

MURDERER CONFESSES TO BEHEADING

\$10,000 Annex of Church Opens Here Sunday Morning

DEDICATION SOON BY BANQUET

Christian Church Has Completed Large and Handsome Annex.

The handsome new annex of the first Christian church has been completed and will be in use for the first time Sunday morning.

Costing \$10,000, the structure, is half paid for and pledges have been obtained for the balance.

The building adjoins the church auditorium on the rear and is 36 feet by 46 feet. It is of stucco type, harmonizing with the architecture of the church building. The annex is divided in Sunday school rooms but the doors separating the rooms can be folded back, providing a banquet hall that will seat 200.

A membership banquet will be held on the evening of Dec. 7 to dedicate the new building. Dr. J. Leslie Finell of Fort Worth and the Rev. A. F. Halsey of Abilene, who conducted a revival at the church last summer when 70 conversions were obtained, have been invited to attend the dedication. It was their distinction to be the first to suggest the construction of the annex.

All departments of the Sunday school will report for classes Sunday morning in the annex with the exception of the Men's Bible class, which has been meeting in the chamber of commerce. That class will now meet in the church auditorium.

Briton Cabinet Pay Draws Members' Ire

LONDON.—Dissatisfaction in the ranks of Britain's politicians on the question of governmental salaries is reported since the departure of Lord Birkenhead, who is following his former colleagues, Sir Eric Geddes, Reginald McKenna and Frederick Kellaway, into the more remunerative spheres of commerce, Sir Kingsley Wood, parliamentary secretary to the minister of health, is quoted as having recently referred to his salary as a "miserable pittance."

Only one out of the 20 members of the cabinet, the lord chancellor, draws a salary of \$50,000 a year; 10, including Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin (as first lord of the treasury), receive \$25,000 a year each; while the first lord of the admiralty gets \$22,500; and eight draw \$10,000 a year each.

Among the eight drawing a salary of \$10,000 a year, are Sir John Gilmour, secretary of state for Scotland; Walter Guinness, minister of agriculture; Lord Eustace Percy, president of the board of education; Sir Arthur Steel-Maitland, minister of labor—each office an important one.

The minister with a salary of \$10,000 has \$8,858 left after he has paid income tax on it. A salary of \$25,000 is worth \$19,430 when income tax and super-tax are paid.

As parliamentary secretary to the ministry of health, Sir Kingsley Wood gets a "miserable pittance" of \$7,500—or \$6,585 after the collectors have taken out income tax.

The majority of departmental parliamentary secretaries' salaries are \$6,000 (net value \$5,335), but the financial secretaries to the treasury and the admiralty each receive \$10,000.


Law officers are in a class by themselves. The attorney general gets \$35,000 or with fees about \$85,000; the solicitor general has \$30,000, amounting with fees to about \$85,000.

Members of parliament get \$2,000 a year, plus a free transportation ticket, which was finally granted after many heated debates. Many members are hoping that the new parliament will open up the salaries question, with the object of removing the anomalies that now exist.

CHILD MURDERER AND ANOTHER SLAYER WILL DIE TONIGHT

By United Press. OHIO STATE PENITENTIARY, COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 30.—Charles Hoppe, former Toledo chauffeur, will be executed tonight for one of the most brutal child murders in the history of Ohio.

John Rucker, a negro, who killed a Cincinnati policeman and who was denied a reprieve this morning by the State board of clemency, will go to the chair a few moments before Hoppe. Both men were resigned to their fate. Hoppe, a Catholic, attended mass this morning. Rucker was baptized and taken into the Baptist church. Hoppe's wife who has stood by him throughout and his brother, bade him good-bye today.

Hoppe condemned to death for the kidnapping and murder of Dorothy Selaeowski, 7-years-old, his cousin. The child's body was scratched and bruised and bore evidence of assault.

Hoppe snatched the child from her bed the morning of May 29 and a few moments later, threw her lifeless body on the porch of her grandfather's home.

