ROAD TACTICS **ARE FLAWLESS** AT CONFERENCE

Ranger Suggestion Puts Delegates on Record "No Change."

As a proposed economic retrenchment the Ranger suggestion at the good roads conference at Eastland yesterday was a failure; as tactics, every move was smoothly made and it was an unshadowed

What doubt existed in Ranger minds as to the building of the essential high-way west to the Pleasant Grove disariet, which will be the Breckenridge channel out of Ranger, has been wiped away. Eastland and the delegations which lined up with Eastland yesterday ar solidly on record as opposed to deviation, "in the slightest jot or tittle," from the road map as it was submitted to the county for the \$4,500,000 roads bond issue September 27, 1919.

Ranger's Suggestion.

Ranger's suggestion that the two roads south from Ranger and Eastland, through Staff to Desdemona, be discontinued and that in place of them a single highway be built meeting the Ranger-Eastland main east and west highway at a point midway between those towns, with a saving of six miles of road and approx imately \$200,000 to the county, was flat

Eastland opinion, voiced in the mair by Senator H. P. Brelsford, acting as spokesman for Earl Conner, chairman of the Eastland delegation, and for the Staff Cities of the North and East which deand Desdemona districts as well, stressed the pre-election map as a solemn pledge given the voters and deplored the suggestion that any change might be contem-

"That the roads be built as originally outlined, the towns to determine the local questions of entering and leaving their municipal limits," was the text of a mo-tion offered toward the close of a heated session by Judge Joe Burkett of Eastland.

A substitute motion, giving the county judge and commissioners' court some latitude in the location of roads, where engineering practice and economic need directed and absolute fairness permitted, generally are plentiful and where there offered by Ranger, met with another out-burst of disapproval. Neither measure went to a vote, Judge Starnes holding small crop. that the conference was not for that pur-pose but suggesting that any resolution and southwest of Fort Worth have made offered by any communities would be received by the court.

As a sporting event, the conference was on a par with any game of the Ranger-Abilene series. At one point in the afternoon session the feeling reached such pitch that action seemed not so far in the offing, Senator Brelsford sounding the feeling of one side and being an-swered by Lytton R. Taylor of the Ran-ger delegation. The hot moment passed without anything more than whoops of approval from Eastland on Senato Brelsford's booming declarations with a few cries of "Throw him out," directed

against the Ranger speaker. Tactful administration of the meeting by Judge Starnes, with a tendency to break the factions away from personalities and continue the conference toward its goal, which was the expression of sentiment of the county at large in regard to location of the roads, marked

The crest of feeling was reached near the close of the conference, when Sen ator Breisford, holding for the original platting of the Eastland-Staff leg of the Ranger-Eastland-Staff triangle, asked permission of Judge Starnes to use what engineering data the county highway de-partment had assembled and make another survey with the idea of holding to

What is considered by officers to be the most complete whisky still ever found in the county was cap-John Bloxsom, deputy sheriffs. Fif-teen gallons of what has been pronounced an excellent grade of corn whisky was also captured. The still was found in a house about four miles west of Ranger and was in operation when the officers arrived.

A. Nimpher, who was in the house at the time of the raid, made an effort to escape, but he was caught by the deputies. A chest of plumbers tools was found in the dwelling. They, with the worms of the still, the whisky and the arrested man, were brought to Ranger, Nimpher was placed in the city jail for investigation.

The still was of seventy-gallon capacity and was equipped with double worms. The additional distillation, the officers say, brings out the quality of the liquor.
