

Mr. Marshall does not need them now, but he said as he came home from Europe on the Aquitania, that if he ever did need them he wished to be certain that he had enough money to pay for them.

"I started in politics 12 years ago," he said. "Now I'm where I started from, and I'm older, even, than I am the day when I'll need false teeth. And if that time ever comes I want to be sure to have enough money on hand to pay for them. So I'm out of politics forever.'

The former vice president, with Mrs. Marshall, left Boston several months ago to tour Europe. They went to Scotland, England, France,

Belgium and Germany.

Mr. Marshall said he was neither a banker nor an economist, so he did not wish to discuss Europe to any great extent.