Both Hoppe and Rucker will eat chicken dinners at 5 p. m. The double execution will take place shortly after 7 p. m.

FRIENDLY RELATIONS ARE AIDED

Citizens of Neighboring City Comment on Cordial Atmosphere.

The fact that—despite the rivalry between the cities and that the game last year at Breckenridge was followed by semi-riots—the game this season between Ranger and the Buckaroos was played here without the slightest disturbance was commended by a number of Breckenridge citizens who saw Fire Chief Murphy at the Abilene-Cisco game Thursday and took occasion to compliment the people of Ranger.

Football games should be the occasion for strengthening friendly relations between cities, fans of the two cities believe, and the opinion seems general that the citizens of Breckenridge and Ranger will strive to outdo each other in courtesy when each is host to the other.

NEW CHINESE BANK.

A detailed plan for the operation of the bank is now being drafted and will soon be submitted to the state council for approval.

BY THE WAY

The oil belt district race has ended, at least as far as the games are concerned. In view of the fact that Ranger walloped Cisco far worse than Abilene did—and beating a team the first time is always harder than winning after they have been defeated—and in view of the further fact that Ranger outplayed Abilene in that 19-19 tie, we assert without any alarm as to successful contradiction that the Ranger Bulldogs proved themselves on the gridiron to be the strongest team in the district. Furthermore had a playoff taken place between Abilene and Ranger, with the Bulldogs being allowed their full lineup, the score would not even have been close.

Three members of the district committee won the championship for Abilene.

We are going to have more to say concerning the Abilene school authorities' son. We are also going to have something to say about the way the majority members of the district committee have bungled affairs. But at this time we will merely content ourselves with asking the Breckenridge school authorities to tell the rest of the district the answer to this question: WHY DIDN'T THEIR STAY PAKLE PLAY IN THE GAME LAST TUESDAY?

Officers Arrest Other Officers

Nine inspectors were arrested by federal customs agents and charged with conspiracy to assist in the smuggling of liquor into the U. S. and accepting bribes.

Wales is fast approaching young manhood when you see him next; the photo with the trim gray civilian suit shows him when he was 16. About this time he was sent to Dartmouth, England, for training as a naval cadet, and is shown here in uniform. On July 13, 1911, soon after his father, the Duke of York, had become king, the boy was formally invested with the title of Prince of Wales. The last photo shows him in ceremonial attire.

DIKES IN BELGIUM BREACHED

20,000 Driven From Homes By Water From the Sea.

By United Press. BRUSSELS, Belgium, Nov. 30. Floods in the Antwerp region drove 20,000 persons from their homes today as the seas swept inland through breaches in the dikes made during the recent storm which battered the coast.

Temporary repairs to the dike were expected to take care of tidal rising and 5,000 troops were working in the flooded area. Damage was estimated at \$5,000,000.

MAN'S HEAD IS TORN OFF

By United Press. HOUSTON, Nov. 30.—W. C. Parker, 35, a carpenter, was decapitated early today by an elevator in the new Jones building now nearing completion.

The temporary lift speeding downward caught Parker's head against the wall of the shaft on the 16th floor. "So strong was the impact of the elevator against the victim's neck and head that Parker's body was thrown into the temporary lift and the accident was not discovered until his body reached the bottom floor.

Thieves Didn't Take a Holiday

U. bame yesterday, burglars broke into two homes, ransacked jewelry boxes and escaped with gems valued at \$3,000. The homes of Charles H. Hulbert and Mrs. D. Kessler were entered.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla.—Palm Beach Post No. 12, the American Legion, has contributed \$1,000 to the fund being raised for city beautification work. Several hundred pounds of garden flower seed is to be given away. It is planned to grow flowers in all parts of the city.

MEXICO TO USHER IN NEW CHIEF

Capital City Thronged for Inauguration of Emilio Portes Gil.

