nor Cox's charges of large quotas assigned to the principal cities by the Republican campaign fund committee was introduced in the senate committee's investigation today when Dudley Blossom, who is helping raise the Cleveland quota, testified that Governor Cox's fig-ures of \$400,000 for that city are correct. Senator Reed called witness' attention to the quota sheet submitted last week by Republican Treasurer Upham, fixing the amount for the entire state of Ohio at \$400,000. A list of 3,000 names of prospects in Cuyahoga county (Cleveland) was provided Blos-som. All prospects were known to be Republicans thought to be able to contribute to the cam-paign fund. Senator Reed re-marked that there were surely more than 3,000 Republicans in Cuyahoga county. Blossom said when he left Cleveland on Labor day, \$74,000 had been pledged and workers were trying to reach the goal of 400,000.





As a result of the change of occupation this teacher is saving a nice sum each month, while in her former place she had to struggle to make ends meet.





It went so far Mon day as to completely close the upper en of Lamar street and cause half a dozer autos to be left derelict in its waters, anwhen the flood receded, a box and a bar rel had been deposited high and dry in th roadway. Also it scoured the road sur face to such an extent that traffic will b handicapped even when the mud dries off This same condition will prevail the nex time it rains heavily. And the roadway will be further pitted and damaged.

Unfortunately, it is realized that these conditions must be condoned for the pres ent. But it is well to keep in mind that this is a very important link in Ranger' scheme, and when the next budget is readebout, funds should be set aside for the periodical repairing of this place, and pekhaps others as well, which will cer be in need of repairs after eacl tainly rain

Some day these obstructions will be removed so that storm waters may move swiftly out of the city. Some day these streets will be paved. But while these two things are yet eventualities, provision must be made for maintenance of this road. If the street budget is not large enough to provide money for this purpose, some other method of raising funds should be devised.
