Wherever possible, junior colleges Salvation Army be a high school in practically every rural district in Texas and in every county/seat where it is possible to establish one should be a junior college./ The junior college is a step forward in education. The establishment of junior colleges near the center of the rural population is a step closer to giving the rural child an equal opportunity with the urban in obtaining an education so that he may fight the battle of life.

If possible, it is best that the various towns establish and support their own junior college from the local tax, and if the local tax is not sufficient the state should aid.