By United Press. MEXICO CITY, Nov. 30.—Mexico's capital was in gala attire today as crowds surged toward the Congress building where Emilio Portes Gil was to be inaugurated as provisional president of the Mexican republic at noon.

A simple ceremony was planned to mark the installation of Portes Gil as the chief executive of the republic and it was planned also as an occasion to launch a campaign for the election of the constitutional president who will take office at the end of the provisional term in February, 1930.

The act announcing the election of Portes Gil will be read to a short session of Congress opening at noon.

Gil will then take the oath of office and address Congress with his first executive message.

King's Condition Reported Better

By United Press. LONDON, Eng., Nov. 30.—King George was slightly better today, Buckingham palace officials announced this morning. It was understood that the usual 11 a. m. bulletin had been postponed until afternoon to enable the king's physicians to review his entire illness. Outside the gates of the palace, a few hundred persons were assembled at daybreak and the crowd increased to about a thousand by the time guard mount was observed. The weather was mild and cloudy with a threat of rain. There was little conversation among the king's subjects as last night's bulletin, posted outside the gate, was eagerly scanned.

The United Press was informed that "no developments have occurred in the king's illness since the night bulletin." This was interpreted to mean it would not be long before King George would definitely reach a stage when he would be on the road to recovery.

'Now I Can Sleep' States Northcott After Confessing

Gives Full Details of Gruesome Slaying and Implicates Cousin, Say Authorities; Denies Three Other Murders, However.

By United Press. ABOARD WEST COAST LIMITED, BAKER FIELD, Calif., Nov. 30.—Gordon Northcott today made a complete confession to the murder and beheading of an unidentified Mexican boy, last February, authorities announced.

The confession, made to Deputy District Attorney Earl Redwine of Riverside, came as the climax to 14 hours of steady grilling by the prosecutor.

After he had finished his tale of the gruesome slaying, Northcott mopped his forehead with a handkerchief and said "Thank God, that's over! now I can sleep in peace."

The prisoner made the admission voluntarily according to Redwine. Northcott had disclosed fragmentary parts of the slaying of the Mexican throughout the day.

"His story is enough to send him to the gallows now," Redwine commented. "It means he will very probably plead guilty to three other murders as well."

The confession was made verbally and no signed statement was taken. It was witnessed, however, by Albert L. Kelly, investigator of the Riverside county district attorney's office.

Northcott implicated his nephew Sanford Clark, in the slaying, according to Redwine.

Northcott reiterated his assertion, however, that he was not acquainted with the Winslow brothers or the Collins boy, also alleged to have been slain by him.

By United Press. LOS ANGELES, Nov. 30.—"Father forgave them for they know not what they do," Gordon Stewart Northcott used that quotation today in referring to those who accused him of the murder of four boys at his Riverside chicken ranch.

In what he declared was his "last interview with the press," Northcott reiterated the statement that he had been framed and flatly denied confessing to the murder of a Mexican boy in his talk with Deputy District Attorney Earl Redwine of Riverside, last night.

It was the prisoner's first and only interview with the newspaperman who accompanied him on his trip from the Canadian border and if Northcott has his way, it will be the last.

By United Press. AUSTIN, Nov. 30.—Report on the 4,098,335 bales of cotton ginned up to Nov. 17 shows Ellis county leading with 106,193 bales. Williamson county is second with 100,990 bales and McLennan county 3rd with 100,262 bales. No other county has 100,000 bales.

"NO WORK, NO EAT."

By United Press. KANSAS CITY.—"No-work-no-eat" rule has ended the popularity of the Kansas City municipal farm at Leeds as a winter haven.

Those days in which prisoners caused themselves to be sent to the farm for the winter in order to have a place to eat and sleep, passed this year, and the reason is the requirement that the prisoners must work if they expect to eat. In other winters, the number of inmates at the farm has totaled approximately 100, but so far this year the number has never gone above 100. The reason, James J. O'Rourke, superintendent, declares, is that the rock quarry, roads and coal pile require too much work. If any one shirks, he is taken into the dining room, placed at a separate table and denied food the others are given.

