## CONFESSES M'CLINTOCK GERM MURDER

### GRAND JURY TO HOLD SHEPHERD IN WARD'S DEATH

**Bacteriologist Confesses He Taught Guardian How to Administer Bacilli**

### MURDER CHARGE CINCHED

**Cook County Prosecutor Declares Following Fairman's Admission**

CHICAGO, March 17.—An indictment charging William D. Shepherd with murdering William McClintock, his millionaire ward, was prepared today by the state's attorney's office. It will be executed formally when the grand jury returns its true bill some time during the day.

**Fairman Confesses.**  
The case against Shepherd was "cinched," State's Attorney Charles E. Crowe declared, when Dr. C. C. Fairman, president of the National University of Science "confessed" he gave Shepherd typhoid bacilli and instructed him how to administer the germs to young McClintock to cause death. Fairman said Shepherd promised him a share in the million dollar estate in exchange for the germs.

**Directed Shepherd.**  
Fairman's "confession," which was at the same time a direct accusation against Shepherd, came shortly after midnight, as the result of constant grilling by Crowe and aides. He was promised diminished penalty if he confessed. Dr. Fairman previously had told the state's attorney that three test tubes of germs had disappeared from his laboratory about the same time Shepherd was taking a special course in the laboratory. Finally, however, he admitted giving the tube of typhoid bacilli to Shepherd, with instructions how to use the germs.

**Promised \$100,000.**  
"I gave you those germs," Dr. Fairman declared, "I taught you how to use them so that McClintock would die. You promised me a share in the fortune."  
Shepherd, his face twitching nervously, his color almost gone, drew himself up and muttered feebly, "You're a liar, a damn liar."  
"I ought to kill you," said Fairman, adding another detail that "Shepherd promised me \$100,000 for the germs and my advice."  
Dr. C. C. Fairman will be indicted with William D. Shepherd on a charge of murder, as an accessory to the act, State's Attorney Crowe said this afternoon. "Fairman has confessed that on promise of \$100,000 he schooled Shepherd in the use of typhoid germs and told him how to inoculate McClintock," Crowe said.

### Mrs. Wheat Is Suing T. & P. for \$95,000

Mrs. Aquilla Wheat and three minor children of Ranger are asking \$95,000 for alleged damages through the death of their husband and father, J. T. Wheat, in a suit filed against the Texas & Pacific Railroad company and which went to trial Monday in the Ninety-first district court.

### EVERHART MUST GIVE EVIDENCE

**Government Counsel Wins Second Teapot Dome Round**

CHEYENNE, March 17.—The government struck back and won a point in the Teapot Dome suit today when Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy ruled that M. T. Everhart, son-in-law of Albert B. Fall, must answer questions regarding the deposit of bonds in a Pueblo bank to Fall's account.

Everhart refused to answer the questions of Owen J. Roberts, government counsel, concerning Everhart acting as Fall's agent in depositing \$90,000 worth of liberty bonds to the former cabinet officer's account. His refusal was based on a refusal to incriminate himself.

Prior to the judge's decision, Everhart read a statement from the stand asking that he be allowed to refuse to answer the questions. The small courtroom was filled with spectators who hoped that Fall would be called to the stand today. A cameraman took motion pictures of the court scenes this morning.

### YOUNG WOMAN, BEATEN AND LOCKED IN VAULT SAVES BANK'S FUNDS

AMARILLO, March 17.—After being beaten into unconsciousness and locked in a vault, Miss Edith Simmons, clerk in the First National bank at White Deer, Carson county, about 50 miles northeast of here, recovering consciousness, seized a secret telephone in the vault and gave the alarm, resulting in the capture of Frank Crutchfield, 19, said to be the son of a leading farmer and ranchman of Carson county, and the recovery of more than \$2,000 of the bank's funds.

No one will deny this was the uppermost desire of the one-time grand master of Texas masonry, who is on trial for his life for shooting down Elzie Robertson, his youthful son-in-law, on the night of Feb. 14.

### Predict Poultry Industry Should Reach \$4,000,000 Within Four Years

R. H. Bush, county agricultural agent, is seeking to arouse the several chambers of commerce in Eastland county to the necessity of finding land for hundreds of persons wishing to come to this section to engage in chicken raising or dairy farming.

