

Thompson, Companion of Bandit Mims, 'Squeals' On Witness Stand During Trial For Robberies

The death penalty will not be asked in Thompson's case, it was announced at Eastland today when the jury hearing the case was charged.

EASTLAND, Sept. 21.—For the first time a detailed narrative of the high-jacking of an alleged gambling game over a Ranger garage by the bandit, Charles Mims, and four companions, was told on the witness stand here late yesterday afternoon by R. F. Thompson, arrested simultaneously with Mims after a gun fight in Ranger. It is expected that the case will go to the jury this afternoon.

Thompson willingly told of his complicity in the robbery of the gambling house, but contended that Mims was the leader. That the robbery had been planned for some time

It was also learned that Thompson and Mims had contemplated leaving Ranger with the loot taken from the gambling house hold-up on the day following the date of their capture here. Mims' share of the stick-up was augmented by a considerable sum of money constituting his "split" after the robbery of a bank at Graham. Thompson denied all knowledge of the Graham robbery and declared that the only one bery and declared that the only one of the five men who participated in he robbery here that he knew was

Thompson maintained composure during the trial. His parents came to Eastland from Mexia, Texas, and the prisoner spent the time off the witness stand playing with his baby

witness stand playing with his papy sister, one year old.

The gist of his testimony follows:

"The first I knew of the pro-posed hold-up of the game at Ranger was Monday or Tuesday at a "Jake" joint down on Fifteenth street in Fort Worth. There were three or four talking about robbing a gambling house at Ranger. There was no time proposed for this while I was present. I came out to Ranger either Monday or Tues-I went to Mrs. Etta

Moore's place and took a room.
About 2 o'clock that night, just after I had gone to bed two of the boys came to my room and asked me if I wanted to go up to the gambling house. I told them I did. There were five of us who went up there immediately, Charles Mims being the only one of the others whom I knew. We went directly to the place where the game was running and went up to the gamb-ling room. Two of the boys went into the room first and drew their guns and the crowd put their hands up and we lined them. them up against the wall with their faces to the wall. I and three of the boys held our guns on the crowd while the other two searched them. I never put my hands on a single person after we had completed the search. We walked back out the door and ran to the Moore rooming house."

ARGENTINA SEEKS CHANGE IN PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION LAWS

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 21.—In case of the death, incapacity or absence from the federal capital of the president of Argentina and, subsequently, of the vice president, the executive functions would be performed by a member of the cabinet in fixed order of procedure, according to a bill just passed by the Chamber of Deputies, called the "vacancy law."

This amends the previous law whereby the succession fell to the president of the conate. The minister of interior

takes first precedence. The law would thus assure that who ever succeeds as president would be a member of the administration, whereas under the existing procedure, it is possible for the succession to fall to a member of the opposition party. Such a possibility, at present, is held to be responsible for the introduction of the law into the chamber of deputies by the radi-cal party, which is president Irigoven's. The death last year of vice-president Luna left the presidency of the senate vacant and a conservative majority in the senate elected Dr. Benito Villanueva to preside over that body. Thus, if Pres-ident Irigoyen should die, Dr. Villanueva would automatically become president.

Under the Argentine law, the president cannot leave the capital without the permission of congress, in which case his functions devolve upon the vice-president until his return. At present :7 permisshion were granted, they would be performed by Dr. Villanueva. Critics of the president say that this is the reason he has never asked for a vacation since the death of the vice-president.

Most of the newspapers doubt that the new law will be sanctioned by the senate, pointing out that the conservative majority will hardly be willing to sur render the potential advantages which the situation gives them.







By International News Service DENVER, Sept. 21.—That forest fire hich have taken a terrible toll of human and caused many millions of dollars lages in this state wave been conquer-is the belief of national forest of ficials in Colorado, following a succes 'ul experiment in detecting a "dummy fire in the thickly wooded country o Isabel forest by aeroplane scouts.

A plane piloted by Jack Atkinson, o this city, and carrying Forest Range Charles W. Clover and another observer wept through the swirling air current Southern Colorado, and demonstrate that the aeroplane forest fire patrol is far more efficient than was believed pos-

The trip was made as a test upo which may depend adoption by the government

trol in the forests of Colorado.

The plane was flown from Denver, south to Pueblo, and within twenty minntes after the "fire lookout" had left that city in a southward direction the bservers had located accurately from the thousands of acres of forest beneath them the tiny wisp of smoke which represented incipient forest fire, previously set by the other rangers concealed in the ngged fastness of the San Isabel. One of the most secluded spots in the forest had been chosen by the rangers who set the test fire, but the plane circled about the tiny dot of smoke that had bee potted" unerringly from the dense fo

area of hundreds of square miles. 'Successful? The trip couldn't po sibly have been a greater success," declared Ranger Clover upon landing from the plane. "From the earth it would have fire would have been discerned agaist the sky. Looking down, with the dense black forest as a background, the thin wisp of smoke could be seen miles away."