STRONG, SILENT MAN.

By United Press. SAN RAFAEL, Calif.—A year of silence on the part of her husband was too much for Mrs. Mabel Bonny, she declared in a divorce suit on file here recently. Bruce Bonny, San Rafael capitalist and clubman, refused to speak a word for more than 12 months until a reconciliation was effected in January of this year, he returned. Soon after, however, he resumed his moody silence, the wife declared.

DAIRY INDUSTRY ON SOUND BASIS

Consumption of dairy products by the American people is increasing from year to year. The per capita consumption of fluid milk in 1917, was 42.4 gallons and in 1926 it had risen to 55.3 gallons. Including the manufactured products, such as butter, cheese, condensed and evaporated milk, and ice cream, it is estimated that the 1917 consumption was equivalent to 97 gallons of milk per capita and for 1927 about 120 gallons. This is an increase of nearly 23 gallons per capita in 10 years. As the food value of milk is more clearly understood the tendency should be toward further increases in consumption. O. E. SOVIET TOURIST OFTEN BECOMES A 'DELEGATION'

Russians Will Not Admit Existence of Detached Sight-Seeer.

MOSCOW.—And now the Russian tourist season is over.

Maybe one should say the delegation season. The Russians simply will not admit the existence of a detached undelegated sight-seeer or fact-finder. However, heterogeneous group may have been

crossing the border, it is lumped by the first guide or reporter who gets at it—into teachers' or students' or labor "delegation."

Or it becomes just one of those glamorous things that gets free theatre tickets at the besieged Administrator's window or railroad tickets from G. P. U. station police—an "American delegation." Even a lone timid foreigner stopping at the Orient Hotel to catch the autobus in the morning for Vladivostok is likely to be recorded in the local paper as "the American delegation visiting Tiflis."

Other curious things happen to Americans after they get by the customs officials at Nigoreloye. There's the case, quite typical of the good lady for whom Russia was originally just an awfully interesting way of getting from

western Europe to Constantinople. It ended as nothing less than a mission: to tell the truth at last about the U. S. S. R.

In London, Paris, Rome, Vienna, even in Warsaw, she had been content to follow the beaten and Baedekered path of museums and scenery. The garden variety of American tourist, to tell the unlacquered truth, with the modest but dependable income of comfortable widowhood. No sooner, however, did she catch sight of her first Red soldier, than she erupted into an economist.

Demon Interviewer.
Her room in the Savoy was soon stocked with statistics on the five-year plan, real and unreal wages, current production, the growth of the sovkhos. The Society for Cultural Relations with Foreign Coun-

tries took her seriously; helped her, indeed, to see factories, barracks, prisons—the sort of places one avoids at home. One after another she interviewed heads of important Soviet departments. Within ten days she was complaining how hard it is to get to Kykov . . . as to Stalin, impossible, my dear, and how is one to get at the truth?


Economics being out of her line, and being a conscientious person, she found herself in the end not only muddled but sadly depressed. She was not her old self again until she got to the Turkish border and dropped the statistics out of a window for fear of being taken as a Bolshevik spy.

In her economic obsession she had overlooked some of the best museums and the finest scenery in

the world. That, as I said, is one of the strange things that happen to American visitors. They can't see mountains as grand as the Alps because of the mountains of statistics. Glittering domes by the thousand can't evoke an exclamation.





Sunday School Lesson for Sunday

PAUL BEFORE HIS JUDGES Acts 24:24-27; 26:19-29 By H. W. Wrye Golden Text—"I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision." Acts 26:19.

