Gorman owns its own water sys-tem. It gets enough water for all purposes from five little wells—but big producers.

J. M. Maurney living in the south-ern portion of Eastland county, put fertilizer on some old worn out land, in continuous cultivation for 3 years, and, last season, made 30 bushels of corn to the acre. His unfertilized acres in the same field, made less than one-third as much.
