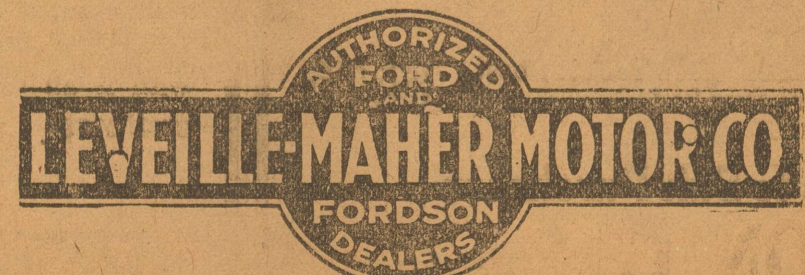

OLYMPIC EVENT CHANGES WON'T HURT THE U. S.

American Athletes Fail to Excel in Races to Be Cut Out Of Program.

By HENRY L. FARRELL, United Press Sports Editor.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—Elimination of the pentathlon, the 10,000-metres walk, the cross-country race and the 5,000-metre team race from the program of the 1928 Olympic games has caused some criticism among athletic critics in the United States.

Without any reasonable foundation, it has been suggested that the international Olympic committee is

seeking to do in the executive chamber what it can't do on the field—put an end to the American supremacy in the Olympics.

Any such suggestion is silly. The United States didn't win any of the events in Paris that were cut off the program, and in 1920 at Antwerp the United States won only the team race.

Perhaps there are some prejudicial sportsmen in Europe who would like to cut out some of the pet American events, but they can't do it without hurting the program and making obvious their purpose.

The sprinting races, the middle distance runs, the relays and the distance events are the most attractive parts of an athletic program. Good crowds were in the stadium whenever there were good, short races on the program, and the stands were almost deserted when the pentathlon and some of the other dull events were carried.

When the need was pointed out, in the committee meeting, of cutting down a program that was decided to be too bulky, there were some suggestions that the field events be reduced so that more of a premium

would be awarded to running and hurdling.

The same suggestion was made in intercollegiate circles here last winter when some of the lofty minded easterners said it was a darn shame that the University of California could come east with a couple of hammer throwers, shot putters and jumpers and run away with the championship.

Following this line of argument, it would be just as sensible for the directors of professional baseball to get after the Giants, who could win a lot of championships without a pitching staff, and to look for a remedy for the Yankee case, where a string of pennants were won with a staff of all-star pitchers. The Giants and the Yanks have been cornering the pennant market because they had well-balanced teams. The American Olympic team has never lost a championship because the United States always has sent a well-balanced team out after the championship.

It can be argued, of course, that the Americans are weak in the running events, and depend upon sweeping all the other events to make up for the losses from the quarter mile on. It is hardly reasonable, however, to expect any team from any country to place first or second in every event on the program.

There are changes in the system of scoring that might make it harder for the Americans, and they have been discussed. After the games in 1920, when Finland and the United States tied with nine first places each, the complaint was made the United States won a numerical victory, that the United States had a bigger team and scored the majority of points in a larger number of events.

The French then decided to put a bigger premium on first place by making the winner worth 10 points. This failed to bring the desired results, as the Americans went out and won 12 events.

The Amsterdam officials, who have been awarded the 1928 games, have decided on six, five, four, three, two, one as their scoring system.

Elimination of the pentathlon should cause no complaint. The decathlon is a better event, calling for more all-around skill, and the two events, as a rule, draw the same entries. The pentathlon was a frost in Paris, and was contested before empty stands.

The walk is a trick event. Perhaps it would have been better, however, to restore the 5,000 metres walk and eliminate the long and tiresome 10,000-metre thing.

Any criticism about the removal of the cross-country race can be countered with the question: Why do they not have cross-country races in the United States during the hot days of July?

There are other events on the program that could have been kicked out instead of the team race. It is an interesting event to watch, and it requires fine sportsmanship, exacting, as it does, the sacrifices of individual honor and glory for the interests of the team.