INTRODUCTION

The lesson of November 18 closed with Paul a prisoner in Jerusalem. The chief captain commanded the Sanhedrim to appear that he might know the certainty of the accused. Paul's explanation of his religion created a division among his accusers resulting in a tumult such as it was necessary to rescue our hero before he was torn to pieces. The next day more than 40 of the mob banded together under a solemn oath to eat or drink no more till they had slain Paul. A nephew of Paul's heard of the proposed assassination, and went to Lysias, the chief, and revealed to him the dark conspiracy. The chief at once assembled a guard of 470 men to escort the prisoner at night out of the city to Caesarea, 70 miles north west of Jerusalem. He was delivered into the hands of Felix the governor of Judea, and a letter from Lysias explained that a mob over in his town was clamoring to kill the prisoner. After some days Paul's accusers with a hired attorney came to Caesarea to prosecute the case. In his own defense, Paul enlisted the interest of Felix and secured a delay in the proceedings.

PREACHING CHRIST TO PROFLIGATES

The Lord cheered Paul while in Jerusalem, and being unwilling that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance, by special providence protected the apostle to the governor's palace that he might preach the gospel to Felix and his Jewish wife. History advises that Felix was cruel, licentious and base. His wife was the daughter of Herod who beheaded James, and sister of king Agrippa. She was married to Azizus king of the Emesenes, but had felt her husband to cohabit with Felix under the mask of marriage. Felix "sent for Paul and heard him concerning the faith in Christ Jesus." The apostle divided his subject, and preached from it under three heads, viz, "he reasoned of righteousness, temperance, and judgment to come." He showed his auditors the tendency of the gospel, reasoned about the nature and obligations of justice, equity, sobriety, temperance, and a proper government of the appetites and passions; and concerning a future judgment when every man, without distinction, must "give an account of himself to God;" and, if found guilty, be punished for his crimes in a most tremendous manner. This was a suitable address of the prisoner, to this powerful, oppressive, iniquitous, and adulterous judge, and his licentious paramour; and a proper method of showing them their need of repentance and obedience to God. The Jewess seemed to remain obdurate, but Felix was convicted, and trembled before his prisoner, from dread of the wrath to come; but, instead of inquiring, "What must I do to be saved?" he abruptly ended the conference by assuring Paul that he was too busy to give Christian religion attention just then, however, at a convenient season," he would advise with him again. But in reality while he was under conviction, the devil suggested the thought that Paul would pay liberally to be freed from prison, and as the "love of money is the root of all kinds of evil," Felix succumbed to the tempter. Many today are like wise minded, they regard money making as more important than Christianity, and will readily surrender Christian requirements in order to

make and save money. Paul lost two years in prison trying to restore Felix's former convictions, while Felix was longing for a handsome bride. The argument was between the Love of God and the Love of Money, and Sin. Felix was called to Rome by Nero to answer to charges of misgovernment in Judea. He barely escaped execution, but was banished to Gaul (France), where he died. His son he Drusilla, perished with his mother in the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius, which engulfed Pompeii and Herculaneum. Truly a case where God tried to save a sin deluded man and his wife, but failed. How many in Eastland and surrounding territory is God trying to save today, and have so far failed. The individual that is waiting for a "convenient season," his conscience is very likely to be "seared with a hot iron," for the longer one puts off obedience to the gospel, the greater assurance of Felix's history being repeated.

PAUL BEFORE AGRIPPA

Pocrius Festus succeeded Felix as governor of Judea, and very shortly thereafter the Jews renewed their efforts against Paul. Festus proposed to Paul that he go back to Jerusalem for trial, but Paul said, "I appeal unto Caesar." Festus had to get rid of the troublesome case, said, "Thou hast appened to Caesar, to Caesar shalt thou go." Before going however, Agrippa, a ruler in a neighboring province, came over to salute the new ruler of Judea. Among other matters of consideration, Festus told Agrippa all about Paul, and his imprisonment and Jerusalem experience. Agrippa expressed a desire to hear Paul. The apostle was brought before the king to tell his story. He reviewed his religion, his conversion to Christ, and his embarrassment in Jerusalem. The speech was so eloquent and logical, that Festus accused Paul of being mad, on account of much learning. Paul's heaven born reply was, "I am not mad, but speak forth words of truth and soberness. For the king

