## Ranger Rodeo Queen Event Open To County Residents

The Rodeo Queen who will be presented and crowned during the final performance of the rodeo, will be selected from contestants from all of Eastland County.

Three judges will be selected from different parts of the County. This will give girls from towns and communities other than Ranger an equal opportunity in the contest.

One important point is that each contestant will be judged on horsemanship. This makes it necessary, of course, that she own or have access to a horse and be able to ride.

The first appearance of the contestants will be in the rodeo parade. They will also all be required to ride in the Grand Entry of each rodeo performance as they will be judged on all four occasions.

The judges will select the queen on the following points: 50 percent horsemanship, 30 percent attire, and 20 percent personality.

It was decided, according to the contest chairman, that entries may either be single or married. To qualify though, she must be between the age of 14 and 21.

All contestants must be sponsored by a club, an organization or an individual.

## C. W. Blakney, 75, Suffers Fatal Heart Attack

Charles W. Blakney, 75, was found dead Thursday evening, June 20, about 6:10 in the alley directly behind his home of 806 Pershing Street.

Mr. Blakney, known as "Blake" to many of his acquaintances and friends, had been mowing in the alley and had stopped a few minutes previous to his death, to rest in the shade. Later, when his wife noticed the lawn mower had been standing still with the motor still running, she called to a neighbor who was outside, and asked her to check on Mr. Blakney. When the neighbor walked in to the alley, she discovered his body lying behind the mower.

The attending physician pronounced him dead and attributed his death to a heart attack.

Born December 6, 1887, in Mississippi, he was a retired driller after 40 years in that occupation. During the days of World War II, he and his son, Frank, were employed with the Ranger Police Department. The son preceded his father in death in 1960. Mr. Blakney was a member of the First Methodist Church. He had been a resident of Ranger for 39 years.

Funeral services were conducted at the Killingsworth Funeral Home Saturday afternoon at 2:30. Rev. B. L. McCord, pastor of the First Methodist Church officiated. Interment was in the Evergreen Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Bertha; one daughter, Mrs. A. E. Burch, of Texas City; one son, Reginald C. Blakney, of Texas City; and two step-sons, Bernie Milmo of Lamarque and Dan Milmo of Hitchcock; 12 grandchildren, and 6 great-grandchildren.

She was born in Levelland 18 years ago, then spent her first six school years in Lubbock. In 1958 the family moved to Ranger where her father had once lived.



## Arthur Merritt Receives A&M Scholarship

Arthur Glenn Merritt, son of Mrs. Oma Merritt, 701 Summit, has been chosen as one of 93 high school graduates planning on entering A&M this fall, to receive a four year scholarship.

The announcement was made Thursday by Dr. William J. Graff, dean of instruction and chairman of the Faculty Committee on scholarships.

Eight addition students have been named to receive special one-year scholarships, Dr. Graff pointed out.

Winners were chosen by the faculty scholarship committee, following state wide competitive examinations given to more than 500 candidates.

The opportunity awards, valued from \$1,000 to \$1,200, were first given 17 years ago. The program is supported by the Association of Former Students of the college, clubs, business corporations, foundations, and individuals.

The scholarships have helped more than 1,600 high school graduates to enroll at A&M. Ninety percent have either graduated or are still in school according to Dean Graff.

Arthur is the valedictorian of his class this year with an average of 92.76. ## Commissioners Ordered To Call New 'Wet' Vote

For the fifth time in about a year, voters in Ranger will be saying "yes" or "no" to the legal sale of liquors in that town.

Judge T. M. Collie ruled the March 23 election null and void after some three hours testimony in a contest hearing last Monday, and issued a judgment in the matter Wednesday.

Judge Collie said in part in his ruling: "It is also ordered, adjudged and decreed that the County Commissioners Court of Eastland County, Texas, be, and such Honorable Commissioners Court is hereby ordered to call and order a local option election to be held within the incorporated city limits of Ranger, Eastland County, Texas, to determine the following propositions, to-wit: (a) for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only, and (b) against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only."

## POSTMASTER OHR URGES CITIZENS TO USE ZIP NO.

Ranger Postmaster, Max Ohr has announced that Ranger's five-digit ZIP Code is 76470.

"Everyone in Ranger will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail," Postmaster Ohr said.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster Ohr stressed the importance of all citizens of Ranger learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mr. Ohr said. "It should follow the city and state in addresses."

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## Final Plans To Be Made For RJC Gymnasium

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
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## Lacasa Holds Regular Friday Meeting

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
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
