State Forges Two New Links In 'Typhus Germ Murder'

DAMNING CLEWS DEVELOPED IN BACILLI DEATH

Shepherd, Faïman Will Both Face Death Penalty, Says State's Attorney

STUDENT GIVES EVIDENCE

Saw Shepherd at Laboratory—Faïman Planned Building

CHICAGO, March 18.—William D. Shepherd must stand trial on charges he murdered his millionaire ward, Billie McClintock, by inoculating him with typhoid germs. The indictment, charging Shepherd with murder, was returned in open court before Chief Justice Hopkins today. Shepherd probably will be lodged in the county jail before night, State Attorney Robert E. Crowe said.

Dr. Charles C. Faïman, president of the National University of Science, whose amazing confession that he was an accessory to the alleged murder plot, by giving three tubes of germs to Shepherd, also was indicted. Faïman may be given a separate trial or may be co-defendant in the same trial with Shepherd. Almost simultaneously with the voting of the indictments against Shepherd and Faïman, Crowe found a new witness to corroborate Faïman's confession, which is vigorously denied by Shepherd. This witness, Robert White, said he was a student at Faïman's school and saw Shepherd there.

"I saw him in October, 1923," White told Crowe, after picking Shepherd out of a crowd of men. "He inquired about our equipment and asked to see our president."

Although White could give no testimony concerning Shepherd's search for germs, it was considered important that he had seen Shepherd at the school because Shepherd flatly denied ever being there.

Another link to the chain which Crowe believes will send Shepherd to the gallows or life imprisonment, was brought in by Sanford Olsen, son of Chief Justice Harry Olsen of the municipal court. Young Olsen found a letter written on Faïman's stationery to a large firm of architects asking about plans for a proposed new \$150,000 school and hospital building. Faïman confessed he was to receive \$100,000 from Shepherd for his part of the plot and Crowe believes this letter is proof of the deal.

Flanked by his two attorneys, William Scott Stewart and W. W. O'Brien, Shepherd received the news of his indictment with apparent calm. His face twitched a bit and he admitted a dislike for a jail cell, but he was quick to deny the formal charges against him.

CHICAGO, March 18.—Formal indictment charging William D. Shepherd with murdering Billie McClintock, his millionaire orphan ward, was returned by the grand jury today before Judge Jacob Hopkins in criminal court. The indictment also names Dr. Charles C. Faïman, president of the National University of Science as an accessory. Shepherd and Dr. Faïman will not be arraigned until 2 p. m., when a motion for their release on a writ of habeas corpus will be disposed of. The two are held incommunicado in a loop hotel. State Attorney Crowe said that in view of the indictment the motion would be overruled. He will fight release of the men on bail.

Father May Recover Burns Received As Son Met His Death

Tom M. Fox, brought to the City-County hospital late Tuesday afternoon suffering from burns received Monday afternoon when gasoline from a drip at the Chestnut & Smith Corporation plant, 3 miles northwest of Eastland, was set afire by a spark, was reported improving today and it was said would probably recover.

Edward Fox, his 11-year-old son, who had gone with his father, a truck driver for Chestnut & Smith, to collect gasoline from drips in the line, was so severely burned that he died in an Eastland hospital early Tuesday morning. Funeral services will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at Alameda school house 10 miles south of Ranger, conducted by Rev. A. L. Leake, pastor Ranger Central Baptist church.

Notwithstanding that he was severely burned himself, Mr. Fox carried his son nearly a mile to the plant, from where he was rushed to the Eastland hospital. The lad attended the Eastland public schools and occasionally drove with his father over the latter's route just to be with him.

ITINERANTS TO PAY LICENSES

Ranger Commissioners Propose Laws Governing Outsiders' Work

Mayor Hodges and Commissioners Teal and Brazier attended a meeting of the Ranger commission yesterday afternoon, received a committee from the Carl Barnes post of the American legion relative to remodeling and leasing to the post the upper floor of the city hall, accepted the resignation of Commissioner P. A. Brown as director of the Ranger water supply and attended to some routine matters.

Commissioner Teal asked stricter enforcement of the ordinance forbidding bill peddling in the streets of Ranger and the tacking of posters on telephone posts and the sides of barns and sheds, and also asked that an ordinance be drawn barring traveling photographers, painters and other wandering artisans, unless properly licensed, so that residents of Ranger having money invested in such lines might be better protected. The commission ordered such an ordinance to be drawn.

The commission contracted with A. F. Hartman to cut down a gutter at the rear of the P. & Q. building, Main and Austin streets, to correct defective drainage.

PIPE ASSAULT VICTIM REPORTED IMPROVING

Ralph Wynne, injured in a fracas Sunday afternoon when struck over the left eye just below the temple with a piece of gas pipe, was showing some improvement today, according to information given at the Clinical hospital, Ranger, where he is receiving medical attention. He is suffering with concussion of the brain. His chances for recovery are good, according to Dr. T. E. Lauderdale, attending physician, but there is some doubt if the sight of the left eye will be saved, as the optic nerve was injured.