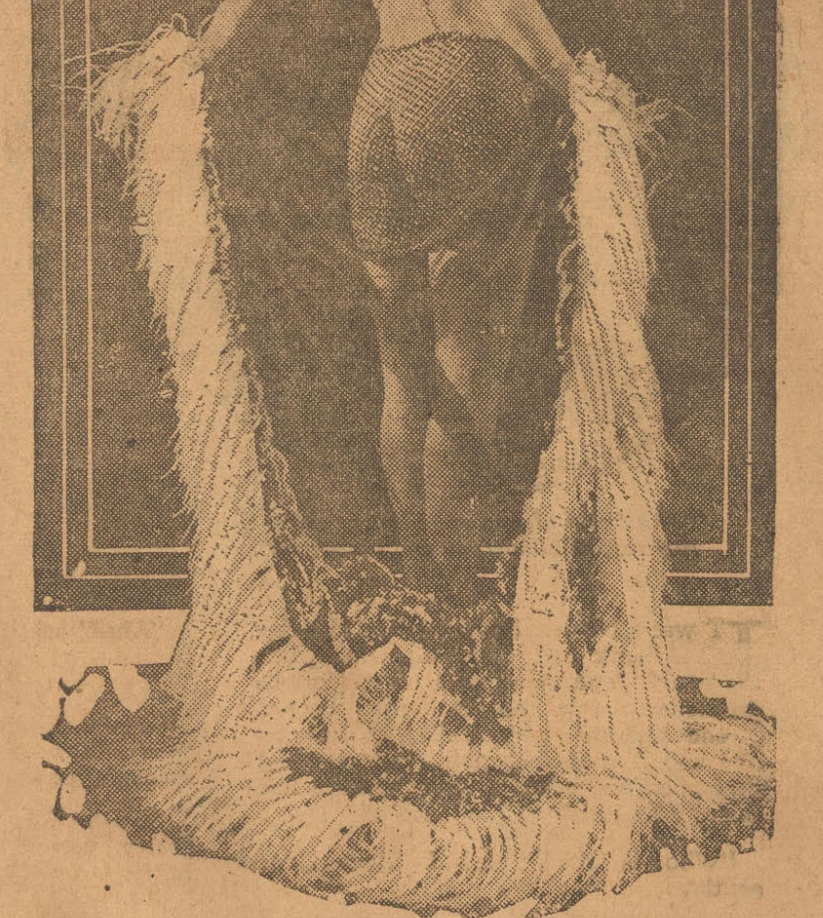
The secretaries of the several chambers of commerce are daily receiving inquiries about Eastland county and all of them want to know where land may be purchased, where it lies with reference to cities in the county, if it is watered, has any trees, what is the character of the soil and the prices and on what terms it may be purchased. It is seldom the secretaries are able to reply to any of these questions, because the lands have not been listed with them," Mr. Bush stated. Continuing he said:

### Drilling 25 Wildcats

CISCO, March 17.—Upwards of 25 wells in shallow wildcat territory within 10 miles of here are now being drilled and if the high price of oil continues a new era of drilling activity is expected. Miller Bros. of Breckenridge have a good showing on the Julius Jones tract just west of Dothan and are getting the well ready for the pump. They expect to complete their No. 2 Jones well, two locations south, in a short time. Production from these wells has opened to drillers the territory between them and the Putnam pool, three miles west.

### HOUSE FLAREUP OVER PASS VETO DIES DOWN

AUSTIN, March 17.—The flare-up in the house which threatened censure and condemnation for former Governor James E. Ferguson and the administration Monday, resulting from Governor Miriam Ferguson's veto of the free pass bill, died summarily today when the house voted 56 to 43 against its adoption. The vote came without argument, following which the Bobbitt resolution naming Ferguson as the "governor in fact of the state of Texas" was not pushed.

### Fishing Is Good

SWEETWATER, March 17.—Lake Trammel will be thrown open tomorrow to fishermen holding permits to throw out hooks and lines. The water commissioner began issuing permits last Saturday afternoon and for a time issued them at the rate of one each three minutes. Permits were for periods ranging from one day to one year, the latter costing \$10. The rush for permits continued yesterday and today.

### Tarrant Officials Threaten To Punish Ranger Boy Scouts

Ranger must rise as one to the defense of the Boy Scouts who visited Fort Worth last week as guests of the Fat Stock show or they may be sent to jail for a month or more and each fined \$100, according to threats said to have been uttered by Justice of the Peace John Frizzell of precinct 6 in Tarrant county, whose office is on the edge of Fort Worth, who has ordered them to appear in his court Friday, March 20, to answer a complaint of speeding.

The Boy Scouts were on their way home to Ranger from Fort Worth Sunday afternoon, traveling in two trucks loaned to them by Chestnut & Smith corporation and the Prairie Oil & Gas company. They were traveling about 18 or 20 miles an hour, according to W. F. J. Bailey and E. H. Peacock, Ranger scoutmasters, who were right behind them in an automobile, when Constable L. D. Chapman of precinct 6, Tarrant county, who had been lying in ambush to await speeders, arrested them for alleged violation of the regulation which makes 18 miles an hour the limit for trucks through that precinct.

Judge Frizzell is said to have argued that the alleged offense might call for the severest punishment, because the trucks carried human freight. On the other hand the defense claims the trucks, when used as passenger carriers, take the classification of passenger buses, which are permitted to go at the speed limit of 35 miles an hour.

