PARIS, France, April 20.—A pre-liminary agreement for funding the \$4,200,000,000 French debt to the \$4,200,000,000 French debt to the United States has been reached by the French ambassador, Henry Beren-ger, and Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon, Premier Aristide Bri-and told the French cabinet today.
