


One of the queerest cases in the nation is thus commented on by the Abilene Reporter:

His case attracted national attention, and finally his war buddies made up funds to pay the back alimony and a \$250 fine imposed on the sheriff, thereby effecting the release of the prisoner. The sheriff was fined for taking the prisoner to a meeting of war veterans, in violation, presumably, of a court order.

U.S. LEADS IN PLANE SERVICE FOR AMERICAS

But German Companies Still Compete-Would Link 22 Nations.

By MAURITZ A. HALLGREN United Press Staff Corresponden WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Un usually satisfactory progress being made in developing a sy tem of air mail and airplane pa senger and freight service, which eventually will link together the 22 countries of the American hemisphere, in the opinion of author

As carried out to date the program has been actively sponsored by the United States government and this official patronage has ad-mittedly given United State avia-tion interests a clear lead in the race to build up a network of air lines over the two continents. German companies are nevertheless still offering serious competition in this respect, according to re-

ports from South America. Government sponsorship has been directed not only through the state, postoffice and commerce departments, acting independently in their various fields, but als through a governmental commit-tee consisting of Assistant Secre-taries White of the State De-partment, Davison of the war department, Warner of the navy de partment, Schoeneman of the treasury department and Mc-Cracken of the commerce depart-