### GOVERNOR SIGNS NEW COURT BILL

County Commissioners Now Seeking Quarters for Officials

Judge L. R. Pearson of Ranger this morning received a telegram from Representative M. H. Hagaman at Austin telling him the conference committee on appropriations for the judiciary had added \$22,500 to the bill to provide for salary and incidental expenses of the eleventh court of civil appeals, to be located at Eastland. A telegram with the message that the bill creating this court, passed finally last week, was signed by Governor Ferguson this morning, was received later by Judge L. R. Fywell.

### Creager Recommends Scott C. White For U. S. Marshal's Job

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Appointment of Scott C. White of El Paso as United States marshal for the western district of Texas was recommended to President Coolidge today by R. B. Creager, republican national committeeman of Texas.

### COOLIDGE DROPS WARREN, NAMES JOHN G. SARGENT

Senate Is Expected To Promptly Endorse Vermonter As New Attorney General

### CHARLES WARREN BALKS

Bitter Controversy Ended When Recess Favor Refused

WASHINGTON, March 17.—John G. Sargent of Ludlow, Vt., an old personal friend and former attorney general of Vermont, today was named by President Coolidge for the office of attorney general of the United States in place of his first choice, Charles Beecher Warren, who was twice rejected by the senate.

Sargent is expected to receive the approval of the senate. The nomination of Sargent was sent to the senate shortly after the president had announced that Warren declined to accept his offer of a recess appointment. Senators Curtis and Robinson, republican and democratic leaders, called at the white house to inquire if the president had any further business to lay before the senate. The president replied by dispatching the nomination of Sargent, thus ending the bitter controversy waged last week between the white house and the senate over Warren.

### IMPEACHMENT COURT MOVEMENT LAUNCHED

AUSTIN, March 17.—Resolving of the Texas senate into a high court of impeachment to review and modify the impeachment verdict, voted against then Governor James Ferguson in 1917, was contained in a resolution reported favorably by the civil jurisprudence committee last night. Members of the committee early today indicated it was undecided when the court would go into session in event of the adoption of the committee report. No time has been set for the senate to review the verdict of the former session, but action upon the resolution will be spontaneous, originating upon motion made from the floor.

### Another Joy Killer

**ST. PATRICK'S DAY.**  
 Although born in Scotland (date not known), history and legend credit St. Patrick with planting Christianity in Ireland and lifting that nation out of the darkness of heathendom. He founded some 300 churches and baptized over 12,000 people, including many of the nobles. In this work he utilized the three points of the shamrock as a symbol of the Trinity, and it is still worn in his memory.

The anniversary of his death March 17, 1420, is celebrated as a feast day in all parts of the earth where the Irish have penetrated. Instead of parades and demonstrations it has come to be an occasion for renewal of old friendships, and a revival of the history, poetry and traditions of the ancient homeland.

**DAWES, ANOTHER ROOSEVELT.**  
 Vice President Dawes is one of those plain-spoken men who abhor the soft pedal in business matters among business men. If he believes he is right he prefers to call a spade a spade. In this respect he and General Mitchell, of the aviation corps, are looked upon as two of a kind—and they are the kind that the American people admire. It was this characteristic that made President Roosevelt so strong with the people.

Mr. Dawes has been criticized for presuming to rebuke the senate for unbusiness-like rules and methods of procedure during the inaugural ceremonies, but he was wiser than his critics, because, under the very rules which he assailed he is prohibited from further utterance on the subject—even though he be the vice president. He improved his first and only opportunity of telling the senate what was on his mind.

Senator Underwood also improved the first opportunity to introduce a resolution to change the rules and limit debates as suggested by Mr. Dawes, but it is probable that it will be lost in the committee morgue.

Mr. Dawes is the recipient of a flood of congratulatory telegrams from all parts of the country and as he will be called upon to deliver addresses from time to time, it is altogether probable that he will carry his fight for this reform back to the people to the end that senators themselves, who are extremely sensitive about the opinions of the voters "back home," may hear something that will change their views and attitude.

Notwithstanding the "demotion" of LaFollette, Brookhart, Ladd and Frazier, it now appears that with Dawes in the chair and certain new senators on the floor who are fresh from the people and take pride in their own individuality, the senate is due for an interesting session.

Florida, by a vote of 6 to 1 at the last election, adopted a constitutional amendment prohibiting inheritance taxes in that state, on the theory that such a policy would encourage persons of wealth to move to Florida and develop its resources and industries, thus furnishing employment and opportunities for thousands of families to build homes and farms in that commonwealth.

 land for chicken raising or dairy farming, these companies to buy options on large tracts of land and divide them into farms of different sizes, then provide them with gas, water and lights. These tracts could be sold on small cash payments that would return the outlay for options and the balance on time at a small rate of interest. The advantage of this would be that many persons would be attracted by the colony plan, which enables them to take advantage of desirable cooperative arrangements.