knoweth of these things, unto whom also I speak freely: for I am persuaded that none of these things is hidden from him; for this hath not been one in a corner." Festus might scoff and sneer, but with Agrippa it was different, for he was a Jew, and was acquainted with Jewish affairs. The events respecting the miracles, doctrine, death and resurrection of Christ, and the subsequent promulgation of Christianity could not be his from one so well informed as Agrippa. With this assurance, Paul moved upon his great audience and especially upon Agrippa with the big question, "King Agrippa, believest thou the prophets?" and before Agrippa could answer, Paul answered for him, "I know that thou believest." Agrippa replied, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Paul expressed his hearts desire (Continued on Page Seven)

Had the Big Dam team not been so long making up its mind that it could do something with the boys from the self-styled Athens of West Texas, it might have been a different tale. The count was 19 to 13 in the Eagles' favor—and incidentally the game meant the championship of the oil belt district. Eight thousand fans witnessed the combat at Cisco Thanksgiving.

Loping Lucy Phelps, flashy Abilene halfback, loped a plenty during the first half but thereafter he subsided to a mere walk. His big teammate, Altman Smith, demonstrated more ground-gaining ability, more consistency and better defensive work, besides doing the punting and quite a bit of passing.

Cotton Phippen, making his debut of the season, covered himself with sufficient glory to make up for a whole season's inactivity. The tall, slender Cisco halfback punted 45 yards horizontally and his boots were about twice that high. He flung passes—long ones that caused gasps from the Abilene thousands—but his teammates did not shine on catching them. Two lengthy hoppers went through a receiver's hands. On each occasion, he had an open field and, had he connected, the afternoon probably would have been a total loss for Abilene.

The Eagles got busy in the first stanza after an exchange of punts in which Phippen had a decided advantage. With the ball on Abilene's 20-yard line, Loping Lucy slanted off right tackle for seven yards but his next canter halted at the line. Smith hit the same spot for five yards and Phelps duplicated his achievement. These off-tackle drives made the occasion ripe for catching Cisco napping by resorting to one of those old-fashioned long, swinging end runs, Phelps loping 28 yards around right end. Smith then drove off-tackle for 27 yards to the Loboes' five-yard line. Phelps tried to circle left end and lost three yards. But it meant little for Smith hit right tackle for a touchdown. Hanna fumbled the snapback and the extra point failed.

Eagle Threaten Again. This looked as though the Big Dam team was in for a fancy walloping and when a couple of minutes later the Eagles got possession of the ball on Cisco's 25-yard line by Salkeld intercepting a pass, it seemed that this belief was going to receive further confirmation but three plays resulted in a net loss, partly due to an offside penalty, and Smith punted over the goal line.

Taking the ball on their own 20-yard line, the Loboes proceeded down the field for almost 50 yards. Little and Eddleman toted the ball and then Phippen flinging a pass that Kellogg made a leaping catch of, for 18 yards. But the attack failed and the Eagles swept on to another score in which the most important plays were an end-around pass flipped by Phelps to Bentley for a 19-yard advance and a Smith-to-Salkeld pass for 10 yards and the score. Hanna kicked goal.


The Eagles had another chance when Smith's punt hit Little and was recovered by Abilene only 25 yards from Cisco's goal. But after advancing 11 yards, Abilene drew a 15-yard penalty and that halted the drive.

Speedy tooting of the referee's whistle proved damaging to Cisco when Little, after slipping through tackle for nine yards, broke loose from an Eagle and streaked down the field, finally being overtaken by the giant Salkeld who brought the tiny halfback to earth on Abilene's 12-yard line. It was a pretty chase but the ball was brought back to midfield. Kellogg made a clever catch of Phippen's pass and Eddleman hit the line with vim and vigor, but Abilene's 31-yard marker was as far as the Loboes reached as the half ended.

