onard Tucker is dead. He died last and the Anger hospital. He made no clear statement from the time shortly past noon Monday when he MEXICO DETARDS EFFORTS came to the K. The body is now being held by the Milford Undertaking company while an effort is being made to discover who his people are and where they live.

the only information that has been gained thus far as to how he received the fracture of the skull which led to his death last night. An inquest will be held sometime this afternoon and the police department will begin an investigation.

Conflicting Leads Tucker before he lost total conscious ness Monday, said that a painters' scaffold had fallen on him; that the scaf-folding of an oil derrick had fallen on his head, and that he had been beaten up by his partner.

Two clues have been discovered, which if followed might lead to finding the dead man's people and might also be the means of finding who his partner was if he really had one. Tucker's wound was dressed Monday morning at 8 o'clock by Estelle Laxson and Agnes Horton, who found him sitting on the gallery of the Travis rooms.
