

PROSPECTS ARE OF LEGISLATURE

No Extraneous Matter Will Be Allowed To Creep In Says Man

By United Press.

AUSTIN, April 23.-A demand for immediate special session of the legislature to enact a law validating all the Texas road bonds will be made today on Governor Miriam A. Ferguson by a committee officially appointed for that purpose by the road conference held at Fort Worth on April 14.

The governor recently announced that she would not call an extra ses that she would not call an extra ses-sion unless she was convinced the legislation could provide a remedy for validating the bonds which have been held invalid under a decision of the United States supreme court in the Archer county case.