Those Eagles flapped their wings when the third quarter began. Phelps returned the kickoff 28 yards and Smith sailed around left end for 34 yards. Even a 15-yard penalty could not stop them, Phelps and Smith alternating in carrying the ball. Then Smith heaved a pass to Salkeld for 12 yards and, in 19-line plays Smith had negotiated the remaining five yards. Goal was missed.

Loboes Got Started. Abilene was leading 19 to 0. Then mid-way of the third stanza, after an exchange of punts, Eddleman and Little made short, consistent gains. Kellogg tossed a pass to Van Horn for 16 yards. The powerful Cisco fullback rammed the line for 12 yards and then Kellogg executed a beautiful lateral pass to Little who streaked left end for 14 yards and a touch-

down. Kellogg kicked goal.

When will the coaches be able to impress upon their quarterbacks the utter futility of throwing passes in their own end of the field when they have a substantial lead? Phelps' pass was intercepted by Kellogg who ran 15 yards before being brought down on Abilene's 20-yard line on the first play after the kickoff following the Loboes' touchdown. In six line plays four by Eddleman-Cisco had another score. Eddleman put it over. Kellogg failed to kick goal.

The fourth quarter was scoreless. Neither team was in what is termed "scoring position" although there were those two prodigiously-long passes that Phippen threw and Van Horn couldn't hold them. He was beyond the Abilene secondary each time and holding on to the ball probably would have meant a touchdown. Most thrilling play of the period was on a bad snapback from center when Cisco had possession of the ball on its own 15-yard line. The ball went over the goal line but Phippen recovered and while going at full speed behind his goal and with tacklers swarming down on him, he threw the ball 38 yards at a Lobo who could not quite reach the ball.

Captain is Star. Eddleman, captain of the Loboes, proved himself the greatest line plunger in the district. He gained every time the ball was entrusted to him. Anthony at center and Miller at guard played brilliantly for Cisco. Smith and, to a lesser extent, Phelps performed impressively for Abilene while Salkeld, end, played in great fashion.

A steady procession of giants was sent into the game by Coach Mayhew of the Eagles. No less

SPORTSMATTER

By William J. Dunn United Press Staff Correspondent **Corporal Izzy Schwartz**, king of the flyweight boxers, is the first champion of the ring to visit Europe for a major engagement in many, many months.

The diminutive corporal is now in Paris training for his bout with Spider Pladner, French flyweight, at the Salle Wagram, Dec. 1. And the pending bout, although not a championship match, is causing great interest there.

Schwartz was recognized as successor of Fidel LaBarba atop the midget division, after his victory over Newsboy Brown at Madison Square Garden last December. LaBarba's retirement left a gap in the flyweight ranks that was hard to plug but the New York boxing commission obligingly arranged an elimination tournament which Schwartz won.

The National Boxing Association did not occur in tournament plans nor did they recognize Schwartz as the heir to LaBarba's throne. With the New York commission's backing, however, Schwartz has gradually established his right to the place, and is generally accepted.

Army Ring Career Schwartz's career has been that of an orphan who left a New York orphanage, joined the army and emerged a fighter. He was raised in Manhattan and spent six years in an orphanage there after the death of his parents. In 1917 he managed to gain entrance to Uncle Sam's military force in spite of the fact that he stood only 5 feet 1 inch and weighed 100 pounds.

It was in the army that he learned to fight with his fists, winning recognition as winner of a flyweight tournament. Three years after his first fight—in a Bull Ring at Nueva Laredo, Mexico, he turned professional.

He fought numerous fights and tasted defeat several times. His improvement was noted in each fight, however, and he gradually worked himself into a place where he could hope for a chance at the title.

The chance came last winter after LaBarba's retirement, and the

corporal made good. Since winning the title he has defended it eight times—three times in one month last summer. His bout with Pladner will be one of his most important engagements.