Bill Byrd and Clyde Ballard, both of Gorman, are under arrest, and the final outcome of Wynne's injuries will decide the charges they must face as a result of the assault, officers state.

Byrd and Ballard are now at liberty on \$2,000 bonds each.

Predicts Crude Petroleum Going Higher

KANSAS CITY, March 18.—Higher prices for crude petroleum were forecast by W. H. Gray, president of the Tribes Gasoline company at Tulsa, Okla., addressing the American Oil Men's association, meeting here in annual convention, Tuesday. He said the outlook for the petroleum industry was better than at any time since 1920, the draft on storage gaining momentum steadily. "There will be no more low priced gas," Gray told the oil men. "Unless a new field is discovered by July 1 of this year I expect to see the price advanced." He said storage oil was being withdrawn east of the Rockies at the rate of 200,000 barrels daily. He said many oil wells were rapidly going dry.

FALL SAYS HE'S GLAD DOME TRIAL IS OPEN

CHEYENNE, March 18.—In a statement given to newspaper men here today, Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, declared he was gratified to know the Teapot Dome oil case was finally in court, where the rights of individuals and witnesses would be respected.

The indicted former cabinet member was to leave here today for his home in New Mexico. He was not called to the witness stand. "I shall maintain for what I consider the proper time that silence I have adhered to up to the present," Fall said.

INVESTIGATE WHEAT DROP. WASHINGTON, March 18.—Secretary of Agriculture Jardine today directed the United States grain futures administration of the department of agriculture to conduct an investigation of the recent spectacular drop in the price of wheat on Chicago and other grain exchanges.

SENATORS AGAIN BLOCK COOLIDGE

Solons Turn Down Commerce Commission Nominee.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The same coalition of senators which defeated the president's efforts to nominate Charles B. Warren as attorney general today served notice they objected to the nomination of Thomas F. Woodlock of New York as a member of the interstate commerce commission. Woodlock's nomination was resubmitted to the senate today after having failed of confirmation on account of the criticism that he was too closely identified with New York financial interests. Indications were the republicans would not press the nomination.

Thousands Interested In County's Poultry Exhibit At Fort Worth

Literally thousands of people saw Eastland county's exhibit at the Fat Stock Show and International Exhibition at Fort Worth from March 7 to 14, according to Geo. W. Briggs, secretary of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, who returned to the county seat Monday afternoon from Fort Worth. Besides the booth, which was attractively arranged, more than 10,000 pieces of literature advertising Eastland county was handed out. The exhibit for the county was arranged by the chambers of commerce of Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, and Rising Star and the secretaries of the three towns took turns at staying in Fort Worth during the show.

Mr. Briggs said the crowd attending in the Fort Worth show this year established a new record. He also stated that the interest taken in Eastland county as a poultry raising country was much greater by far this year than ever before. "People are beginning to recognize Eastland county as a poultry section," Mr. Briggs said.

STATE SOLONS PASS PRISON RELOCATION

AUSTIN, March 18.—Final enactment of the Teer bill to relocate the penitentiary system in Central Texas was voted by the senate this morning, 20 to 8 and one pair. Further attempts of Senator Fairchild to delay action were "steam rolled," the vote on final passage coming after final consideration of the measure was taken up. A commission of five state officials is created to sell the present prison property, buy a new site and contract for another building. An appropriation of \$200,000 as a revolving fund is made, this amount to be returned to the state treasury within two years after sale of the present penitentiary properties is completed.

Collier Lays Plans To Secure Suspended Sentence for Murder

WICHITA FALLS, March 18.—A jury to try Frank Collier, former mayor of Wichita Falls, for the killing of Elzie Robertson, his 17-year-old son-in-law may be completed before court adjourns this afternoon. Ten talismen have been accepted from 109 examined, and attorneys expressed the belief the jury would be completed without calling another special venire, 191 of the talismen summoned remaining to be examined.

Several of the veniremen were discharged when they expressed opposition to capital punishment, eight were challenged preemptorily, and others said they had preconceived opinions and believed they could not give a fair verdict.

Collier's attorneys indicated that in the event Collier is convicted he will ask for a suspended sentence. The first eight jurors chosen: M. C. Peck, 27, Electra, married, one daughter. W. Y. PLAN EARLY LIFTING ORIENT RECEIVERSHIP

WASHINGTON, Mch 18.—William Kemper, receiver for the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railway, today asked the interstate commerce commission for authority to issue a receiver's certificate for \$1,000,000, the certificate, being six per cent interest, to be deposited with the secretary of the treasury as security for a government loan of the same amount. With this \$1,000,000 and with the \$1,250,000 which is to be paid in by the underwriters, Kemper announced he planned to rebuild and replace equipment, take the road out of receivership and put it on a paying basis. The Kansas City federal court has approved the issuance of the receiver's certificate.

