THOMPSON ON TRIAL NOW FOR ROBBERY OF EDWARDS; **BANDITS BOUGHT WHISKEY**

State Objects to Testimony Intended to Show Nature of Game Interrupted by "Jaked" High-Jackers; Thompson's Split \$410.

EASTLAND, Sept. 22 .- R. F. Thompson, the high-jacker on trial in Judge E. A. Hill's court here for the robbery of Cleve Barnes, from whom he and four companions took \$600 in an alleged gambling house over a Ranger garage September 7, was sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary after thirty minutes of deliberation by a jury yesterday afternoon.

An attempt of the defense to introduce testimony bearing on the exact nature of the establishment in which the robbery took place and to which Thompson persistently referred as a "gambling joint," was defeated by Judge Hill at the objection of Joe Burkett, prosecutor for the state, on the grounds that its introduction was not germane to the case. 

One case of this alleged "high jacking" caused the arrest of ten men in Kingsville. All of the men were held by the federal grand jury on charges of transporting or possessing liquor, by United States Commissioner J. A. Mount in Corpus Christi.

According to testimony at the hearing a Mexican resident of Kingsville went to Mexico and bought 300 quarts of mescal, hiring two native Mexicans to help him bring the liquor back to Kingsville. Arriving near Kingsville, it was stated, the Mexicans established a camp three miles from town and for a few days did, a thriving bootleg business; but while the owner of the liquor was in town and cnly one of his two employes was in camp, three other Mexicans, according to the allegation of the man left on guard, entered with drawn revolvers and took the 100 quarts remaining, as well as \$430.

The trio then transported the liquor to Kingsville by automobile and began re-tailing it themselves, according to witnesses at the hearing. The owner, as soon as he learned of the robbery, re-ported it to the officers. His own arrest as well as that of his two assistants, the three alleged holdup men, the chauffeur who helped transport the liquor to Kings-ville, and three alleged "customers" of the original owner resulted.



Unless care is exercised before recommend ing them or their propositions are thor-oughly analyzed before they are fur-thered, many West Texas towns and in-dividuals will be defrauded. The organization I manage has been unusually ac tive recently in ferreting out these base schemers and following the trail of others, sending out advance notices to the towns that they are contemplating taking as prey, with the result that we have been enabled to overcome their activities in a large measure. However, the warnings we send out cannot bring results unless the towns and communities them selves cast aside every proposition that looks suspicious. Wolves in sheep's cloth-ing are prowling the West in constantly increasing numbers. Every town should put a bounty upon them. Eradicatio: by all honest means should be resorted to. We are proposing to bring about legislation that will keep these grafters from even presenting propositions that are sinister and dubious.