Officials of the Amsterdam committee in Paris said they had decided upon several changes in the program. They said they would not only start the program earlier in the afternoon, but they would have a lot of the preliminary heats contested in the morning.

Rather than hurry their Parisian customers through their sacred 90 minutes' lunch hour, the French committee did not start the program until 3 o'clock, and it was seldom that the program was completed before 3 o'clock. Several times it was later than 9 o'clock.

This worked a hardship upon the athletes, especially the Americans, who were forced to take a 12-mile ride back to camp, only to find that the kitchen had been closed for the night.

CRUTCHER IS ELECTED CITY COMMISSIONER

He Will Succeed Virgil Seabury, Who Resigned Office In Eastland.

Tom W. Crutcher was elected city commissioner of Eastland at a special election held there Saturday. He succeeds Virgil Seabury, resigned.

Mr. Crutcher had no opposition and received 379 votes. It was rumored just before the polls opened that a dark-horse candidate would come into the race, but he never appeared and Mr. Crutcher had a walk away.

All towns in Eastland and adjoining counties may enter contestants and it is reported that many of them will be represented. Eastland will have about 15 entries, it is stated.

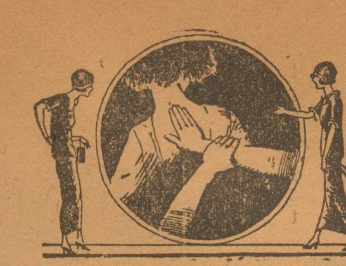

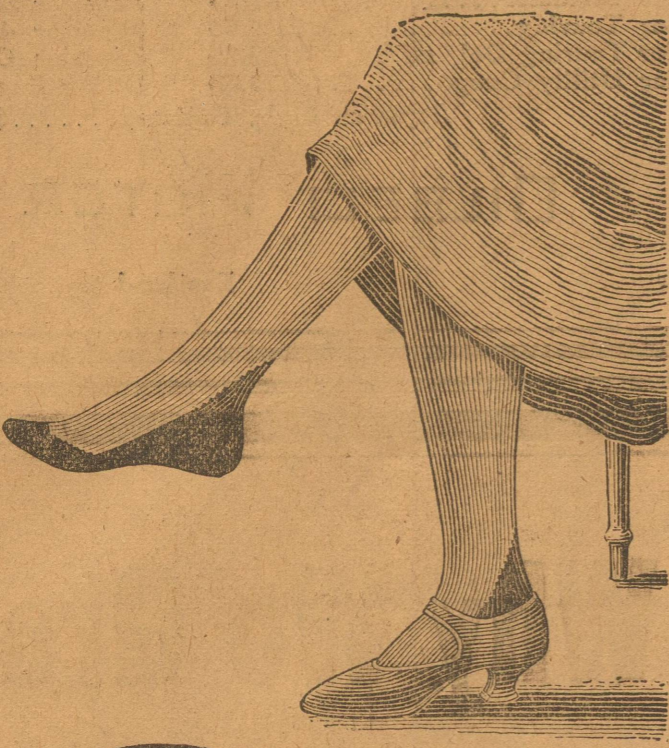

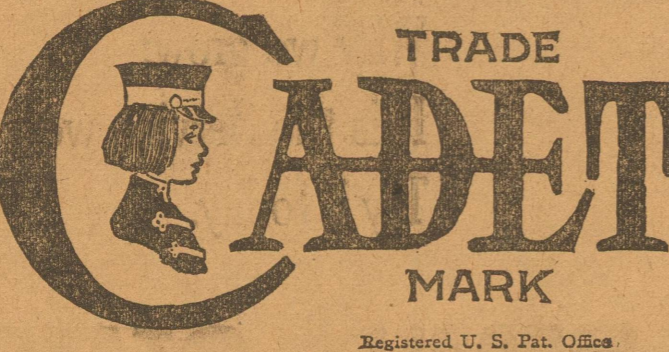