Mr. Bush said the poultry industry in Eastland county is double today what it was last year. He expects it to double again this year and within the next three or four years to become a \$4,000,000 annual proposition. He is optimistic, too, regarding the future of dairying in Eastland county.

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## LANGHORN TRIAL TO BEGIN TODAY

## PRIZES OFFERED IN DRY FARMING

**DALLAS, March 17.**—Every farmer in Texas who does not irrigate his land may compete in the cotton growers' contest for prizes aggregating \$3,900, including a grand prize of \$1,000, offered by the Dallas News and the Semi-Weekly Farm News for the greatest production of lint cotton on five acres of unirrigated land. The News offers the grand prize and four smaller prizes aggregating \$500; nine supplementary prizes are offered by the Dallas Cotton exchange and the Texas Cotton association, being three prizes of \$500, \$200 and \$100


in each of the three districts, West Texas, East Texas and South Texas. Farmers may make their entries now.

The five acres are to be measured by a local committee of two farmers residing in the community of the contestant and one business man at the trade center. They make a sworn statement as to the measurement of land and character of contestant. Each contestant must keep an accurate record of his five-acre crop and a record also of all other cotton grown on his farm, which must be sworn to and sent to the cotton contest editor at the close of

the season. Each contestant, after his cotton is ginned, must submit commercial samples properly drawn from both sides of each bale.

## Nut Croquettes


A quick luncheon dish recommended by Mrs. Chitwood who was in charge of the Times popular Cooking School.

2 cups hot riced potatoes	bread crumbs
1/2 to 1 teaspoon salt	5 tablespoons cream
1 small onion, chopped	1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon Crisco	1/4 cup chopped pecans
	1 egg

To the hot riced potatoes add the salt, pepper and onion. Add the cream and pecans, and last, the Crisco. Mix all together thoroughly. ## EASTLAND MAY SAVE BIG SUM

(Continued from page one)

Bonds are to run, pay a total principal and interest of approximately \$2,607,000 while on the serial bonds, if they are refunded and put in that form, it will pay a total of principal and interest of approximately \$2,185,240, which would effect an approximate saving to the city of \$422,760 less about \$30,000 or \$40,000 expense for the refunding.

**Period of 38 Years**  
The city has \$815,000 bonded indebtedness, which extends over a period of 36 years. There are 13 series of these bonds, the larger part of which are term bonds that cannot be paid until the time for which they were issued has expired. This makes it necessary for the city to provide a sinking fund, which accumulates from year to year, that will be sufficient to take up the bonds when they become due. This sinking fund must be kept by the city at its own risk. Under the serial form of bonds the city pays off certain amounts of the bonds each year and thereby is relieved of paying interest that amount of money in the event of the responsibility of keeping on that amount and also is sinking fund.

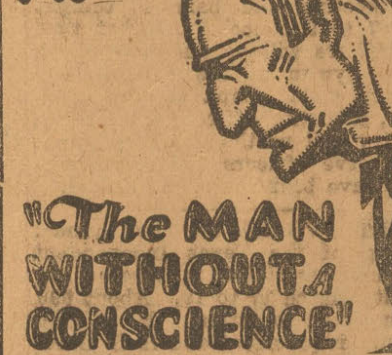

**Cleaners Held Responsible**

One day of last week Mrs. J. L. Avery sent a child's coat to an Omaha cleaning establishment to be cleaned and steamed. She explained to the plant owner that she had paid an exorbitant price for the garment. In the cleaning process some defect showed up—the velvet was a cheap grade, and the "ermine" was white rabbit fur. The cleaner brought these facts to light.

When Mrs. Avery received the cleaned coat she was indignant—indignant against the cleaner. She warned all her friends and neighbors against the local cleaner, who she said, had wrecked Betty Jane's coat for which she had paid a good price.

The incident is common to any cleaner in the city. Mrs. Avery talked against the cleaner who had "ruined" the garment. She neglected to tell her neighbors who the dealer was who sold the garment at a high price. She did not call the dealer and tell him that his high-priced coat was other than represented. She fully appreciated that he did not make the velvet, nor did he make the white rabbit skin. He only sold it to her. But she is quick to condemn the cleaner who in attempting to rejuvenate the coat, brings out the defects. A plant owner of a cleaning establishment can do wonders in dry cleaning. But he cannot change a garment into wool when the manufacturer used cotton. He cannot deliver to you a pure silk garment when the manufacturer used more adulteration than he did silk. He cannot grow nap on goods where it has been worn off. He cannot make "ermine" out of rabbit fur, and he cannot make "real animal" tails when the furrier used a common cord and a hunk of hair.