Arrangements have been made several times for Schwartz to meet Frankie Genaro, the champion recognized by the N. B. C. Each time something happened to prevent the bout. Genaro held the title before LaBarba. He was beaten by the now retired champion in 1925.

Battered Brown Late in 1927 a committee of 6-boxing experts, representing every section of the country, was called upon to classify the flyweights in order. The vote gave Newsboy Brown 498 points, Genaro 480 and Schwartz 470.

Hardly had the ballots been tabulated when Schwartz and Brown met in the final of the elimination tournament and the corporal battered the news venter all over the ring.

As a champion Schwartz has never known the great crowds that heavier champions work before. Even the bout in which he won the title was a semi-windup at a Madison Square Garden show. His managers expect him to prove a great drawing card in Paris, however, and feel that he will be more successful as an attraction when he returns from abroad.

They point to the capacity crowd which packed the Garden earlier in the month when Baby Joe Gans and Joe Glick, a pair of lightweights who are hardly starting, met in a feature bout.

If two contenders for a crown can attract such a crowd, they say, surely a champion should be as successful.



Fee System Under Fire in Texas; Dan is Against System

AUSTIN, Nov. 28.—With Governor Moody vigorously against the continuation of the fee system for payment of court officers, many fees besides the trial fee of the Justice of the Peace

seem doomed to fall at the January session of the legislature. Governor Moody has not yet begun preparation of his message of recommendations to the legislature but it is reasonably sure that the message will deal at length with the fee question. The problem has been before the legislature before. Heretofore efforts to abolish the fee system have failed. Governor Moody says the opposition to their abolition has been due largely to the mistaken impression of people that criminals pay the fees.

The criminals pay the fee in only two instances, the governor points out. One of these is in justice court trials and the other misdemeanor cases. In those, the costs, which include the fees, are charged against the defendant. In civil cases the fees are assessed against the losing litigant. But even in those cases, the taxpayers would save money if the fees were payable to the state and not to the court officers.

Magnitude of the fee system becomes apparent when the earning of many comparatively small offices are considered. Justice of the peace in a fair sized city is an office worth five times the salary paid the governor of the state. Tax assessors in large

counties have incomes still higher.


The fee bill lists 29 actions for which a justice of the peace receives from five cents to \$1.50. Many of the acts are performed in the course of a single case. He gets 50 cents for every citation issued and 25 cents for each subpoena, for a witness. If an additional name is inserted in a subpoena, he gets another 5 cents, docketing the case brings him 20 cents or more than a cent a word. Filing a paper costs five cents in a justice court. If the case is docketed he gets 10 cents for a "conclusion." Issuing bonds pays the justice 50 cents; he gets ten cents for each witness sworn in court and the same amount for administering an oath. If the oath is with certificate it costs 25 cents.

If a jury trial is asked the justice gets 25 cents for having the jury summoned and swearing them. There is a fifty cent charge for final judgment and the same amount for an application to set aside the judgment or for a new trial. If a new trial is granted there is an appeal bond which brings the justice 25 cents. There are other costs which vary with the type of case. Whatever the kind of case the justice gets 10 cents more just for figuring up



what his other fees are. While the justice of the peace is doing the acts for which he accumulates fees, there is a lesser attaché of his court also getting fees, the constable. He gets 50 cents for serving each subpoena; 70 cents for serving a citation; 70 cents for serving a garnishment; 70 cents for serving notice for taking depositions; 70 cents for levying each execution and 70 cents for advertising a sale under execution. For levying and returning a writ of attachment or sequestration he gets \$1.50 and a dollar for execution an order of sale, a copy of attachment writ, taking a bond or summoning a jury. His biggest fee is \$2 for making title to a purchaser of real estate under execution or order of sale and his smallest fee 40 cents for returning an execution order of sale, writ possession of restitution. The fee system runs through the Texas statutes down to public weighers. The smallest official fee is two cents to the public weighers. The smallest official fee is two cents to the public weigher for weighing a loose hide.