Congressman Butler Visitor at Eastland

Congressman Thomas S. Butler of West Chester, Pa., is in Eastland visiting his son, Horace Butler, head of the Arab Gasoline company and president of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. Judge Butler was first elected to serve in congress in the fifty-fifth congress, and has been re-elected for each congress since then. He will be in Eastland several days.

HUNDREDS WORK MADLY TO REACH BURIED VICTIMS

Constabulary Hold Off Grief-stricken Relatives in Frenzy To Reach Loved Ones

BOMB PLOT IS RUMORED

Bethlehem Mines Recently Started Open Shop

FAIRMONT, W. Va., March 18.—All hope for the rescue alive of the 34 men entombed in the Bethlehem Mine corporation mine No. 41 by an explosion was abandoned at noon today when rescue squads found two bodies in a passageway. Benton Mitchell, superintendent of the mine, and R. M. Lambie, chief of the West Virginia bureau of mines, announced after a conference it was believed all the men had perished in the explosion or had been suffocated by gas after the blast.

Watchers on the hillside overlooking the shaft did not give up hope, however, that their loved ones were yet alive and would be saved. FAIRMONT, W. Va., March 18.—Hundreds of rescue workers struggled this morning to reach 34 miners entombed at the Barrackville mine No. 41 of the Bethlehem Mining corporation, three miles from here. The miners were cut off by a terrific explosion at 9:30 o'clock last night. Belief that all miners entombed are dead was expressed by Benton Mitchell, superintendent of the mine. MINE TOTAL WRECK. "The mine is a total wreck as a result of the explosion and probably no fire," he said. The shock, believed to have been caused by a gas explosion, rocked the vicinity for 20 miles around, destroying structures near the mine and causing the lights of Fairmont to go out temporarily. It is believed the roof of the underground passageway collapsed, sealing the men as in a tomb. Thousands of persons gathered at the mouth of the pit following the explosion, and rescue squads were organized with the state department of mines in charge. BOMB EXPLOSION RUMORED. After more than six hours work, members of the rescue parties had not been able to reach the men, dead or alive. Rumors of a bomb explosion were linked with the fact the mine started work on the open shop basis on Tuesday, 1924, but they were scouted by officers of the Bethlehem corporation. In 1917, 10 miners lost their lives by an explosion in the same mine. RELATIVES HELD BACK. The victims of last night's explosion had been at work only a short time when a rumble was heard and then a terrific blast broke loose. The shock wrecked the electric light plant and crippled one of the two fans that supplied the mine with air and smashed the elevator. The shaft at dawn was partly filled with debris. Experts from the bureau of mines headquarters in Pittsburgh and the state department of mines at Charleston, West Va., took over directions of the rescue work. State police restored a semblance of order by stretching ropes to keep frantic relatives of the entombed men from crowding about the mine entrance and hindering rescue work.

RECEIVERSHIP ASKED FOR MILWAUKEE LINES. NEW YORK, March 18.—Receivership action against the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad was started in New York courts today. Earlier in the day a similar action was started in Chicago. H. E. Byron, president of the road, and Mark Potter, former member of the civil service commission, were appointed receivers in the action here. They will be under a joint bond of \$50,000. They, with one other, were also appointed receivers in Chicago this morning.



Eastland Merchants' Banquet on April 21

The second annual meeting of the Eastland Retail Merchants' association, together with the annual banquet, is to be held on Tuesday night, April 21. This decision was reached at a meeting of the association in the chamber of commerce last night.

Representatives of the Ranger Eastland and Cisco Chamber of Commerce, Tuesday visited Metcalf's Gap, in Palo Pinto county, where the north branch of the Bankhead highway breaks away from the main highway to reach Breckenridge and Albany while the main line veers southward and passes through Strawn, Ranger, Eastland and Cisco and on to Abilene and westward.

Secretary Patterson of Ranger stated that the incomplete gap in the highway between Strawn and Mineral Wells is being topped at a rate of about one mile a day and it was expected the highway would be in fine shape before the West Texas Chamber of Commerce holds its seventh annual convention in Mineral Wells in May.

CHAMBER OFFICIALS INSPECT GAP ROADS

Competition between the north and south highways to attract tourist travel finds expression at this point through signs that have been placed there by the two interests. A large and conspicuous sign directs tourists along the south route and advertises the three Eastland county cities. The visit of the Eastland county delegation to the junction with connection with a slight change in the highway at that point which would not, it is declared, operate to the advantage of the southern route.






CANINE OWNERS RUSH TO RELIEF OF PETS
